GREENVILLE DISPENSARY INJUNCTION DISSOLVED.

Judge T. A. McNeil has rendered his decision in the Greenville Dispensary case. The judgment was received this morning by D. C. Moore, clerk superior court. The judgment dissolves the injunction and vacates the restraining order, it reads as follows:

Upon reading the complaint and answer herein used as affidavits, and also the affidavits and exhibits filed by the plaintiffs, and the affidavits in reply thereto and exhibits filed by the defendants, and upon consideration of the same, and after argument of counsel for the plaintiffs in support of the motion to continue the restraining order heretofore granted, to the hearing; and argument by counsel for the defendants in opposition thereto: It is adjudged by the court that the restraining order made on the 2nd day of April, 1904, be and the same is hereby vacated and the injunction dissolved. It is further adjudged that the defendants recover of the plaintiffs the cost of this action, to be taxed by the clerk of this court.

There will be disappointments bye and bye, but aint it funny to see how some folks do shake hands lovingly, and what an interest some people seem to take in the family matters—inquiring after the old woman and children and the "craps," and hundreds of other things only thought of in political years. I could not but notice the number of polite, clever fellows in town last Tuesday to see and be with the "old soldiers," many of them who never smelt powder, but they were nice in paying their respects to the old soldiers. But did you notice how two or three would gather together and talk in a low tone, wink their left eye and nod their head and laugh. Of course nothing was ment by so doing, but—well—the sheriff's office and the treasurer's office won't go running around after some one to hold them down. And then there seems to be a very willing disposition upon the part of some folk in town and in the country too, who are willing; if not very willing, to spend a short vacation in Raleigh next winter under the dome of the Capital. It is a great pity the Democratic party has not an office for everyone. It would be a strong old party if the offices could go round, and then there would be no heartaches and disappointments. This is a great year for patriotism and brotherly love. I have not a complete list of all the several candidates for the several offices, though I have a good size list as has been reported, but ere another week I will have such a goodly quota that I will send you all the names reported up to date and the people can pay their money and take their choice. In fact I reckon it is best to send the names in by installments so as not to crowd the paper all at once. But we may lookout for there are a great many "willing barkisses" More anon. "HICKORY."

The Victorious Japs.

Do not be surprised to hear soon that the Russians have destroyed the forts at Port Arthur and retreated to Mukden, tearing up the railway behind them. They need in the field the large body of troops that is necessary to garrison the forts of that port. Japanese rifles and disease are depleting the Russian army as fast or faster than it can be recruited by daily arrivals over the five thousand miles of railroad.

We have thought all along that Russia would finally overcome the Japanese; that she would conquer through the same means the United States won final victory over the Confederacy—by a wearing out of the resources of the weaker nation. But it begins to appear doubtful as to which is the weaker nation, taking into consideration the seat of war and the facilities each has for concentrating its forces. Russia can assemble many thousand more soldiers than can Japan, but she does not seem to be able to transport them to the scene of conflict or to properly equip for an extensive campaign those she has on the ground. These conditions rob her of a

great deal of physical superiority over Japan and put the two nearer on an equality.

In one thing the Japanese have shown themselves greatly superior to the Russians, and that is in strategy. They have completely out-manoeuvred the Russians in Korea and Manchuria. Also, the Japanese soldier has shown himself to be fully as good a fighter as the Russian, and with more dash and daring in his fighting. As to sea fighting it has been fully demonstrated from the beginning that the Japanese are superior to the Russians.

Along the whole line the Japanese have held their own wonderfully. It now begins to look as if they would drive the Russians out of Manchuria. How long Russia can keep up the war after this is done is mere conjecture. She is already preparing to make a foreign loan of about one hundred and sixty million dollars. Her financial secretary declares that sufficient funds could be secured by loans from home banks, but the government prefers to borrow from abroad. This seems rather peculiar—to drain the country of large sums in payment of interest to foreign bondholders when this money could be kept at home by making local loans. We would say Russia is hard pushed for funds and has exhausted home resources, so is forced to place her securities on a foreign market. The boasted condition of her treasury and of the large sums in home banks which she could get for the asking is a blind to cover a critical financial condition, which will probably be an additional aid to Japan in winning final victory. —Wilmington Messenger.

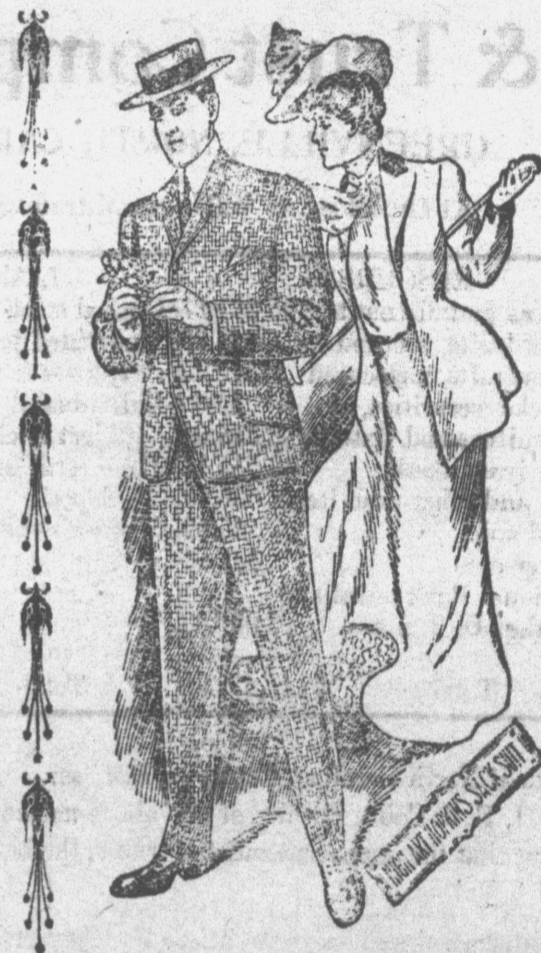

LURING THE TROUT.

Some of the Coaxers Besides a Fly That Anglers Use.

More lies have been told about fly fishing—how many, many anglers have returned to display good creels—"and every fish taken on a fly, sir!" Yes, a fly with the hook tipped with worm. An angler's pleasure is to find out what the trout will take and then supply them. If it is a fly, well and good. It is a clean and workmanlike manner of taking trout. If they will not touch a fly, then perhaps a long cast with a cricket or a moth or a stone fly or gnat or grasshopper or even a beetle may raise the brooding fish.

Perhaps he needs the sparkle of a spinner, perhaps the undulating coil of a humble "barnyard hackle," perhaps the ventral fin of a shiner or of his own kind, perhaps a silvery strip of skin from the neck of a pullet, or he may demand a minnow, or, alas, a mouse. This latter tidbit I have never been able to bring myself to use except when artificial. And no doubt I have lost many a big trout by my squeamishness, but when it comes to using the more highly organized creatures as lures I revolt. Nothing ever disgusted me so much as the spectacle of a huge pike taken on a moorhen.

Often in August, when the water is several degrees hotter on the surface than on the bottom, trout seek the spring holes, and often nothing can induce them to rise through the strata of lukewarm water to take a surface fly. Then your cut and dried angler sniffs, curses his luck and goes home. Yet, a red fly sunk where, through intimate knowledge of the bottom of the lake or river, the angler knows there is a spring will bring the lurking trout springing up with peculiar savagery.—Robert W. Chambers in Harper's Weekly.
