SUCCESS.

Two Ways of Measuring it—A Comparison.

A farmer of Union county, while in conversation in the Journal office one day recently, remarked that while he looked back over the fifty years of his life and contemplated his present age and his financial standing he was inclined to be ashamed of himself, but upon further reflection his shame would rather turn into pride. Looking at his life from the standpoint of those who count only the getting of money as success, he could but admit that it had been a failure, for though surrounded with enough to give a moderate amount of comfort, he had neither made nor saved money. But the other side of the picture—well calculated to stimulate a feeling of pride—was that he had made his home happy; he had educated his large family of boys and girls and trained them to be useful men and women (those of them who were grown, the others were yet being trained); while living for himself he had lived also for others and had wielded an influence for good in his community and county. These thoughts came to him in no spirit of vanity or self laudation; they were merely the reflections of a sensible man who could look at things as they are.

There is another farmer in Union county who has attained success. He has worked early and late—worked both himself and family. He got all he could in his fifty years and kept all he got. His profits of each year were put into lands, improved machinery and better stock. When the hour glass of his life pointed to the half century mark, men spoke of him as well to do. But his children had grown up as the weeds about him, and none of them can read or write, in an age of which education and the spread of intelligence are the most marked features, this man has reared his children as he might have done before the invention of printing; his cattle are sleek and fat, his barns are full, but his children are dwarfs; and in an era of brightness and happiness, when the world is getting better, they are shut out from the light and will pass their days expatiated, birthright sold for a mess of pottage which they themselves did not even receive.

Which has been successful? Fewer and fewer grow the cases of success like the latter, while those like the former daily multiply.—Monroe Journal.

The World's Gold Production.

The statistics of gold production show that of the whole output of the yellow metal in the last 60 years over 64 per cent has been mined since 1890. With the resumption of mining in the Transvaal and the improved methods of production which are now employed throughout the world—the exploitation of gold territory being carried on by great combinations of capital—the outturn is sure to be vastly increased. The effect of this upon a new adjustment of values must be favorable to larger industrial undertakings, higher prices and greater apparent prosperity. The production of gold in the United States is now about one third of the total product and of late years a larger and larger proportion has been retained in the country, greatly strengthening our position among the commercial nations.—Philadelphia Record.

Negro Preacher Sentenced.

Charlotte, N. C. Aug. 12.—Sam Robinson, a colored preacher, has been sentenced by Judge Coble in the Superior court, to serve fifteen years in the State prison for a criminal assault on an eight-year-old girl of his own race. Robinson's victim was the daughter of a respected negro. The evidence showed that the assault was not successful hence the light sentence.

Too Many Pardons.

The Governor will do well to go slower in the matter of pardons. Referring to a row at a primary, a correspondent, of the New Bern Journal says among the participants, was "one who had only lately escaped from the roads by pardon from the Governor."

There has been much criticism of Governor Aycock for pardoning and of Solicitor Brooks for recommending the pardon of one of gold brick swindlers. It is claimed that he was the dupe of the two real criminals and was not at heart a rascal, that his previous life had been good, that he has already been in jail two years, and that he ought not to suffer for the same punishment administered to the two men who are principals in the gold brick devilry. As a matter of fact he was twenty seven years old, was convicted of an infamous crime, and sentenced to seven years' imprisonment. He ought to have been compelled to serve out his full sentence.—Raleigh News and Observer.

A Very Delicate Souvenir.

Cleaning Soiled Ermine.

A correspondent asks how ermine that is slightly soiled may be cleaned without sending it to the furrier, where its handling will be expensive. Naphtha will clean it excellently, but the process is rather a risky one. If undertaken out of doors and on not too cold a day, when sometimes the air is so charged with electricity that a little rubbing will produce a spark, there should be no trouble. Put a half gallon of naphtha in a foot tub and immerse the fur collar, muff or whatever it may be, lifting it in and out several times and rubbing any soiled spots. Dry in the sun, a part of the process which is necessary.

The Detective Mirrors.

I have seen an odd device in ancient houses, once in the quaint old town of Newburyport, Mass., again in a tiny Dutch settlement in Pennsylvania. Over the front door, right under a shuttered window from which a housewife might peep cautiously, was an arrangement of two mirrors, where was reflected the figure of any one who stood at the front door seeking admittance. It was a wonderfully handy device and more, I think, in keeping with the spirit of the times than the polite deceit of today, "Not at home," which seldom deceives callers or peddlers.—Good Housekeeping.

A Cozy Corner on the Piazza.

The best arrangement may be made in the corner of a roofed piazza. Have a box seat built here. It should be 16 or 17 inches high, 20 inches wide and as long as the place will allow. In this box may be kept rugs, cushions, pillows, etc., secured with a lock. Screen the corner with curtains that can be rolled up or drawn with ease. Cotton duck, such as sails are made from, is the best to protect against strong or cold winds, but bamboo makes the lightest and most artistic screen.—Marie Parloa in Ladies' Home Journal.

Why Is It?

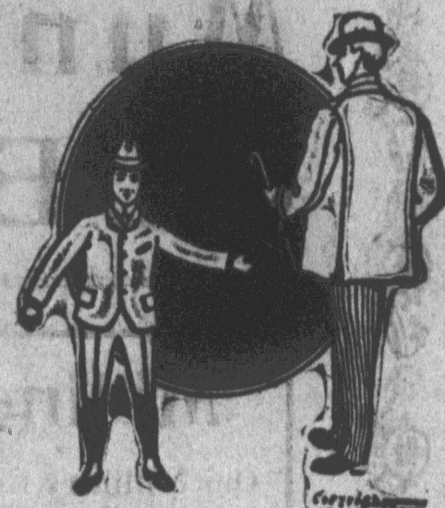
It is noticeable that horses are
