ILLEGAL DISPENSARY ABANDONED.

The Commissioners Make Overtures to Quit.

The board of aldermen held a special meeting Monday afternoon to officially receive and consider a letter from the commissioners who have been conducting the illegal dispensary on Five Points. Mayor postem J. B. Moye presided over the meeting and five other members of the board were present.

The letter received was follows: GREENVILLE, N. C., July 11, 1904. To the Board of Aldermen:

We the undersigned hereby resign, relinquish and abandon any right or claim of right which we may have or claim to have to run and operate a dispensary in the town of Greenville on condition that the criminal prosecutions against us be abandoned.

We were advised that we had the legal authority to open and operate the dispensary and acting upon this advice which we believed to be correct we have attempted to do so. It was not our purpose, as some have charged, to defy the law of the state or town. Without waiting to have the question involved settled in the courts we have concluded, for the sake of peace in the town, to abandon the further assertion of our claim to operate a dispensary if your body for like reasons will abandon the prosecution.

The board accepted this offer and directed that the following communication be sent to the parties:

To S. T. Hooker, W. B. Greene and R. L. Smith:

The board of aldermen of the town of Greenville have received yours of this date, abandoning your claim of right to operate a dispensary in the town of Greenville, and have ordered this communication to be spread upon the minutes of this board; and in reply thereto this board accepts the conditions upon which you make this tender.

We have requested the mayor not to send up to the Superior court any of the warrants issued by him against you and we have instructed our attorney to take the proper steps to see that all prosecutions against you by the town growing out of this matter referred to in your communication shall be ended.

The board takes this course because it believes that it will tend to restore peace to the community.

At this special meeting the board received and accepted a \$2,000 temporary bond given by H. L. Carr, treasurer, and the former treasurer was ordered to turn over the office to him.

An order was passed reducing the license tax on distilleries, passed at a former meeting, from \$300 for six months to \$200.

An application from Fred Cox for license to operate a distillery was granted.

Prof. S. D. Bagley Dead.

Mr. W. B. Wilson received a telephone message from Mildred, Monday afternoon, announcing the death of Prof. S. D. Bagley. The remains will be brought to Greenville on the train this evening and the burial will take place in Cherry Hill cemetery immediately after the arrival of the train.

Prof. Bagley once lived in Greenville and taught school here several years. He had many friends among our people.

THE MATTER SETTLED.

The dispensary muddle that has existed here for some days has been settled. From the standpoint of stopping the strife and restoring peace to the community all are glad that the controversy has come to a close but there are many who do not approve the terms of the compromise. The men who engaged in conducting an illegal dispensary went at the business with their eyes open, knowing full well how the Watts law read on the subject, and having been warned that they were acting contrary to law. Having defiantly resisted the efforts of the town authorities to make them close their illegal business until a higher court interposed and stopped them, there are not a few who think they should meet the consequences of such conduct. The board of aldermen held an opposite view, however, which was also advised by many others, and accepted the proposition made by the other side to abandon their position, deeming this the best and quickest step to restore peace.

As the matter is thus settled, further argument over it can accomplish no good. Though there may be different opinions, it is perhaps best under the circumstances to put these aside and let the contentions end. Taking issue with it now can do no good.

The action of the aldermen in withdrawing the prosecutions only affects the matter so far as the town is concerned. The bench warrants are already before the state court and will have to be determined there. The solicitor for the state had no part whatever in the compromise.

Odd Power of Russian Miss.

An account of a phenomenon observed in a girl of 12 residing at Vladikavka, in the Caucasus, has been communicated to the Nove Vremya.

The girl is the daughter of a workman named Luba, says the Chicago Inter Ocean. It is stated that every object which she approaches begins to move. If she goes near a dresser with plates upon it they begin to dance, washing hung on a line flies off it, a bottle standing on a table is raised in the air, and, falling down, is broken in pieces, and stones lying on the ground leap in the air and fall again.

The girl is perfectly healthy, and laughs at the occurrences called forth on her appearance. No one can explain them, although a number of doctors and professors of physical science have been consulted. At present money is being collected to send the child to St. Petersburg in order that her marvelous magnetic powers may be examined by medical authorities.—Ex.

The most beautiful volume in the congressional library at Washington is a Bible which was transcribed on parchment by a monk in the Sixteenth century. The general lettering is in the German text, each letter is perfect, and there is not a scratch or blot from lid to lid.
