#### What Does it Mean.

A political sensation of the first rank is impending in this county.

Two speakers of note and of personal importance beyond the limits of this county, of different political faith, are to canvass Buncombe with a series of speeches absolutely independent of their party organizations. They have not been asked to do this by the parties' managements.

The more important feature lies in the fact that these gentlemen are not only not acting without organization sanction, but in direct opposition to it. In brief they intend to attack the make-up of their party's management in this county. They seek to bring about a public sentiment which will create a change in management. One is a Democrat of many long years party service; the other is a Republican—an enthusiastic Roosevelt Republican—and a man of State note in its service. Their party faiths are strong; neither seeks to alter that but each rather to uphold it. The object of the canvass which Judge James H. Merrimon, Democrat, and Hon. Thomas Settle, Republican, are to make is stated by them to be to strengthen their respective parties by changes in management.

If present plans are carried out there will be a discussion this fall which will be of undoubted interest, and if something sensational is not said it will be surprising. Judge Merrimon's speeches are not of a character to be misunderstood and his well known reputation alone will insure a big audience. Mr. Settle, suave, sarcastic and eloquent, has an abundant supply of ammunition for his party's management in this State.—Asheville Citizen.

#### Fell Into a Well.

Greenboro, N. C., July 18.—At Jamestown yesterday afternoon, Fred Brown, aged nine years, son of Mr. and Mrs. Pinckney Brown, while trying to draw a bucket of water from a new, uncurbed fifty foot rock-lined well, caught hold of the rope to the bucket, just as it reached the water forty feet below, and was plunged headlong down the well. The alarm was given by his seven-year-old sister, who was with him, and in fifteen minutes the lifeless body of the little fellow was drawn up from the cavernous depths below. He had evidently been killed by striking the rocks in his descent, as his neck was broken, and his head terribly gashed, the skull being fractured in three places.

#### Gave Cleveland a Start.

Dr. Henry B. Leshner, of Salina, Jefferson county, Ia., claims to have started Grover Cleveland on his political career, says The Chicago Chronicle. He was in Buffalo when Mr. Cleveland was nominated for sheriff. Dr. Leshner says: "When it came nearly time for a sheriff to be nominated I said to my neighbor: 'When the nominations are open I'm going to shout "Cleveland!"' Well, pretty soon the chairman announced that nominations for sheriff were open and I shouted as loud as I could, "Grover Cleveland!" It was taken up all over the house and then some one nominated him. He was elected by a majority, and he kept going on till he lit in the White House."—Ex.

#### How Much They Get.

The Raleigh postmaster has been figuring on the salaries of all the mail carriers in the state, with the following result: One hundred and forty-four get \$720 each; 160 get \$702; 117 get \$684; 102 get \$666; 68 get \$648; the remainder range from \$612 downwards.

CONTENTNEA FARMER.

\$30,500,000 was Paid.

Baltimore, Md., July 18.—The general loss committee, composed of expert insurance men, which was organized shortly after the great fire of February 7, made its final formal report through Paul Turner.

The report states that 3,778 separate claims were handled by the committee and that the amount of insurance paid on these claims was \$29,074,358.51.

There are still eleven claims unsettled, and in addition there were probably about 1,000 or 1,200 smaller claims which were settled direct by the companies.

The amount involved in these small claims will not exceed \$1,500,000, so that the total insurance paid to those who lost in the fire will be about \$30,500,000.

#### It Would Be Fun.

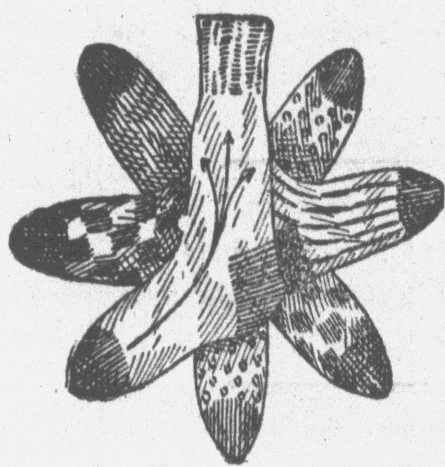
The old base ball boys that composed a team here several years ago are talking about getting together and challenging the new team for a game. The fat and lean folks of the town might get up an interesting game also.

This is the time of year when we read of sun strokes in the cities

It matters not who was the original Parker man. All are for him now and that is the important part.

A part of the business of the press dispatches now is to tell how the presidential candidates and their families spend Sunday.

The letters of acceptance of both Parker and Roosevelt, when they appear, will give the public something else to think over.

The Durham Sun intimates that a presidential race is a tame affair compared with a race for register of deeds in a county with nine candidates running.

The gentlemen(?) who are reported to have been getting fat pickings out of the guests at the Atlantic Hotel, will have dull business while the editors are in Morehead next week.

The New York Herald makes an interesting estimate on the coming presidential election which shows that republican confidence has been greatly dwarfed in the last few days. In this estimate twenty-one states with 186 electoral votes are placed in the republican column, eighteen states with 177 votes in the democratic column, and six states with 113 votes doubtful. Just before the democratic convention the republicans claimed everything but the South.

## A Man Who Never Had a Quarrel.

There is lying on the border of Buncombe and Haywood counties a man named Turner Hall, who can perhaps lay claim to more attributes than any other man in this section of the state. Mr Hall is over 50 years of age, is married and has 13 children, four of whom are dead. He was born at Newfound Gap, just over the Buncombe line, and now lives in the same house in which he was born. He has never been in court in his life except as a looker-on; he has never ridden on a railroad train and during his 50 years of residence in this "Vale of tears" has never had a quarrel with his fellow man or engaged in an altercation. 

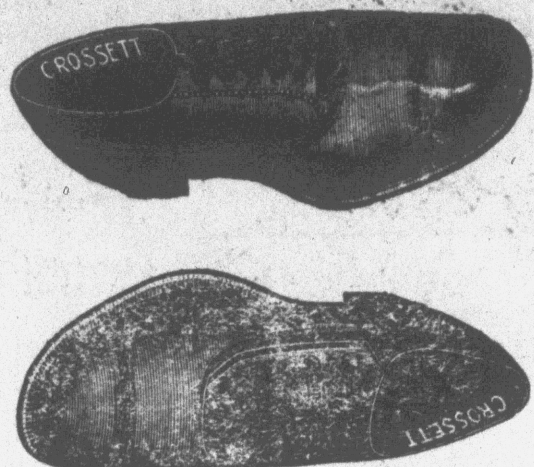

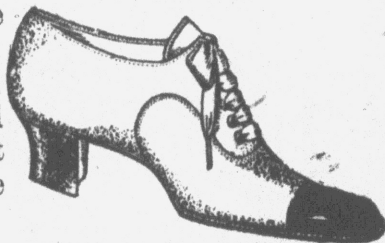
