Negro Brute Hanged.

Roanoke, Va., March 18.-The negro, Henry Williams, whose capture and trial were attended by many sensational features, including the calling out of eighteen companies of millitia to prevent mob violence, was hanged today.

On January 30 last, Williams assulted Mrs. George J. Shields and her 3 year old daughter with a hatchet, razor and pocket knife and lef them for dead. After hacking and fracturing the skulls of his victims with a hatchet, Williams cut Mrs. Shields' throat from ear to ear with a razor and locked her in a clothes closet. He escaped to the coal fields, where he was captured a few days later. He confessed to the crime and was rushed across the state of Virginia on a special train to Richmord. He was brought here for trial on a special train, under escort of more than 1,000 soldiers, and a heavy guard was William Guion, of Newbern, maintained about the court house during the trial.




