EDITORS AT MOREHEAD.

New Officers of the Association.

MOREHEAD CITY, N. C. July 28.

An address of unusual excellence and ability was delivered at Wednesday afternoon's session of the Press association by J. W. Bailey, his subject being "The Press in a Democracy." Mr. Bailey is one of the brainiest young men in the state, or even in the South, and is a power in the advancement of the state.

At night a memorial service was held, at which resolutions were adopted upon the death of Robert M. Furman, late editor of the Raleigh Post. Several members spoke eloquent tributes to his memory.

A full dress german was held in the Atlantic Hotel that was quite a brilliant social affair. There were a large number of dancers on the floor.

At one interval in the ball a reception was held in honor of Gen. Fitzhugh Lee. There were a number of prominent persons in the receiving line with General Lee among them—being President J. A. Bryan, of the A. & N. C. railroad and ex Gov. and Mrs. T. J. Jarvis, and Mrs. J. B. Cherry, of Greenville.

Wednesday afternoon the editors had a delightful outing at the surf and, came out cleaner and wiser. Mr. J. J. Royal, owner of the pavilion and bath houses on the beach extended the privileges of them to the association.

This morning the association took up its routine business again and heard discussions of interesting topics.

During the morning President J. A. Bryan, of the A. & N. C. railroad, was introduced to the convention and invited the members to go as his guests on a tour of inspection of the road. This trip will be taken by special train Friday morning.

Ex-Gov. T. J. Jarvis was also presented to the convention and made an interesting brief speech being heartily applauded.

H. A. London gave an interesting reminiscence paper on the career of the State Association. He referred to J. A. Robinson, J. A. Thomas and D. J. Whichard as three patriarchs of the association they having been members longer than any others now connected with it.

Asheville was selected as next place of meeting.

MOREHEAD, July 29.

The banquet last night tendered the association by the A. & N. C. railroad and the Atlantic Hotel, was an elaborate affair. There were spreads for about one hundred and the menu, served in courses, was superb. President J. A. Bryan was toast master, and there were responses from Gen. Fitzhugh Lee, ex-Gov. T. J. Jar-

vis, H. A. London, B. F. Hilliard, W. F. Marshall, J. W. Bailey, Rev. J. O. Atkinson and J. H. Caine. We never heard better after dinner impromptu speeches.

Friday morning President Bryan took a number of the editors on an inspection trip over the A. & N. C. railroad. They found the road in good physical condition and saw enough to convince them of the falsity of the charges in the Finch-McBee application for a receiver.

A delightful sailing and fishing trip that THE REFLECTOR man enjoyed immensely was given him by Prof. L. L. Hargrave and C. W. Hearne, both former Greenville citizens now connected with a large school at Beaufort. This courtesy was much appreciated.

Deadly Bomb.

At ten o'clock Friday morning M. Von Plehve, the Russian Minister of the Interior, was assassinated at St. Petersburg by a bomb thrown at his carriage while he was driving to the Baltic station to take a train for the palace at Peterhof, where he was to have made his weekly report to the Emperor.

The assassination, it is believed, is the outcome of a wide-spread plot, the existence of which has been suspected several days. Numerous arrests have been made, among them that of the assassin, a young man who is believed to be a Finn, named Laglo, also an apparent Finn, whose name is unknown has been arrested, having in his possession a bomb which he tried to throw, but was prevented from doing so by the police.

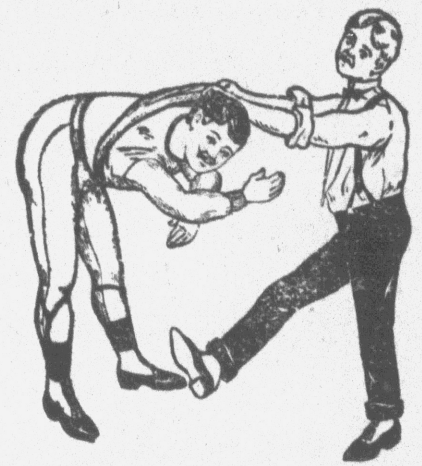

A SERIOUS MATTER

For months prior to the National Democratic Convention, Hon. Alton B. Parker of New York maintained a profound silence concerning his views on some of the great economic questions then and now agitating the public mind. Hon. W. J. Bryan and his followers bitterly protested against this long and painful silence, affirmed that Judge Parker as the most prominent candidate for president, whose name would come before the St. Louis convention, should speak, and speak plainly and clearly on all the great questions of the day, but in spite of their protest their smiles and their tears the silence was maintained up to the hour of the judge's nomination.

Now it is conceded by all brave and liberal minded men that the course pursued by Judge Parker was the safest and wisest course he could have pursued, and that he had a perfect right to keep his mouth shut.

Then after the great convention met, appointed a platform committee, and that committee held several meetings, carefully considered all questions of interest, formulated a platform and submitted it to the convention, where it was discussed at some length by the thousand sturdy representatives of the great democratic party, and adopted by an overwhelming majority, and after the same great convention had nominated Judge Parker on the first ballot for president of the United States the judge immediately broke his long and painful silence by sending a ringing message by wire to the boys, giving his views on one great question upon which the convention had maintained as profound a silence as that complained of in Judge Parker. This conduct on the part of the great New York jurist was severely criticised at the time, but now it is generally conceded by friend and foe that this was the wisest move that could possibly have been made, and that the judge had a perfect right to make the move. And if Judge Parker could have been content to stop with this he would have stood before the American people as an ideal candidate for the highest position in the world today. But now Judge Parker stands charged with a very serious offense. According to a report going the round of the press his horse broke out of his stable one night recently, and in his effort to get him back into the stable, according to the published report, Judge Parker, the wise statesman, the learned jurist, the superb nominee for president of the United States, actually used a LANTERN! Think of it brave men of Greenville, of Pitt county, of North Carolina, of the United States, used a lantern!!! Let Judge Parker maintain silence if he wishes, it is his right, let him speak his mind on the money question if he wishes, that is his right, but we draw the line at the use of a lantern in putting his horse in the stable, he must fully explain this unfortunate matter or resign his candidacy. It is a serious matter.

Mr. J. C. McNeil of Laurinburg has been added to the staff of the Charlotte Observer. Mr. McNeil is a bright young man and we predict for him great success.

Regardless of the fact that we have a dispensary, several new dwellings are going up in our town, and a number of shops and stores are being built and repaired.

A new town has recently been laid out on the Southern railroad in Mississippi, and named Vardaman after the governor. This name was forwarded to the post office authorities at Washington, and application made for its confirmation as the proper name of the post office.

This request has been refused and the people of Vardaman and surrounding community attribute the refusal to the fact that Vardaman is objectionable to the president and to the postoffice officials.

The people are stirred up, and if the refusal is persisted in a delegation will visit Washington to know why they can not honor their chief executive.

The fact of the business is the post office authorities seem to have their backs up because of former trouble in Mississippi, and use this means to vindicate their wrath upon Governor Vandaman. If the name Pooker had been recommended, no doubt it would have met the approval of the officials of the postoffice department, and would have been confirmed immediately.
