Colored Boy Pays Death Penalty For His Folly.

There happened here today what might have been expected almost any day during the past several years—a boy getting run over by a train. There seems to be a mania among them for jumping on and off trains around the depot, and oft repeated warnings, and Miss Eula Cox spent Sunday in even the passage of laws prohibiting it, had but little effect in keeping them from the dangerous practice. 
