### Immigration Into Western Canada.

While the emigration from the eastern and central states to those further west is remarkable for its volume, that from the northwestern territory of the United States across the line into the British Northwest territory is still more so. Statistics show that last year 17,000 of our citizens found homes in this section of Canada and for the present year the number is estimated at 50,000. In the last year citizens of the United States have purchased 5,000,000 acres of land in Manitoba and the Northwest territory. What is this but laying the foundation for the annexation at some day not far in the future of this portion of the Dominion of Canada to the United States. As Canada now has its French and its British sections, it will soon have one called the American, where all the feeling and inclinations favor American rule. This emigration across the border is but the heaven that will soon permeate the entire Northwest territory and result in making it a part of the great American republic.—Wilmington Messenger.

### He Fell Five Stories and Lives.

A week ago Judge Bynum fell down a few steps and was killed. Late yesterday afternoon John W. Roberts, of Richmond, manager of the Richmond Supply Company, having the contract for doing the painting for the American Cigar Company factory here, fell 60 feet from the ceiling to the basement of the five story building, and was not killed, and so far as physicians can see has not sustained any serious injury. He is resting quietly at the hospital this afternoon, expecting to go home to-morrow. Mr. Roberts' escape from instant death was almost miraculous. He was standing on a plank on the ceiling joists, when it broke precipitating him to a small scaffolding beside a shaft for a spiral stairway reaching from the first floor, falling the distance of five stories into the basement. He was picked up unconscious, and beyond complaining of a pain in his back, seems all right this morning, though still in bed. Mr. Roberts owes his escape from death to an unusual fact. A spiral stairs is being built and every floor or joist has flooring near by, the partial flooring alternating on each side of the stair shaft. Mr. Roberts is very fat, weighing 350 pounds. When he struck the first floor on the right he bounded and struck of the left floor below, etc., and bounding right each time and thus breaking his fall, the fortunate fact of a superabundance of fat protecting his bones and giving elasticity to his body to prevent its missing the alternate floors and going crashing down to inevitable destruction.—Greensboro Cor. Charlotte Observer.

### The Weather.

For North Carolina: Rain to night, clearing Sunday.

A good deal of curiosity has been aroused in Washington by the publication of a statement of General Wood's administration of affairs in Cuba, in which it is shown that when the General turned the affairs of the island over to the present administration, there was in the Cuban treasury a balance of \$1,830,000, while reports from Havana indicated at the time that the treasury balance to which President Palma fell heir was approximately \$50,008. What became of the difference is the embarrassing question that is being asked. Did it disappear as did that famous handsome furniture which was "lost" from the palace at Havana. There is every evidence about the report of the Insular bureau of a desire to make the best possible showing for the administration of General Wood, but when it comes to the actual figures there appears to be a discrepancy which is unaccountable. While the report goes into great detail in regard to reforms, which it is alleged General Wood inaugurated in Cuba, it fails to touch upon any of the details which were asked for by Congress. No statement of the expenses of the palace is to be found in its pages. Neither is there any statement of the amount spent by the General for the "education of public sentiment in the amount United States." Of course it is inconceivable that these figures will be absolutely suppressed in the face of a demand for them by Congress, but they will, in all probability, be withheld from public scrutiny until after the elections and will then be unearthed at a time when public attention will be occupied with watching the national legislature.

thereof.

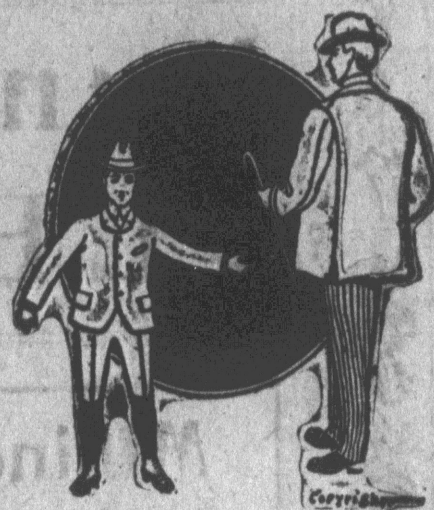
#### No Court Monday, September 1st.

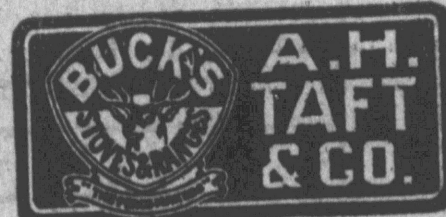

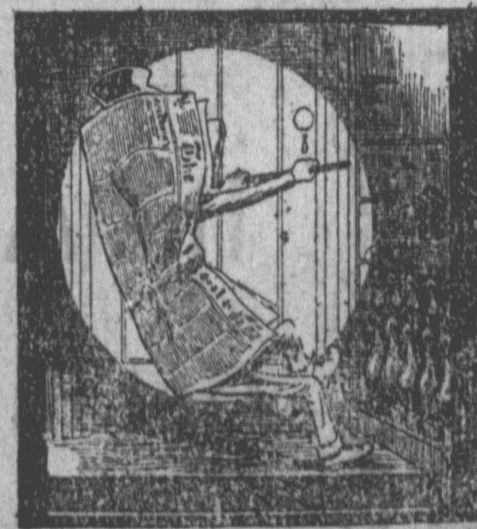
