ST. LOUIS IS THREATENED

MADISON LEEVE SAID TO HAVE BEEN BROKEN.

RIVER IS RISING RAPIDLY.

Flood's Terrible Scourge in the Middle West---People Fleeing to the Hills.

St. Louis, Mo., June 5.—It is reported that the Madison levee is broken. The story lacks verification, however; should this prove true it means that three cities on the east side of the river will be inundated. The Mississippi rose two feet in the past 24 hours and this afternoon registered 34.4 feet. A stage of 38 feet is predicted, and if this is realized it means incalculable damage on both sides the river. The river front for miles northward is under water back to the bluffs. The homes of dwellers in the bottoms are inundated to the eaves. Timely warnings prevented loss of life, the inhabitants fleeing to the highlands and leaving their household effects behind.

Found Dead.

William Webb, a white man who lived on W. H. Harrington's place, just east of town, was found dead in bed Thursday. He had been sick a few days but appeared no worse when his wife left home that morning to go about her work. When Mrs. Webb returned to the house later in the day her husband was dead. The burial took place Friday.

Camped In The Capital

Mr. W. T. Horner of Maess, Moore county, made a remarkable trip to attend federal court in this city. He lives in the western part of Moore, says the Morning Post, and came all the way to Raleigh in his wagon with a load of chickens and eggs. Disposing of his produce at a good price he drove his wagon to a warehouse and set up camp, doing his own cooking and sleeping in his wagon. He was drawn on the grand jury, and when that body was discharged yesterday he drew his pay, hitched up his team and started on his return trip home, a distance of eighty miles. The profit on his chickens and eggs more than paid for his living here and his per diem and mileage was all profit.

Almost Intolerable.

The railroad people seem to be making no effort to improve train schedules, and even put themselves to no trouble to let the public know when belated trains will arrive. The people continue to be the sufferers by this neglect.

MACHEN INDICTED.

Post Office Boodler Now Has Troubles of His Own.

Washington, D. C. June 5.—Today was one of sensational developments in the widening circles of post office department scandals. At 3 o'clock this afternoon the federal grand jury, after one of the shortest inquiries on record, indicted former General Superintendent A. W. Machen, of the free delivery service, on nine separate counts, charging him with having received bribes amounting in all to \$18,987.79 from the firm of Groff Bros., this city, manufacturers of a patent fastener in general use on letter boxes. At 5 o'clock today Thomas W. McGregor and C. Ellsworth Upton, Machen's former subordinates, were arrested on warrants charging them with having received \$8,000 in bribes from Charles E. Smith, a mail pouch manufacturer of Baltimore. Other arrests of those implicated in postoffice scandals will follow in a few days.

EX-REPRESENTATIVE DEAD.

Went to Sleep in Richmond and Woke Up in Eternity.

Richmond, Va., June 5.—T. T. Mitchell, a lawyer and former member of the North Carolina legislature, and the head of a family of talented singers, was found dead on the banks of Shockoa creek, in this city, early this morning. The body presented a ghastly spectacle. During the early hours this morning before light was hardly distinct, rats had attacked the ill fated man terribly mutilating the body. The left ear was entirely eaten away, as clearly as if a knife had severed it from the head. He was 54 years of age. Coroner Taylor made a thorough examination of the body later in the day but found no evidence of foul play or injury of any nature. He stated that Mitchell had lain down to sleep and never awoke, alcohol causing a blood vessel on the brain to break. The body was prepared for burial in the afternoon and the funeral will take place tomorrow morning. The interment will be made here.

Roosevelt Gets His Job Back.

Washington, D. C., June 5.—President Roosevelt got back to Washington at 7 o'clock this afternoon. He travelled 14,000 miles and made 275 speeches on his journey. He is well and happy.

BOARD WILL ACT AT ONCE.

We are glad to learn that the board of internal improvements will proceed at once to formulate plans for a system of waterworks. The board of aldermen have wisely appropriated one hundred dollars for the purpose of making experiments with some of the wells in town, in order to determine by the results of these experiments whether a system of gang-wells would furnish the required amount of water for fire, sewerage and household purposes. The board will order these experiments begun at once, and in the event of favorable results will commence the boring of wells in different parts of the town. The board can be depended upon to do everything possible as quickly as possible.

We heartily commend the action of the board of aldermen in appropriating \$50 for the entertainment of Pitt county veterans when they meet here in July. In thus honoring their fathers the gentlemen of the board mark themselves as worthy sons of the men who fared forth to battle for the Lost Cause. Let us cheer them while they are with us, and keep their memory green when they have heard the bugle call to the eternal camping ground.

President Roosevelt says if it had not been for negro troops at Santiago there would have been no Roosevelt. Why will the president keep on discovering bad things about the negro?

Women Witnessed a Lynching.

Greenville, Miss., June 4.—John Dennis, a negro, was lynched here this afternoon by a mob of 200 men. The negro had attempted a criminal assault upon a well known young lady who was returning home from the telephone exchange, where she worked, on Tuesday night last. He was immediately arrested and placed in the local jail.

This afternoon while the streets were crowded with women shoppers a body of two hundred determined men went to the jail and demanded admittance. This was refused and members of the mob secured a railway rail and battered down the door of the prison. Dennis was taken to the telephone exchange and hanged on the cross arm of a telephone pole. Many women witnessed the lynching. The negro only asked time to pray.

50 People Drowned.

Santiago de Chile, June 5.—According to advices received here from Valparaiso, Captain Tood, his wife, fifty of the crew and many of the passengers of the Arequipa were drowned yesterday when that steamer foundered.

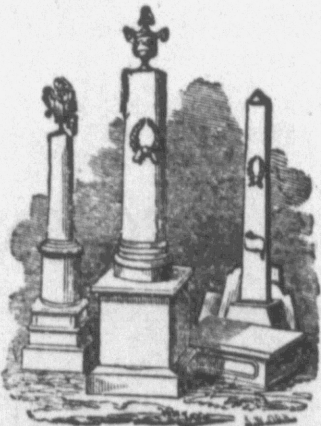
