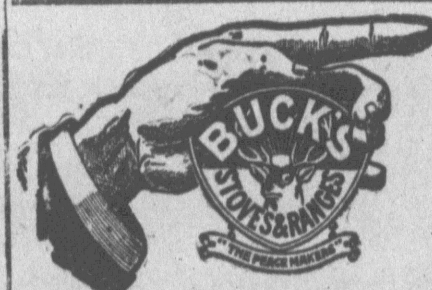

THE WATTS LAW BEING MISREPRESENTED.

There is much wilful misrepresentation about the Watts law being spread throughout the county. These misrepresentations are circulated through selfish motives, by persons who are either agents of the saloons or who are trying to poison the minds of the people in the hope of getting themselves into office. They are telling among other things that under the provisions of the Watts law the county at large is deprived of all the benefits derived from retail liquor licenses, and that the law was enacted solely for the benefit of the towns at the expense of the country. Why thoughtful people will for a moment believe such malicious misrepresentations we are at a loss to understand.

Sifted down the Watts law means simply this: It means that the people of the country are spared from having whiskey saloons placed close to their homes with no protection around them, but confines the saloons to the towns where there is police protection. At this every person living outside a town ought to rejoice, for we do not believe any man who has proper respect for himself and his family wants a whiskey shop with its evil influences run in the vicinity of his home.

The Watts law also means that while the sale of whiskey is confined to the towns the people of any town shall have the right to say whether their town shall have saloons, a dispensary or prohibition. Wherever a dispensary is established the law provides that one-half the net proceeds shall go to the county and one-half to the town. And the town has to bear all the burden of police protection.

Now what is the result as to Greenville and the county? Heretofore Greenville has had eleven saloons. The greatest benefit the county ever got in any year from the license paid by these saloons is \$2,200. Compare this with the benefit the county will derive by Greenville having a dispensary instead of eleven saloons. It has been estimated by some that the profits arising from the dispensary will be \$30,000 a year. If that is true the town will get \$15,000 of it and the county \$15,000 against the \$2,200 received from the saloons.

Some argue that that estimate is too high. Admit that it is, and say that the dispensary profits amount to only \$20,000 a year, then the county's half would be \$10,000 against \$2,200 from saloons. Or, to illustrate further, say, for argument sake, that the dispensary profits do not go above \$10,000, then the county would get \$5,000 where it got only \$2,200 from saloons. Even if the dispensary should net only \$10,000 a year, and nobody believes the figures will be that low, the county will get half of it which is more than double what it got out of the saloons.

Look at Kinston, the capital of our neighboring county. A dispensary has been in operation there just six months, and the Free Press says the profits for the six months amounted to \$6,242.83. That paper

also says it is believed the profits for the next six months will be much larger from the fact that fall trade is much greater than spring trade.

So away with all this misrepresentation that is heard. It is time that people were thinking for themselves and not listening to the falsehoods told by the place hunters. The Watts law is of greater benefit in every way to the country than to the towns and is one of the best laws that have been enacted.

ministration, and would call attention to the fulfillment of the former promises of the party to provide at least a four months' school term for all the children of the State. And we further express our cordial commendation of the work of the teaching profession for the mental, moral, and material advancement of the people, and pledge for the future our best endeavors to strengthen and increase the usefulness and efficiency of our whole public educational system.

TEMPERANCE.

We approve the general principles of the Watts law regulating the manufacture and sale of liquors and limiting the same to localities in which there may be adequate police protection. The principle that no saloon or still shall operate except under police protection is as sound as that whiskey shall not be sold to minors, to drunkards, or on Sundays, or near schools and churches. The General Assembly has the power, and when controlled by the Democratic party, can be trusted to make all amendments that experience or conditions may demonstrate may be wise and proper.

THE STATE PRISON

The contrast between the present and preceding administration of the State prison speaks trumpet-tongued of Democratic efficiency and Republican rascality and ineptitude. In all the history of the State the lowest level of immorality, venality, and inhumanity was reached in the management of the State convicts under the administration of Daniel L. Russell. Today the institution is free from debt and has on hand a surplus large enough to pay the bonds necessitated by Republican speculation and inefficiency. We pledge the party to continued business like and humane management of this institution.

INSURANCE DEPARTMENT

We call attention to the success that has attended the establishment of the Insurance Department which has increased our annual receipts by \$90,000, and furthermore, in addition to this increase that fees now received by the State in this department which formerly were allowed to the official collecting them, are more than enough to cover all increases and additions in salaries of executive and judicial officers.

TAXATION

We pledge the party to a fair and just system of taxation in which all subjects of taxation shall bear their just and equal proportion of the burdens of government.


