In a recent address at the Farmers' Congress, Mr. Oswald Wilson, United States Statistical Agent for Texas, says the Southern farmers are \$100,000,000 richer because of the accuracy of the estimate for the past three years of the cotton crop. The speculators and foreign spinners are inclined always to give out estimates of an immense crop, and if their estimates govern prices the farmers can get less than their cotton is worth during the Fall months when most of their cotton must be sold. The reports of the Agricultural Department, though persistently discredited by the agents of the foreign spinners, have come to be regarded as more nearly accurate than any other estimate sent out. The past three years particularly they have had an appreciable effect upon the price of cotton, to the advantage of the cotton farmers. There is no money appropriated by Congress that is of such value to the Southern farmers. That Department ought to be strengthened to the end that its estimates shall be as nearly accurate as the best posted men in every cotton growing section can make. The appointment of special agents in every county by the Census Department to locate the gins and get the exact number of bales of cotton is the first practical step by information as to the cotton production by the Census Bureau.—Raleigh News and Observer.

## COUNTY CONVENTION.

### Nominations For County Officers Made.

The Democratic county convention met in the court house this morning at 11 o'clock to nominate candidates for the Legislature and the various county officers. The convention was called to order by W. L. Brown, secretary of the county executive committee, who named H. W. Whedbee as temporary chairman.

The roll of delegates from the several townships was called there being almost a full delegation present.

The court house was crowded with spectators, showing the interest felt among Democrats throughout the county in the work of the convention.

D. J. Whichard, H. T. King and T. J. Moore were requested to act as assistant temporary secretaries.

The roll of townships was called for nomination for permanent chairman, and the names of H. W. Whedbee and W. H. Ragsdale were presented. The ballot resulted as follows: Ragsdale 79, Whedbee 56. Upon taking the chair Prof. Ragsdale made brief remarks, urging the co operation of the delegates in transacting the business of the convention.

W. L. Brown was elected permanent secretary, and D. J. Whichard, H. T. King and T. J. Moore assistant secretaries.

The chairman then declared the convention properly organized and ready for business. R. R. Cotten then moved that the convention proceed to nominations, beginning with Senator.

The names of J. L. Fleming, A. L. Blow and J. J. Laughinghouse, were presented. The first ballot was Fleming 42 1-10, Blow 63 1-10, Laughinghouse 31 8 10. Second ballot, Fleming 40, Blow 67, Laughinghouse 30. Third ballot, Blow 70, Fleming 36, Laughinghouse 31. A. L. Blow was declared the nominee of the convention.

Nominations were then declared in order for Representatives. The convention decided to first select one candidate from the north side of the river, then one from the south side. The names of S. A. Gainer and J. B. Little were presented from the north side. First ballot, Gainer 24, Little 113, and J. B. Little was declared the nominee of the north side of the river.

For the south side of the river the names of C. L. Barrett, J. D. Cox and H. T. King were presented. First ballot, Barrett 16, Cox

57, King 64. Second ballot, Barrett 12, Cox 51, King 74, H. T. King was declared the nominee from the south side of the river.

The county ticket was then taken up, beginning with Clerk of Superior Court. D. C. Moore was nominated for Clerk by acclamation.

O. W. Harrington was nominated for Sheriff by acclamation.

For Register of Deeds, the names of J. L. Sugg, Richard Williams, T. R. Moore J. C. Lanier and D. H. James were presented. First ballot, Sugg 19 2-10, Williams 62 5-10, Moore 42 35-100, James 4 2-10, Lanier 7 25-100, Nobles 3-10. Second ballot, Sugg 15, Williams 87, Moore 34, Lanier 1. Richard Williams was declared the nominee of the convention.

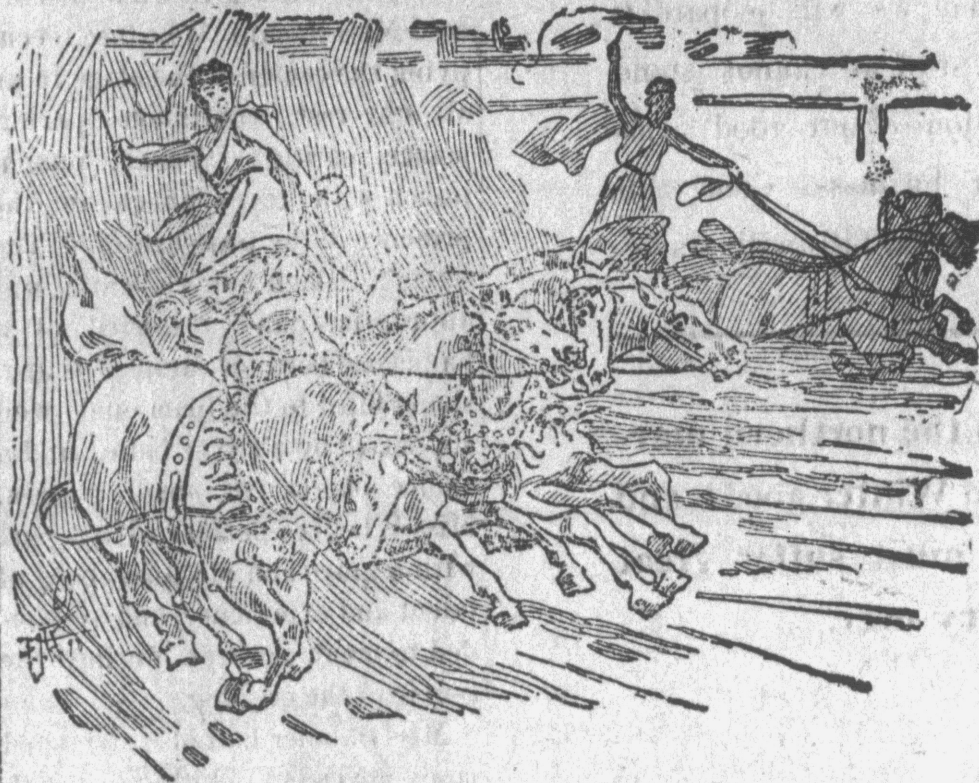

### Decision in Wilcox Case.

Raleigh, Aug. 26.—The appeal  
in the Wilcox case in which a new  
trial is asked for James Wilcox,  
sentenced to be hanged for the  
murder of Nellie Cropsy at Eliza-  
beth City, was heard to-day by  
the State Supreme Court. Appel-  
lants endeavored to have the court  
consider an affidavit made by Wil-  
cox's father that his son did not  
have a fair trial and that the ring-  
ing of bells and demonstrations in  
court influenced the jury. This  
was refused. The grounds of ap-  
peal are that the plaintiffs did not  
have sufficient evidence to go to  
the jury or warrant a conviction;  
that the testimony was not in prop-  
er shape and that there were er-  
rors in the judge's charge.

The State pleaded as facts to  
show a crime had been committed  
that there was no water in the  
stomach, lungs or pleural cavities  
of the dead body of Nellie Cropsy,  
no blood in the heart, little or no  
froth in the lungs, that there was  
a bruise on the head, that the  
brains were decayed, the rest of  
the body intact and the membrane  
of the skull discolored. To show  
Wilcox's guilt they pleaded the  
opportunity, time, place, 20 min-  
utes unaccounted for and his indif-  
ference about the matter. It will  
be several weeks before a decision  
is handed down.
