Mule Falls Into a Well.

Robert Green, near Boiling Springs, had a mule to fall into a well fifty feet deep Wednesday evening and it was rescued a few hours later unhurt. Mr. Green was ploughing near the open well. His plough "hitched" on something which jerked the mule backward. As it started downward the hame-string broke, stripping it of all of its harness except the collar, and it fell to the bottom of the well. It appeared to be unhurt, and Mr. Green secured a block and tackle appliance and by the aid of some neighbors the mule was rescued a few hours later unhurt.—Charlotte Observer.

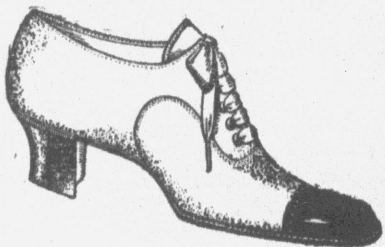

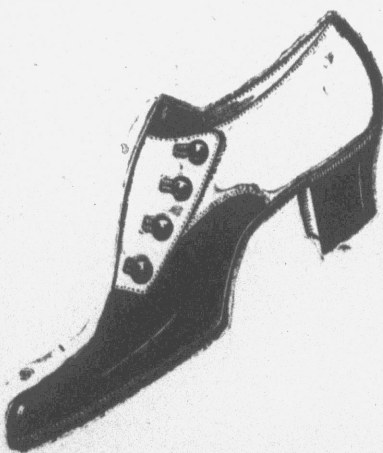
