When informed that Judge Parnell's order had come after his own, he proceeded to decide the matter on the writ of habeas corpus, thereby rendering entirely void and invalid the last order of Judge Purnell.

This action on the part of Judge Pritchard, which was his first official act after becoming circut judge, wins him the highest praise of the people of North Carolina.


