GENERAL NEWS.

Thomas H. Woody, one of the wealthiest men in Petersburg, Va. committed suicide Sunday.

The new battleship Virginia was launched at Newport News today with imposing ceremonies.

Three masked men held up a train on the Southern Pacific railway in California, killed the express messenger and robbed the car.

Lightning struck the depot at Lyons, Ga., and set it on fire. The flames spread across the street and destroyed two blocks of buildings.

Commander Warburton of the new battleship, Maine, committed suicide while the vessel was in the harbor at Pensacola, Fla. He shot himself through the brain.

Sidney Johnson Haydon, of Kentucky, jumped from the top window of a twenty-one story building in New York. Nearly every bone in his body was broken.

A "faith curist" at Coolmees who was treating a case of small-pox contracted the disease himself and is in a critical condition. He was taken in hand by the health officers.

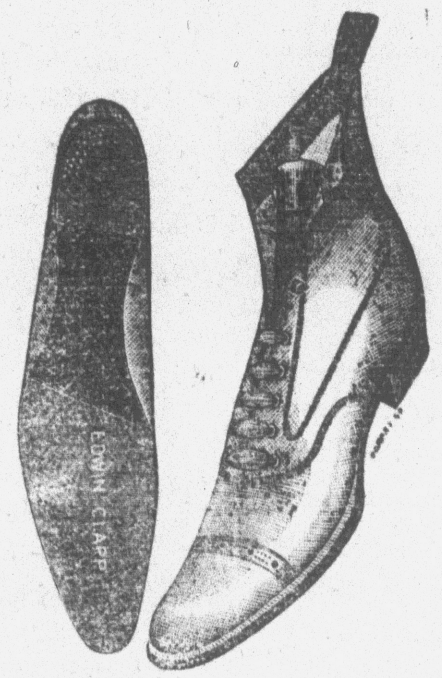

The popularity of Judge Parker as the man whom the democrats should nominate for president grows larger every day.

I. E. Avery, the city editor of the Charlotte Observer, who died suddenly Saturday evening, was to have been married on the 28th of this month to a young lady in Birmingham, Ala.

If there is not a check to the rapidly growing pension list, more people will soon be living off the government than there are at work. You never hear of a government pensioner dying, but more of them keep coming on the roll.

There are now nearly 500 rural mail delivery routes in North Carolina. They grow in popular favor and it is only a question of time when every community will have the benefit of the rural free delivery. The postal department never took a better step than in inaugurating this system.

The catalogue of the A. & M. College, just issued, shows 521 students, as follows: Agriculture 140, civil engineering 74, mechanical engineering 77, chemistry and mining 22, textile industry 42, mechanic arts 73, shop drawing, etc. 18 states represented 7, foreign countries represented 2, counties in North Carolina represented 85.

Hon Patrick Henry Winston, of Spokane, Wash., died suddenly on Sunday. He was a native of Bertie county, this state, moved out West some years ago and more recently established a newspaper at Spokane. He was a brother of Dr. George T. Winston, president of the A. & M. College at Raleigh, and also of ex-Judge Frank D. Winston, of Windsor.

Five hundred dollars a drink sounds high for whiskey, but a Texas jury gave judgment at that rate against a saloon keeper. A woman served written notice on the saloon keeper not to sell her husband any more whiskey. The notice was disregarded and he sold her husband three more drinks. She brought suit against the saloon keeper and got a verdict awarding her \$1,500.

That Colorado man who refused a half interest in an estate of \$1,000,000 left himself and sister by his uncle, on the ground that he wishes nothing he does not earn by his own efforts, acted quite differently from most people of his day and time. We venture the assertion, however, that he will never go to the poor house. No money does a man as much good as that earned by his own industry, and thousands of men have been ruined by falling heir to large sums.

In nearly every case of embezzlement, if you will go to the bottom and find the true cause you will see that it was the result of gambling in one form or another. Of 114 embezzlements in Chicago it was found that nearly every one was preceded by gambling, playing the races or the like.—News and Observer.

A movement has been started in Congress for the relief of tobacco raisers, in a substitute measure suggested by Commissioner Yerkes to take the place of the Gaines bill. By this substitute the internal revenue tax of six cents a pound on leaf tobacco is abolished. The bill has been favorably reported. Mr. Yerkes shaped his bill so as to remove the difficulties in the way of abolishing the tax on the twist, but none on the natural leaf, or "tobacco in the hand," as it is termed. This relief has been sought by the Southern tobacco raisers.—Charlotte Chronicle.



The convention of delegates to the State convention from each congressional district is hereby called to meet in Greensboro at eleven o'clock, June 22, to elect a vice president of the convention, one member of the committees on credentials, rules and order of business, permanent organization, and platform and resolutions; four members of the Democratic State committee, and two delegates and two alternates to the national convention. All Democrats are cordially invited to attend the precinct conventions to be called by the various county committees and participate in electing delegates to the county conventions. 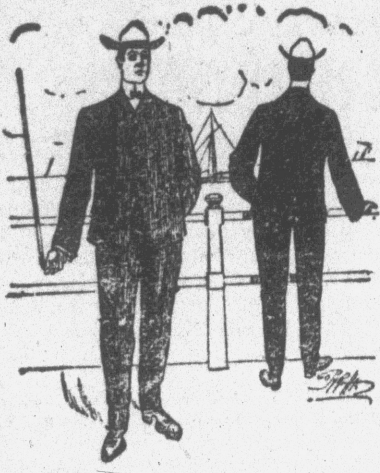

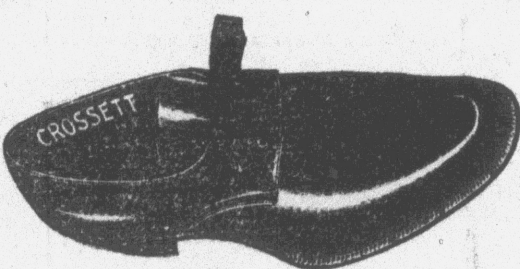
