COUNTY MATTERS.

As Transacted by the Commissioners.

The board of county commissioners held their regular meeting on the 4th and 5th all the members being present.

The usual orders for paupers and claims for current expenses of the county were issued.

The monthly report of the treasurer was presented and approved.

The following additions were made to pauper list to receive monthly the amount stated: Pennie Burney \$1, Margaret Vines \$1, Jane Lovit \$1, Fannie Tripp \$1, C. C. Cose \$1.50, Titus Elks \$1, Louisa Vick \$1.

The following were released from poll tax for the year 1903: Wyatt Clark, J. H. Monbr, Nemer Stanley, Wm. Hayes.

L. W. Moore was granted free peddlers license.

Retail liquor license were granted to seventeen applicants.

L. I. Moore, attorney, filed a protest against issuing retail liquor license at Pactolus.

A final settlement was made with the sheriff for the taxes for 1903.

A. L. Blow, county attorney, tendered his resignation.

Parker on First Ballot.

St. Louis, Mo., July 9.—Judge Alton B. Parker was unanimously nominated for president at 5 o'clock this morning after an all night session of the convention. All the states except Idaho and Nevada cast their votes for him on roll call, and these states changed to him before the ballot was announced.

ILLEGAL DISPENSARY CLOSED.

Pending the Hearing of the Matter.

At noon today S. T. Hooker, W. B. Greene and B. L. Smith commissioners, Z. V. Hooker, manager and J. M. Reuss, assistant manager, who have been conducting an illegal dispensary here for the past week, were arraigned on a bench warrant before Hon. H. G. Connor, Associate Justice of the Supreme Court. Justice Connor issued the bench warrant and made it returnable here today before Judge George H. Brown, Jr. Learning Friday that Judge Brown could not be here, Justice Connor came himself to try the case.

When the case was called F. G. James and J. L. Fleming, appearing for some of the defendants, asked for a continuance on the ground that all of the defendants did not have counsel and they had been depending on Col. Skinner and Col. Argo to arrange the case.

Solicitor L. I. Moore appeared for the state, F. C. Harding and ex-Gov. Jarvis for the town. These wanted the matter settled and a proper construction of the law on the question.

Justice Connor suggested that the evidence be heard today, and that another day and place could be set for hearing the argument of counsel. This suggestion was agreed to, the defendants in the meantime to close the dispensary (they have been running and not sell any whiskey while the matter is pending).

Court then took recess until 4 o'clock p. m. to begin hearing the evidence.

Carrier Pigeons Liberated.

This morning a few minutes past 6 o'clock a coop of 24 carrier pigeons were liberated on the square in front of the court house. The pigeons came by express Friday evening from the Manhattan Pigeon Club, Patterson, N. J., to the express agent here with instructions to liberate them at 6 o'clock this morning. As soon as liberated the pigeons flew in a northwest direction until they had cleared the town, when they circled around a few times as if to get their bearings then took a direct northeast course and soon disappeared. Quite a crowd of people gathered to see the birds start.

Where are the 2x4 constitutional expounders?

The Raleigh dispensary cleared \$12,500 in the last three months.

We hope Wilmington and Greensboro will do as well in their coming anti-saloon elections as did Charlotte and New Bern.

A week brings notable changes. For example, take the difference in the Greenville dispensary situation a week ago and now.

When men set themselves up to be greater than the law and openly defy it, they may expect to be overtaken by the strong arm of justice.

The saloons in Greenville have been closed a week yet the change for the better in the moral tone of the town is so pronounced as to be the subject of general comment.

The United States District Attorney was not in evidence with his authority from "higher up," and his office blinded lieutenants were not equal to the occasion, hence those whom they had advised into trouble had the bag to hold.

A Black Jack democrat gives our readers a timely article today. There are many who, like him, will see the dispensary matter in its true light when they stop listening to the falsehoods being circulated for political purposes.

Must be something in those 5 o'clock a. m. nominations. Glenn was nominated for governor at 5 o'clock after an all night convention and Parker was nominated for president at 5 o'clock after an all night convention. Both of them will be elected.

WHY THE DISPENSARY IS BEST.

BLACK JACK, N. C., JULY 7, 1904.
EDITOR REFLECTOR:

We plain country people down here have been very much disturbed over the many reports that have been circulated by the friends of the saloons, or we might more properly say the enemies of the dispensary in Greenville. We have been told that it was a blow at the rights of the plain country people; that one half of the taxes from the bars went into the county school fund but that all the profits from the dispensary went into the town school fund. It very naturally worried us to feel that our democratic legislators would make any changes that would take from our already too scanty school fund. This report has gone broadcast over our section, and a great many have become embittered against the dispensary and lukewarm to the democratic party for allowing it.

We plain country folks realize while the largest per cent of us are poor in purse that we are the possessors of as much patriotism and integrity as any other class. That when the country needs protection from the enemy no other class furnishes the same number of men and

quantity of supplies. We naturally ask ourselves why our democratic representatives allowed such injustice done us? Upon inquiry of those learned in the laws, placing our grievances before them, they explain by telling us that we have been lied to by wholesale. That the profits from the dispensary is equally divided between the county school fund and the town school fund. They tell us if the dispensary pays here as it does in other towns like Kinston, Wilson, Henderson, Louisburg, Clayton and Raleigh, that instead of our getting eleven hundred dollars from the bars for the town and eleven hundred for the county, we will get five thousand for the county schools and five thousand for the graded schools of the town from the dispensary. What fool had not rather have five thousand dollars than eleven hundred?

Further we are told that the judges and solicitors of state superior courts say that the dispensary system has lessened crime in those counties where it has had a fair trial one half. Is this not an item for the taxpayers to consider? If it lessens crime one-half will it not lessen our court costs? Unquestionably so. Our Black Jack folks know that a good part of our January court was consumed in the trial of one drunken boy for the killing of another drunken boy. We see that a good part of our next September court will be consumed in the trial of another murder case where whiskey was the cause.

But a short while since we were told that one of our ablest superior court judges said that he had always been opposed to a dispensary and prohibition until lately that he had noticed the great decrease of crime in the dispensary counties and had become convinced that it was the best solution of the whiskey question far better than prohibition, that in a county with open saloons it took him eight days to get through with the state docket that in the adjoining county with more inhabitants with a dispensary it took him only 3 days.

I am sorry our whiskey friends have made this effort to deceive and mislead the people. They fail to recollect that the rebound of a lie always hurts the fellow that tells it and helps the fellow that it is intended to harm, especially when there is four months time to develop the lie in.

Before I found out the real truths of these statements I was alarmed for the welfare of the democratic party, the only party for the decent element in the South to affiliate with, but alas! when the truth is found out, I cannot but believe it will help us. No person or party has ever yet been injured by the passage of laws that improve the morals of the country.

If the dispensary lessens crime as our judges and solicitors say it does and thereby decreases taxes, and the profits from it trebles the taxes derived from the open saloon and in this way gives us three dollars for educational purposes when we get one, how can any good citizen object to it? It will be a sad day when our people prefer ignorance whiskey and vice to schools and morality.

We are told that Kinston reports for the first six months profits six thousand against three thousand for the entire year from saloons, Wilson, Louisburg, Clayton and Raleigh have done better. If this is true Pitt will do as well when all the obstacles are removed that have been placed there by its enemies to prevent its success.

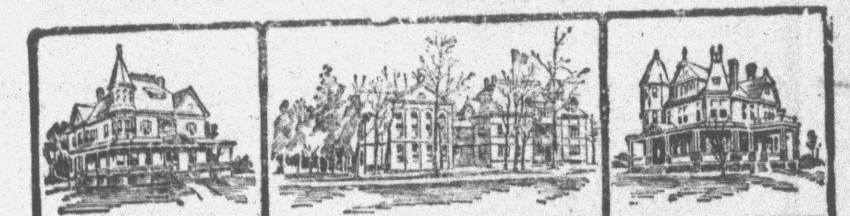

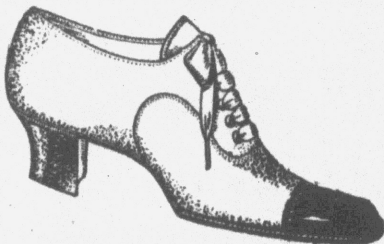
