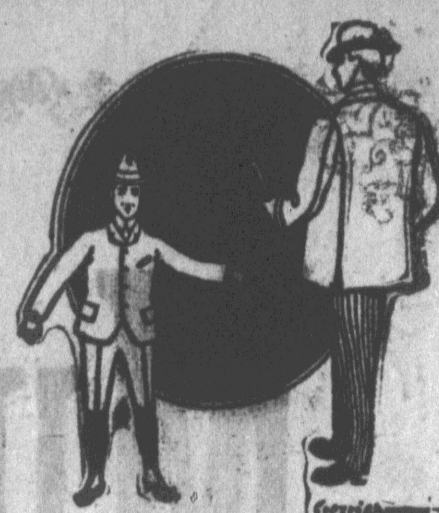
### Gov. Aycock and Pardon Granting.

Governor Aycock discussed with a Post writer yesterday the matter of criticisms by the people of any of the pardons he has in the past or will in the future grant, the discussion being brought up especially by the criticisms about Wilmington on the pardon he granted one Tom Rouse, who was serving a term for assaulting a 13-year-old girl with a stick.

He said that the facts in this case were that he received sworn statements from the girl and her mother that the blow inflicted by Rouse was purely accidental, both urging the governor to grant the pardon. The statement was made by the mother that the girl would have gone on the stand and testified to this effect had it not been that she was sick at the time of the trial and could not go to the court house.

Speaking of pardons in general the Governor said that he wants it distinctly understood that the reason he requires all applications for pardons to be advertised by posters at the county seat and in some county paper where the applicant for the pardon was convicted, is in order that any who object to such a pardon may come forward and state their objection. When an application has been duly advertised (and every one considered by the governor is necessarily so advertised), and no objections are filed, the Governor naturally takes it for granted that there is no objection in the county to the granting of such a pardon.—Raleigh Post.

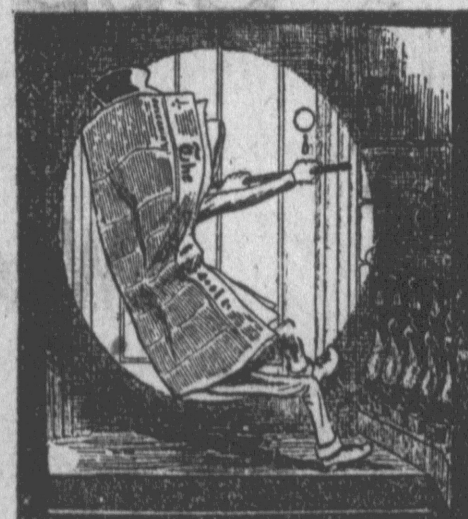
