The society asked every one to aid it particularly the school children, and announced that after the work was over ice-cream and cake would be served.

The day set for the cleaning was on Saturday, and the work was begun in the morning and kept up until late in the evening. Men, women and children, armed with rakes, hoes and heavy brooms, took hold with a will, and paper, leaves, sticks and other matter were raked into heaps and carted away. Some positive nuisances were cleaned up which soon would have required the attention of the board of health.

The town's enterprising improvement association has been in existence only two years, but during that time it has accomplished a great deal. Through its efforts two new school-houses have been built, a fine library secured, many shade trees planted and the residential streets improved 100 per cent. Its one aim and object is to make the town a better place to live in.—Ex.

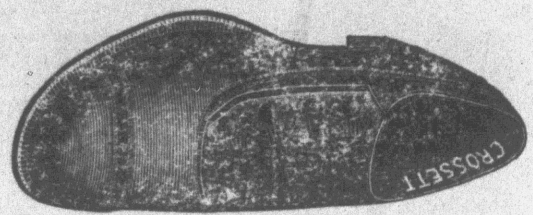
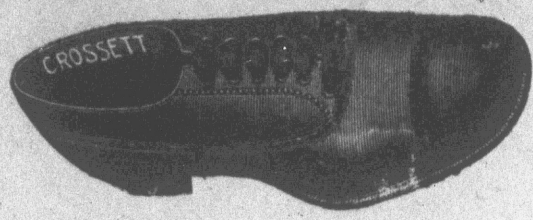

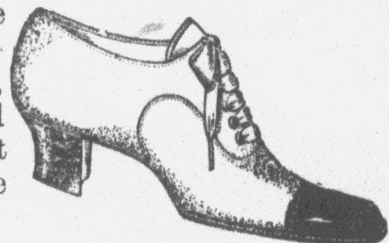
