#### Two Hundred Lost.

Manila, July 13.—A cloudburst over the hills northeast of Manila caused a flood which has destroyed San Juan Del Monte. Two hundred lives were lost. The low-lying districts were inundated. The homes of Americans and foreigners are isolated. Transportation through the streets is carried on in boats only. Rain has fallen for 27 hours, totalling 17 1-5 inches. This is unprecedented. Communication with outside places is interrupted.

The damage to property is estimated at \$2,000,000.

#### Fire Sweeps Business Section of Millington.

Millington, Md. July 13.—The entire business section of this town was swept by fire yesterday afternoon, entailing a loss of two hundred thousand dollars. The fire started in a blacksmith shop and in fifteen minutes had spread to a dozen other buildings.

Fifty buildings have been destroyed. A dispatch from Wilmington, Del., says the mayor there has started a subscription for the relief of the sufferers.

#### Japanese Losses Small.

London, July 13.—Baron Hayashi, the Japanese minister, issues an official report on the losses by the Japanese during the fight for the occupation of Kai Chow. The report shows that the losses are remarkably small for so fierce an engagement. The casualties altogether in four days' fighting were 174 killed or wounded.

#### Married.

At 7:30 o'clock this morning at the home of Mr. and Mrs. W. H. McGowan, in South Greenville, their sister, Miss Mollie Leggett and Mr. T. H. Smith, both of Farmville, were married by Rev. W. E. Powell. The couple left on the morning train for a trip north.

#### Will Not Stay Vacant.

Several of the buildings in town formerly occupied as barroom, have already been engaged for other business. It will not be long before all are occupied.

#### Japs Take Fort 14.

Chefoo, July 13.—A Frenchman who arrived from Port Arthur says the Japanese took Fort 14 on July 7th.

Parker grows and grows, but does not say much about it.

Judge Parker starts out to be right first, and then be president.

It is time for the falsehoods about the Watts law to stop. The people are learning the truth.

The Atlantic Hotel at Morehead City is enjoying its old time popularity this season. There is not a more delightful summer resort any where and people are there in large numbers.

Another cut in the wages of Massachusetts mill operatives, in which 25,000 employees are affected, is further evidence of the prosperous times laborers are enjoying under republican dispensation.

The eaters of Western meat may expect to pay more for it than even the high prices that have prevailed for sometime. Forty five thousand employees in the large packing houses are out on a strike.

Judge Witt, of Richmond, takes the right view in imposing sentences. A negro who was a high school graduate was before him on the charge of forging and pleaded guilty. The judge, in pronouncing sentence, said that the prisoner was intelligent and educated and was therefore setting a bad example for the race. He was given ten years in the penitentiary, which was full punishment for the crime.

Mr. Bryan has given out a lengthy statement in which he declares he will support the nominees of the national democratic convention, Parker and Davis. In his statement he pointed out certain views of Judge Parker with which he did not agree, but says, "Judge Parker stands for enough things that are good to justify me in giving him my vote."

Mr. Bryan concludes his statement by saying:

"After having stated that I shall support the ticket and after having given my reasons for so doing, I think it due to the democrats of the nation to say that while the fight on economic questions is postponed, it is not abandoned. As soon as the election is over I shall, with the help of those who believe as I do, organize for the campaign of 1908, the object being to marshal the friends of popular government within the democratic party to the support of a radical and progressive policy, to make the democratic party an efficient means in the hands of the people for securing relief from the plutocratic element that controls the republican party and for the time being is in the control of the democratic party. This plan of organization will be elaborated soon."

## Organize Tobacco Growers of Three States.

Tobacco planters from North Carolina, Virginia and Kentucky are planning for a convention to be held in Lynchburg next October for the purpose of thoroughly discussing the tobacco situation and considering the various plans of securing the co-operation of tobacco planters throughout these States in an effort to obtain and maintain profitable prices for tobacco. North Carolina will endeavor to have delegates in attendance from every county in the tobacco sections, and members from the various organizations.

This meeting will be the culmination of the plans of the Tobacco Growers' Association of Virginia to organize the growers of the three States of the great tobacco belt into a solid association, so as to control the prices of tobacco.—Raleigh Times.

The New York Times is authority for the statement that Mrs. Ida Shrouds Flagler, the divorced wife of Henry M. Flagler, of the Standard Oil Company, is living in New York, and is said to be almost entirely recovered in health, although she is still under the care of a physician. For almost a month she has occupied a fine brick house at 353 Riverside avenue. Living in the house with her are Dr. Carlos F. MacDonald, the alienist, who has been caring for Mrs. Flagler since she first became ill; Mrs. MacDonald, a companion for Mrs. Flagler, two trained nurses, and a housekeeper. Henry M. Flagler secured a divorce from Mrs. Flagler in Florida in 1901 under the provision of law which had been passed a short time before by the Florida Legislature, and which made insanity a cause for divorce. Although her physician will not make a statement of the condition of the patient, what the neighbors in the Riverside Drive district have observed of Mrs. Flagler leads to the belief that she is almost cured. The implied fact that Mrs. Flagler is soon to become sane, lends additional interest to this celebrated case. The question occurs to us, would it not be more merciful for her to go to her grave without ever having waked to a realization of what has taken place since her reason fled?—Charlotte Chronicle.

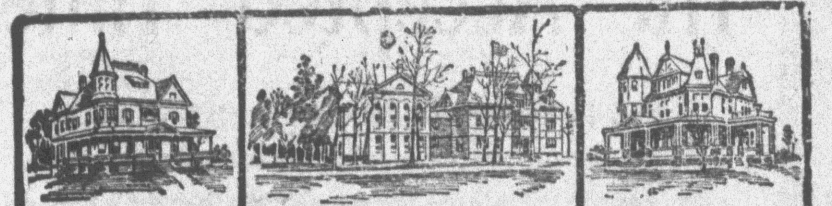

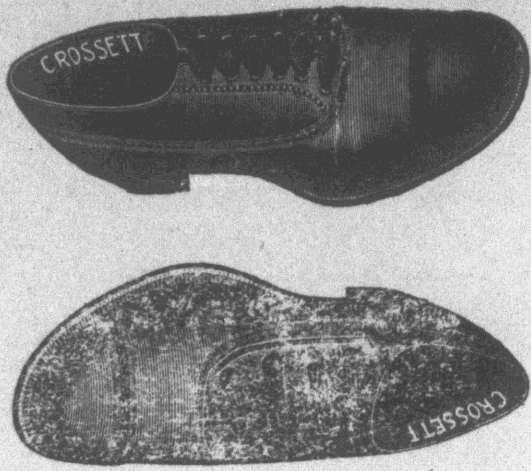

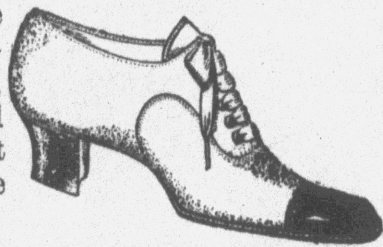
