Fayetteville, N. C., Aug. 19 .-Mrs. Greene, aged 10 years, relict of the late Thos. Greene, met a horrible fate about one o'clock this morning at the home of her son-inlaw, Mr. Alex. Giles, At this hour the home was barned. When discevered the fire had gained such headway the family had barely time to escape in their night clothes.

When the building had collapsed and the flames died out, it was discovered that Mrs. Greene was missing. Search in the smouldering debris revealed the charred trank of Mrs. Green and from its position, it is thought she was burned in bed. Her limbs and head were gone, only the charred trunk tempined to tell its story. During the progness of the fire two ladies living near, fever patients convalement, hearing the cries of distress, died from fright. The house burned was the property of mile from the city.

He says that five negroes came into the white car and began to sing, being at the time partly under the influence of whiskey. Conductor Clements told them to go back into the colored car, when they became boisterous and refused to go. The conductor then went after the negro porter to assist him. When he returned the negroes were in the car for colored people and immediately upon the appearance of the conductor one of them pulled a gun and tried to shoot him. The negro was knocked down by Assistant Road Master Stever, who was killed. The ball entered the right cheek and ranged upward, killing him instantly. As he fell to the floor another of the negroes fired at the dying man and the ball took effect in the stomach of Jim Mitchell, the porter. The conductor saved his life by getting behind the car door. There was great excitement among the passengers, but three of the negroes were disarmed and tied with ropes. The fourth escaped by jumping from the train. A posse was soon in pursuit and a telephone message from Henderson to-night says that blood-hounds have been secured and he will be taken. The dead body of Stever and the three prisoners were taken from the train at Henderson, the prisoners being hurried to the county jail,-Durham Cor. Charlotte Observer, 19th.
