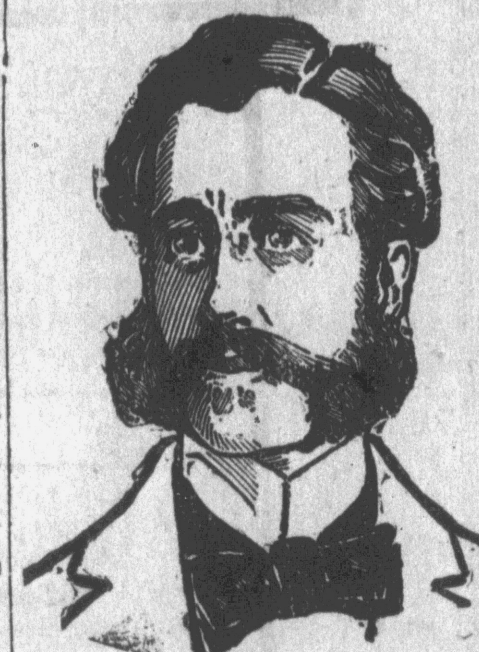

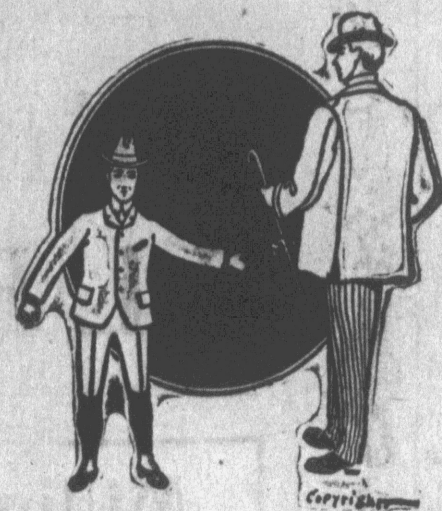
Poor Crops in Prospect.

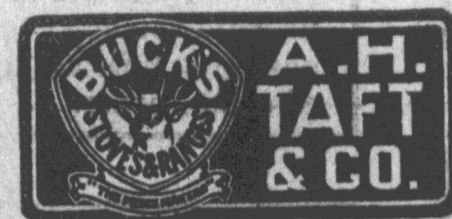

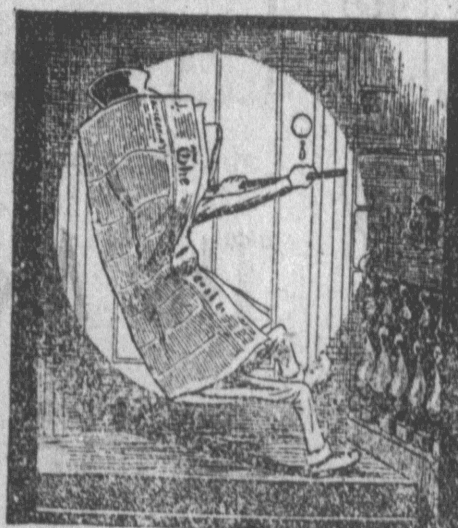
