EDITOR REFLECTOR.

Seeing some communications in your paper from parties whom I take it are interested in the affairs of the town government, and especially in the saving in regard to salaries and fees, I take it that they have failed to touch upon the office which receives the largest salary for the office of mayor.

The mayor, I have been informed, gets nearly \$500 a year, when to my mind \$200 is sufficient. I make the assertion that there are good men in the town who will make as good mayor as we have ever had—and the town has had and now has as good mayor as there is in the state of North Carolina. For instance, there is Mr. C. D. Reuntee, who has been a justice of the peace for the last several years and tries nearly all the magistrate cases here in Greenville, and his fees will not exceed \$200. Now I do not know whether he would have the mayors office or not, but I think with his J. P. office he would accept the mayor's office for at least half that is now paid.

Mr. Rountree is no more my choice than any other man. I merely call his name because he is qualified in every respect and would fill the office to the letter of the law. If you are after economy go to the office that can best afford to be reduced. CITIZEN.

T. D. Mears Appointed Receiver of A. & N. C. R. R.

Raleigh N. C. May 28.—A temporary receivership was to-day granted by Judge Purnell in the Federal court in the case against the Atlantic and North Carolina railroad, two-thirds of which belong to the state.

The first receivership, made some months ago, with V. E. McBee as receiver was vacated by Judge Simonton, and to-day Thomas D. Mears, of Wilmington, formerly the agent of the Seaboard Air Line at Wilmington, was named as temporary receiver.

Judge Purnell in his order announces that if the state in the meantime has an offer to lease the road, which is considered a safe one, he will vacate the receivership, if he approved the lease as a safe one.

EDITOR DANIELS ARRAIGNED.

Editor Josephus Daniels, of the Raleigh News and Observer, was arraigned before the Federal court in Raleigh, this morning, upon a rule of contempt issued by Judge Purnell. This was because of the editorial comments of the News and Observer on Sunday of the appointment by Judge Purnell of a receiver of the Atlantic & North Carolina railroad.

This action against Mr. Daniels has aroused much indignation throughout the state and it is regarded as an outrage. The outcome of it will be watched with interest.

North Carolina is surely making history.

Maybe some folks will hesitate before they make affidavits next time.

If Judge Peebles should by some technicality get all the lawyers and all the affiants in jail, it would not raise him in public opinion.

Judge Peebles has so far missed it on the lawyers, but he caught some of the fellows who made affidavits on the side of the lawyers.

About this time of year a feeling of poverty seizes the people and there is a wonderful shrinkage in value of possessions. Tax listing time.

Mr. Cleveland has expressed the belief that Judge Parker will be the democratic nominee for president, though it is coupled with the opinion that Mr. Olney or Judge Gray might have proved the strongest candidate.

"A contemporary tells of a man who worked and slaved during half a century to lay up money. He denied himself practically all the pleasures and comforts of life during these fifty years and died a rich man. All his wealth went to a son who ran through the whole of it in one year. If there's any moral to this story it is that the man who makes the money had better enjoy some of it as he passes along, for he'll take none with him and can't tell how it will go after he is dead." The foregoing paragraph is from an unremembered contemporary—The Montgomery Advertiser, we think. There is a lot of worldly wisdom in it. "Surely every man walketh in a vain shew," said David the psalmist. "Surely they are disquieted in vain: he heapeth up riches, and knoweth not who shall gather them." It were wiser of the heaper-up if he got some pleasure of them himself—Charlotte Observer.

There were 61,160 divorces granted in the United States in the year 1901—an actual increase of 6 per cent, over the preceding year. In 1903, the number is given at 68,499. This is a disgrace to any half-civilized country on the globe. It is thus seen that our courts broke up in 1903, nearly 70,000 families. It is absolutely un-Christian and even barbaric. It is to be sincerely desired that the next Legislature to meet shall undo the terrible mischief and wipe out the disgrace that fell upon the last two Legislatures by their low-down divorce laws. Let a clean sweep be made. It is to be hoped that the Christian course of the people will antagonize every candidate who does not promise them openly to vote for a repeal of the present vicious, degrading, lust provoking divorce laws, and adopt a substitute based upon God's eternal law. South Carolina sets an excellent moral example in allowing no divorce at all. But it would be wise and prudent to adopt God's own standard. In 60 cities in the United States in 1901, there were 6,998 divorces granted. Let conservative, law-abiding North Carolina repeal all laws that fight against God, and have laws adopted that make for peace, morality, decency and righteousness. How many divorces were there in our State last year and in 1902?—Dr. T. B. Kingbury.

If the democracy does not win this year it will be because of a house divided against itself, not because of the strength of the opposition.—Atlantw Constitution.

A FAMOUS CONSPIRACY.
 The Plot to Liberate Marie Antoinette and Her Children.
 After King Louis XVI. had been guillotined at the time of the French revolution a bold plot was formed by a few royalists to liberate Queen Marie Antoinette, her two young children and Mme. Elizabeth, the king's sister. These conspirators in chief were a curiously assorted trio. First in rank comes the Chevalier de Jarjayes, who had married one of Marie Antoinette's ladies in waiting, a shrewd and experienced soldier. The second and third of the chief partners in the scheme were jailers of the queen, Toulan and Lepitre. Toulan, once a book and music seller in Paris, was now a member of the commune, an indefatigable, gay, resourceful Gascon, honestly republican by conviction, but with a redhot Gascon heart for a woman in danger and distress. Lepitre was a schoolmaster and rhetorician. He had a seat on the provisional committee, and, more important by far to the interests of the conspiracy, he was president of the passports committee and could furnish the necessary passes.
 A very likely plan had been elaborated. On a dark night of winter, Toulan and Lepitre being in charge of the prison, the queen and Mme. Elizabeth, disguised as municipal officials, were simply to walk out of the gate, as Louis Napoleon, in his carpenter's clothes, walked out of the chateau of Ham. The little Mme. Royale was to be dressed like the child of the prison lamplighter, and a loyal kitchen boy was to carry in a basket the small Louis XVII. Jarjayes would have three cabs in readiness, and the fugitives were to make for the coast of Normandy, where an English boat would stay for them. The scheme offered very considerable difficulties, but they were not insurmountable.
 But the poor queen's luck was cold. Lepitre, a romantic coward, failed her when the time came to furnish the passports. One other chance was left. De Jarjayes and Toulan, doubly strong in their devotion after the defection of Lepitre, planned an escape for Marie Antoinette alone, but she would not leave her children. "It has been a beautiful dream," she wrote to Jarjayes. It was the last dream of liberty that she had.
