#### TOWN MATTERS.

As Transacted by the Aldermen.

The board of aldermen were in regular monthly session Thursday night, six of the members being present, two out of town. Considerable business was transacted, the meeting continuing until nearly midnight.

The street committee recommended that Dickinson avenue be made a uniform width of 49 1-2 feet, but action on the recommendation was deferred to a special meeting to be called to consider the matter.

Aldermen Carr and Moye were appointed a committee to arrange for the proper care of record books and papers belonging to the town.

The following ordinance was adopted:

"The board of aldermen of the town of Greenville do enact.

"Section 1. That it shall be unlawful for any person, persons or corporation to manufacture any spirituous, vinous or malt liquors within the corporate limits of the town of Greenville, unless said person, or persons or corporation shall first obtain a license to do so in the manner herein described.

Section 2. That any person, or persons or corporation applying for license to manufacture spirituous, vinous or malt liquors, within said town shall make their application in writing and under oath and they shall set out.

(1) The place where the manufacturing plant is or is to be located.

(2) The daily capacity of the distillery or manufacturing plant.

(3) The owners, including the names of all the parties in interest

(4) The number and names of all employees connected with the plant and the duties of each.

Section 3. That such person, persons or corporation upon obtaining an order from the board shall pay to the tax collector, before obtaining such license, a license tax of three hundred dollars for the privilege of operating such distillery from the time of issuing such license, to the first day of the succeeding January or July as the case may be, and all license shall expire on the first day of January or July next after they are issued.

Section 4. That it shall be unlawful for any person, persons or corporation to sell contrary to law, or give away within the corporate limits of said town any of the spirituous vinous or malt liquors made at such distillery.

Section 5. That any person, persons or corporation found guilty of violating the provisions of this ordinance shall be fined fifty dollars for each and every offense.

Section 6. That this ordinance shall be in force from and after its passage.

A uniform was ordered purchased for J. G. Rieves, assistant police, and Aldermen Moye was appointed a committee to purchase it.

Albert Williams was elected teamster at a salary of \$22.50 per month.

Ferd Barnhill was elected foreman of the street hands at a salary of \$1 per day for each day in service.

Joseph Moore was elected lamp lighter and janitor at a salary of 25 per month.

Chas. Cobb was re-elected trustee of the graded school and D. C. Moore was elected to succeed J. E. Nobles.

The salaries of officers were fixed as follows:

Mayor, \$300 per year.

Clerk, \$100 per year.

Tax Collector, \$600 per year.

Treasurer, \$250 per year.

Chief Police, \$50 per month.

Assistant and Night Police, \$40 each per month.

City Attorney, \$100 per year.

C. D. Rountree, tax collector, tendered his official bond in the sum of \$6,000 which was approved and accepted.

Special license taxes were levied. In most instances these taxes remain the same as heretofore.

The old market house was ordered closed and no longer used for market purposes.

A few accounts were allowed.

#### THE PLATFORM.

Adopted by the Democratic State Convention.

(CONTINUED FROM YESTERDAY)

TRUSTS DOMINATE THE REPUBLICAN PARTY.

For the last eight years the Republican party has been in complete control of the Federal Government in all of its branches. During that time trusts and monopolies have multiplied. They have increased their extortions from the people. They dominate the Republican party and compel it to administer the affairs of the republic in their selfish interest.

We condemn the President for his surrender to trust influences and for his failure to enforce the law against monopolies and monopolists. Congress appropriated \$500,000.00 to employ special counsel to enforce the laws against trusts.

In twelve months he expended for such purpose only one twelfth of that sum. In the midst of crime and havoc committed by these wrong-doers he will not stop the violation of statutes enacted for the protection of the people, nor punish the criminals who plunder them, although his attention was called to the manner in which the perpetrators might be punished by recent decisions of the supreme court.

#### THE TARIFF.

We denounce the present iniquitous, unjust, and trust-creating protective tariff, imposed upon the people by the Republican party, and demand its immediate revision, to the end that all unjust burdens shall be removed, and especially upon those of the necessities of life and those that enable the trusts to extort from the people unreasonable profits, and to sell their products to consumers at home at greater prices than are charged for the same goods to the foreign consumer.

#### CENTRALIZATION.

We view with alarm the growing tendency of the government under Republican administrations toward despotic centralization at home as well as despotic imperialism abroad. We denounce the policy of the Republican party in building up a strong centralized government at Washington at the expense of the sacred rights of the sovereign States, which in its policy and conduct has reversed the clause of the Constitution reserving to the States all rights not specifically conferred upon the Federal Government, and has assumed for the central government at Washington the vast residuum of power guaranteed to the people by the constitution. The inevitable consequence of this policy and practice will be the destruction of popular government and the establishment of a military empire.

Confidently relying upon these fundamental principles of government, and appealing to the record of our party in the past, we invite all who believe in popular liberty, popular education, popular government, and white supremacy, in freedom both at home and abroad, in honesty, efficiency, simplicity, and economy of administration, in the removal of monopolies and oppressions under whatever guise and by whomever practiced, to unite with us in maintaining in North Carolina Democratic rule and in destroying Republican misrule in the United States.

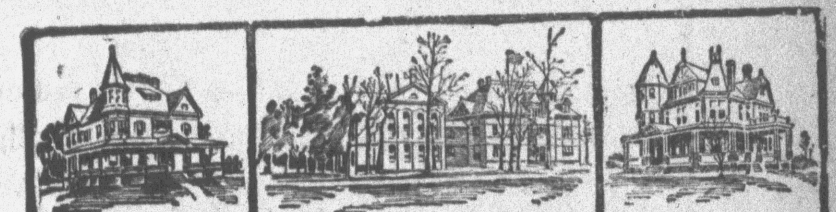

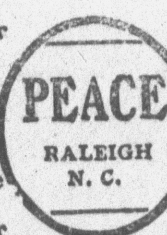

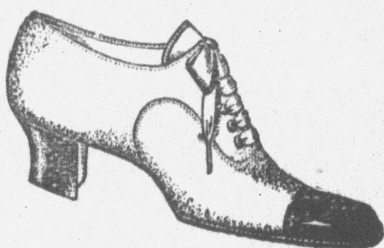
