British Tobacco Tax.

Washington, D. C., July 19—By instructions of the state department Ambassador Choate has taken up with the British government the new differential rate of three pence per pound on stripped American tobacco imported into England. The differential is claimed to be destructive of the trade in stripped tobacco, for it amounts to no less than 50 per cent. value of the tobacco. A vast amount of this tobacco is in bonded warehouses in England, and it is asserted that the imposition of the differential will amount to confiscation of the tobacco, a large portion of which is owned in America. So Mr. Choate is seeking first to secure rebate on the unsold stocks so that they may be cleared from warehouses, at the same rate as ordinary unstemmed leaf tobacco.

Fine Horses.

A day or two ago a special car of fine horses came through to Greenville direct from Wisconsin. They were shipped in what is known as a horse palace car and had an attendant with them. There were eight horses in the lot, and they were for Dr. E. A. Moye, S. T. White, W. T. Lipscomb and W. H. Dail, Jr. They are beautiful animals.

Better Schools.

Superintendent W. H. Ragsdale and the board of education arranged a consolidated district Wednesday at Ballards' X Roads, made arrangements to build a nice school building, and thereby give that community fine school opportunities. Two teachers will be placed there when the school opens in the fall.

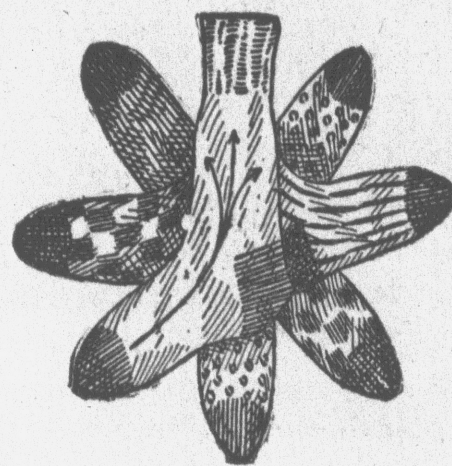

Greenville is rather far removed for the strike among the packers of the west to influence the price of beef here. Not much of the western product ever comes this way.

Mrs. Sidney Albert, of Kernersville, was burned to death as a result of trying to start a fire in a stove with a can of kerosene oil. Mrs. W. F. House of Edgemont, met death in the same way.

Good men in plenty are being nominated to fill the county offices. Let it be borne in mind that there are not enough offices to go around, though every man has the right to try his best to get one.

M. C. Hamrick, of Cleveland county one of the patients in the state hospital at Morganton, while out with a working party on the grounds threw himself in front of a traction engine and was killed.

It will be a pity if Wilmington allows itself to be made the saloon dumping ground of the state. With nearly all other towns of consequence getting rid of the saloon evil it is hoped that city will fall in line and do likewise.

The meeting of North Carolina editors at the Atlantic Hotel at Morehead, and Governor Aycock and Hon. Fitzhugh Lee being on the program of speakers, will likely carry a large number of people to that popular resort next week.

Now let those men who foretold wreck and ruin for Greensboro in case the saloons were voted out, acknowledge their error by getting in the push for the city's onward progress. They did not believe it would hurt the town when they said it.



Capt. John Taylor Wood Dead.

Halifax, July 19.—Capt. John Taylor Wood, grandson of President Zachary Taylor and nephew of Jefferson Davis, died here today, aged 74 years. Mr. Wood, who was born in Minnesota, entered the United States navy as shipman in his 17th year and served in the Mexican war. During the civil war he was with the Confederate army and served as colonel on the staff of Jefferson Davis and with Lee's army. His daring work as a blockade-runner attracted much attention. At the close of the war he escaped with General Breckinridge to Florida, crossed to Cuba in an open boat and later came to Halifax. He had been for many years secretary of the harbor pilotage commission in this city.

The Mexican boll weevil has struck North Carolina. Mr. Eugene Thorne yesterday indisputable proof of the presence of this pestiferous pest. It was a boll of cotton from which the bloom was about to shed and ravages of the boll weevil were plainly evident. The bloom was cut to pieces very much after the order of the corn worm and the small boll was affected also. Mr. Thorne discovered the weevil in the bloom and says his whole crop is similarly affected. He has six acres in which he calculated on getting four bales of cotton, but he says he will now be satisfied if he gets one. A neighbor's crop adjoining is also infested with the boll weevil.—Henderson Gold Leaf.

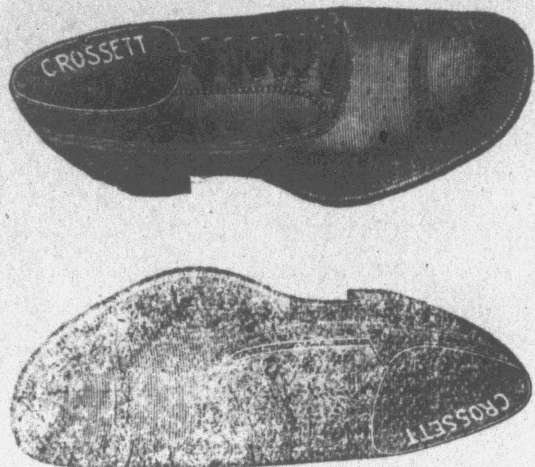

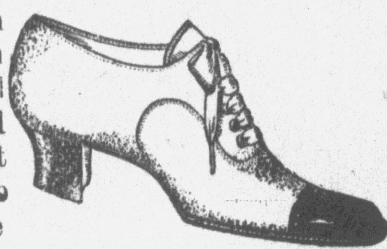
