A Negro's Desperate Deed.

Augusta, Ga., July 23.—Phone messages to The Chronicle say that at Alexander, ten miles from Waynesboro, Ga., this afternoon Sampson Flournoy, a negro, using a double-barrell shot gun, fired upon a party of four fishermen, all white, killing James Minor, aged 26, married, and Evans Tomline, aged 24 and mortally wounded Edward Minor, aged 23, married. The negro escaped. Blood hounds are on his track. He had a quarrel over a trivial matter with one of the party, went away, procured the gun, and returning, fired without warning. At a nearby farm house he stole a mule, on which he escaped.

MONDAY AFTERNOON, JULY 25, 1904.

Greenville has not yet caught the Parker-Glean club spirit.

Wednesday will show what Wilmington is going to do about it.

Col. Bryan is now giving a symposium on government ownership of railroads.

Parker buttons have got here, but they come attached to a bunch of chewing gum.

The Durham Herald factiously remarks that even the wells in some sections are going dry.

Greensboro has organized a law and order league. The purpose is to see the prohibition law honestly carried out in that city.

The Greensboro Record went for the folks who afflict that print shop with bad writing, bad spelling and execrable "grammar." What a pity Reece fell down on that last word in such an article.

United States District Atty., Skinner has got in an interview by a Raleigh correspondent in which he says the sentiment in eastern North Carolina is against the Watts law and opposed to its enforcement. Just bearing in mind that Colonel Skinner is a republican and office holder, which is sufficient explanation for his making the statement.

The Columbia State adverts to the way things are going up here, with some casual reference to the threatened danger of an enforced suspension of the usual courtesies between the Governor of North Carolina and the Governor of South Carolina. That's not what's pestering us. What we're bothered about is what Judge Peebles is to do, if this thing keeps on in case he should have another attack of the shingles. — Charlotte Observer.

Courage Brethren.

The temperance sentiment, thank God, is dominant in North Carolina. That was very clearly shown at Greensboro, and the triumph at Charlotte emphasizes the power and effectiveness of the movement. But the victory is not yet won by any means. The liquor men are astute and wily and their long and successful experience in politics gives them a wonderful advantage. They know the importance of attending the primaries and selecting delegates friendly to their interests. Our people are not so well up on this game. If we are not awake and alert the liquor people will win the Legislature and neutralize all the legislation that has been so hardly wrung from our law-makers. The matter of supreme importance now before us is to see that men are nominated who will faithfully carry out the will of the moral element of North Carolina. No matter how strong the pressure brought to bear, if our people will let it be clearly and fully understood that they will positively not vote for a man who is not an outspoken and avowed advocate of temperance legislation, the other sort will not be nominated, for the slate-makers have their ears to the ground and they will see that the men the people want will be nominated. The politicians are perfectly willing to give us the right sort of men as representatives, if we only demand them, and we must demand them. The fate of the temperance cause is now in the hands of the citizens. What are we going to do about it? — Thompsonville Chantry and Children

A New York man insists that after he has been dead and buried his body shall be exhumed after a period of eight days! Such foolishness as this comes of a certain class of politicians who refuse to believe that they are too dead to be resurrected. — Wilmington Star.

One of the largest farmers of the county, who is a close observer and a man of good business ideas, remarked to THE REFLECTOR the other day that Pitt county ought to have a better road system than we now have. During such rainy seasons as the past week the roads in many sections are almost impassable. He also said that a town of as much importance as Greenville ought to take more interest in the bridges and roads close to town so that people can get here at any time. It often happens that people go elsewhere instead of to Greenville because of bad places to cross close to town.

Colonel W. H. Chapman, of the Internal Revenue Service, with headquarters at Greensboro, a man of approved character, expressed to our Raleigh correspondent the fear that moonshining is on the increase, and complains that county officers are doing so little to enforce the Watts law, leaving the execution of liquor laws to the Federal authorities, who last month captured forty illicit distilleries—an increase of eight over the preceding month. It seems that the county authorities through the state have taken no interest in the enforcement of the Watts law, and yet it is a State statute and it is the business of the local officials to execute it. If the Federal officers were as indifferent as those of the counties, the liquor laws would be defied and trampled under foot from one end of the State to the other. It is to be hoped that the Chapman interview will awaken them to a sense of their duty. — Charlotte Observer.

Confident He Will Win.

Hon. John H. Small who returned from a three or four day's sojourn in the city of New York last evening, said in our office this morning: "During the time I spent in the city I was thrown principally among the business men. At one time during lunch I was introduced to twenty-five or thirty, of the heads of the leading houses in the city, and I must say, I was more than forcibly struck at the confidence constantly expressed in the belief that Judge Parker will be elected. Everybody seemed to be overflowing with confidence in the result, and the business men of the city are determined that no effort on their part shall be lacking that will contribute to that result."

That Judge Parker's celebrated telegram in which he made known his personal views to the convention and to the American people on the money question and declining the nomination if his views did not accord with those of the convention, was the bravest act of the century and it will cause thousands who would have voted for Roosevelt, to vote the Democratic ticket. Everywhere I went, on the train, passing through the towns and cities on the route, I could hear nothing but expressions of confidence in this being a Democratic year, and Judge Parker will be the next occupant of the "White House." So mote it be say we all. — Washington Gazette Messenger.
