There! They say the Guatemalan ant eats the cotton plant, too, after he has finished the boll weevil. That is to bad.

The estimate has been made by those figuring on it that the next cotton crop will reach 13,000,000 bales. If so it is going to mean low prices

Some papers are putting forth arguments to show why we will win in the coming national election. The best reason is because we will get the most votes.

Already republican leaders are admonishing their followers not to be over-confident. They realize that Roosevelt is not going to have a walk-over with Parker against him.

Whenever a campaign is waged against saloons, the saloon advocates go to all manner of extremes in the effort to make votes for their side. Such a campaign is now in progress in Wilmington, and in that city the contest has become so warm that employers are attempting to coerce employees into voting for saloons. The Star says:

A rumor, apparently well founded, went the rounds yesterday to the effect that in one of the largest industrial plants in the city, employing more than a hundred men, a placard had been conspicuously posted, calling the attention of the employees to the fact that while it was not the company's purpose to coerce or intimidate any one in its employment, yet the managers of the plant deemed it to the mutual interest of all concerned in the operation of the plant, that a dispensary should not be established in Wilmington. All were advised to register and vote in the election.  
This is an insult to every employee in that establishment, and every self-respecting man among them ought to resign his position.

#### Appeal to Cotton Growers to Organize.

State Secretary T. B. Parker, of the Farmers State Alliance, has issued a letter to the cotton growers of the State calling on them to organize, as this is the only way to prevent too rapid marketing and the consequent decline of prices, and he declares that now is the time for action.  
The following extracts are taken from the letter:

"Early in the season last summer there was a prospect of short cotton crop, notwithstanding the acreage was the largest ever planted. The farmers met in convention and resolved not to sell for a less price than 10 cents per pound. Daniel Sully, the cotton farmer's friend, was then in the market. Through the determination of the farmers not to sell for less than 10 cents per pound, and not to sell at all except as

the trade demanded the cotton, and Sully's presence in the 'pit,' the crop of approximately ten million bales has sold for about \$660,000,000, or twice as much as the crop of 1893, which was nearly two million bales larger than the crop just disposed of.

"This fact should put the farmers of the South to thinking, and cause them to take some definite action. The farmers of the South cannot afford to lose a third or half the price of a cotton crop; and to use a slang phrase, 'They don't have to.' There has never been a time when the farmers could command the situation so well as they can now. The scare-crow of two million bales annually brought over and exhibited as the over-production bogey has vanished, and the season will open with a bare market. The world has been educated to use cotton goods and must have them. There is nowhere to get them except from Southern grown cotton. The South grows three-fourths of the world's supply of cotton, and can be master of the situation. The 'bears' tell us cotton will be grown in Africa, in India, and in many other places; but the truth of the matter is, it is grown in the South, and we need not let the 'will be' argument cause us any uneasiness for some years, and certainly we need not let it affect the price of the coming crop, whether that crop be large or small. We cannot tell the size of the crop yet. The rains, nor the drought, nor the boll weevil, nor the pickers have sent in their reports, so we cannot tell just the effect they will have on the size of the crop.

"The cotton farmers need have no fear if they will come together with a determination bristling with genuine Southern fervor and unconquerable will. The time for action is now at hand."

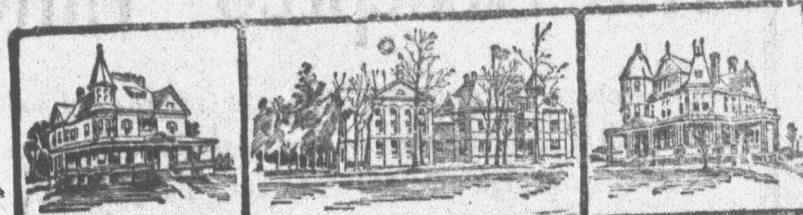

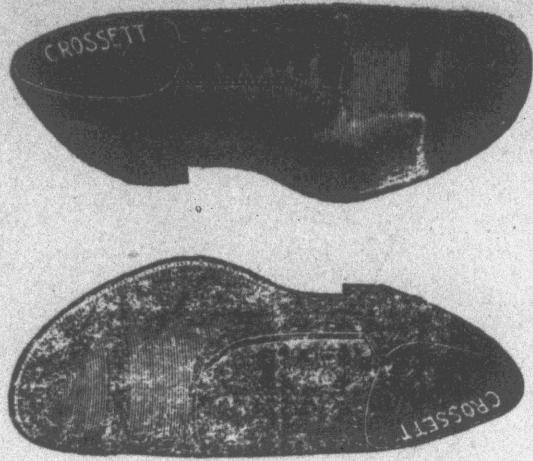

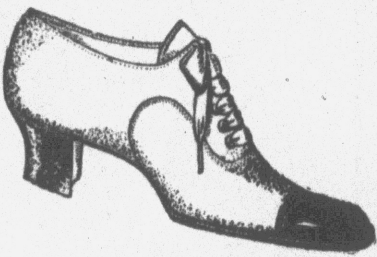
