"Resolved 1., That we the merchants in and around Lucama denounce the American Tobacco Company and hereby agree not to handle their products in any shape or form, until they pay reasonable prices for leaf tobacco, that we will patronize Liipworth, Scales and Company, or some other independent concern.

#### BOYCOTTING THE TRUST.

The retail merchants association of Kinston has taken an advanced step on the question of trust-controlled tobacco, and the outcome will be watched with great interest all over the state and may become a national

The Kinston retailers have declared that they will handle no more tobacco trust goods until the trust begins to pay the tobacco producer something over the cost of production for raw material. The Kinston association is affiliated with the state association of retail groccers and general merchants, a power in the state's commerce. There are associations in every town and city in North Carolina, all affiiliated, and the Kinston association asks all others to join in the boycott against the A. T. Co.

The boycott is a far-reaching weapon when effectively used, and should be resorted to only in cases of extreme necessity, as the present. Every tobacco farmer in the state feels that he is being robbed by the trust, and they are not far from right. The thing has grown so powerful and mighty there is no chance of success in grappling with it single handed. Organization must be met by organization. The Dukes are getting too high. If they do not topple over from their own weight they must be pulled down. So long as any corporation makes money by fair and legitimate means, it should be countenanced as a helpful industry, but when men band together to form cruel and merciless monopolies to wring the last farthing from the people, they and theirs should be plucked up root and branch and cast outside the walls of the commonwealth. The trust will yet come to grief.





THE ACT DIVIDING MURDERS.

Judge Allen Defends the Act Dividing the Crime into Degrees but Suggests Amendments.

As intelligent citizens are advocating the repeal of the act of 1893, dividing murder into two degrees, and as I introduce it in the legislature, I have thought it might be proper to suggest a reason for its passage and retention.

Prior to the act if one man met another and without cause grossly insulted by use of the vilest language known to a man with reference to mother, wife, daughter or Misses Carrie Kinion and Annie the first degree and punishable

Juries knew this was wrong and upon the slightest pretext acquitted as they had no choice between a conviction with the death penalty attached and an acquittal. When the insult was not so great those Miss Margaret, left for Baltimore who served on juries believed there was a distinction between the man who shot and killed face head City Saturday evening and to face upon a sudden quarrel when no blow was struck and the man who shot from behind and from ambush to gratify a revengeful heart. The law made no distinction between the two and said they were both guilty of murder and that the punishment for each was the same-death.

Men who de erved some punish- of price. ment frequently escaped and the administration of the law suffered violators of the law. The cry was raised then, as it is now, that the law was not being enforced and that the people would take the law into their own hands and the act of 1893 was the result.

The act first came before the E. H. Taft returned Saturday Supreme Court for construction in State vs. Fuller, 114 N. C, 885. The Superior Court judge who tried that case charged the jury that "1 remeditation (which is an essential element of murder in the first degree) may be inferred or presumed from the use of a deadly weapon," but the Supreme Court said this was error, and that there must be evidence of premeditation outside of the use of the weapon.

All of the cases in the Supreme Court since then in which it has been held that there was not suffiicient evidence to support a verdict of murder in the first degree are based on the Fuller case. The conditions now are, I submit, as they were before the act of 1893 became a law, and the reason which caused its enactment justi-

If a change should be made I suggest amendment and not repeal, and the evils complained of (with the act has anything to do,) may be remedied by an amendment providing that a killing with a deadly weapon shall be evidence of premeditation and deliberation.
