Reported for Reflector.] The biggest day Washington has ever seen through any organization was Monday when the Improved Order of Red Men gave a grand celebration with a magnificent street parade.

At 3.30 o'clock the line of march was formed on Market street at one of the old tobacco warehouses, consisting of carriages buggies, wagons floats, bicyles and mounted Indians on horses all beautifully decorated for the occasion in brilliant colors of green, red, brown and yellow to match the uniforms worn by the Indians, squaws, and pappooses. There was something like seven hundred and fifty in the parade which was fully a mile in length. The floats carried the lovely squaws and pretty pappooses while the other vehicles carried the men. In the center of the parade was a beautful float carrying the Goddess of Liberty seated on a high pinnacle with four iquaws seated at her feet and one of the military boys at each corner as guarde, while Uncle Sam was seated on the front.

At 8.30 o'clock the tribe again assembled at the wigwam and proceeded to chase a pale face down First street where the stake was planted where the burning of the pale face was conducted and the old time war dance and war whoop was proceeded with. After all proceeded to the armory where refreshments were served, and all enjoyed themselves to a very late hour which ended in a big dance. The Washington band furnished music for the occasion. and as a whole it was one of the finest celebrations the writer has ever had the pleasure of witness-
