Sans Souci Club.

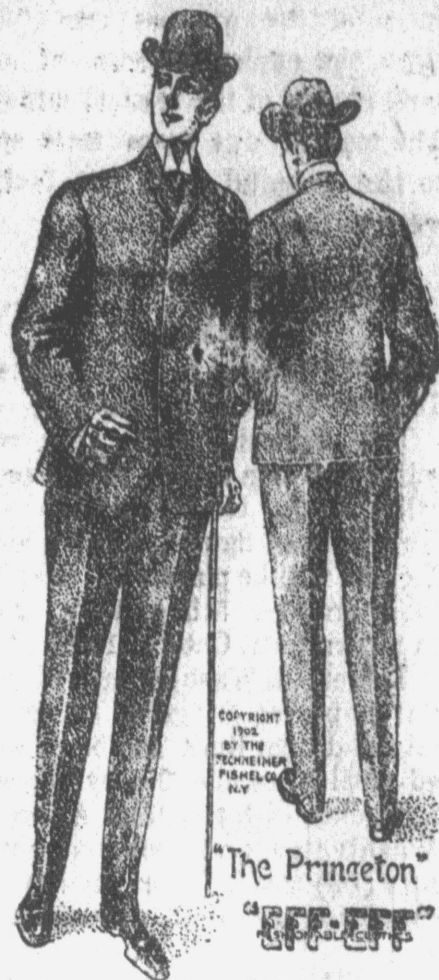

The Asheville Gazoot complains that Game Laws for 1902, a bulletin published by the United States department of agriculture, shows that in several counties in North Carolina, there is no protection for game. The Gazoot might have added that there is class of "birds" for which there is no protection in any portion of the state. The open season for them will begin about November 4th and by November 6th there will not be one in sight. It is the republican bird to which we refer.—Charlotte News.

Strikers Will Not Yield.

Washington, Sept. 22.—President Gompers, of the American Federation of Labor, said today, that the striking miners in the Pennsylvania coal fields were prepared to hold out for months. He said the miners were disposed to make concessions, but the operators had refused all overtures from them and that the men now "are not going to yield."

"The strikers," he says, "are receiving all the supplies they really need and can continue their fight indefinitely. The federation will do all it can to aid them. One thing is certain, that the strikers will never yield on the basis of dismemberment of their union organization, which is all that had raised them even ever so little above their desperate conditions."

Another Old Explosion.

Fairmont, W. Va., Sept. 22.—By an explosion of gas in the Stafford mines of the New Central Coal Company, near here today, four men were killed, six badly wounded and several others were hurt.

The explosion is said to have been caused by the firing of a charge of dynamite. At the time of the accident there were only twenty-five men at work and all have been accounted for. Superintendent Stewart was there at the time the explosion occurred and took charge of the rescued miners. The most serious cases were sent to the hospital. All the bodies were recovered.

Mr. and Mrs. Watkins will make their home in Norfolk.

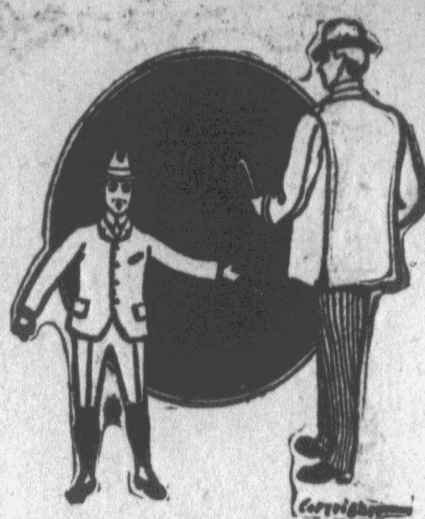
Bracelets on Ward.
