TOWN MATTERS.

Busy Session of The Board of Aldermen.

The board of aldermen met in regular monthly session Thursday night, all the members being present. Mayor W. R. Parker still being sick, Mayor protem J. R. Moye presided.

The board was in session until 11.30 o'clock, and finding all business yet far from completion adjournment was had to Monday night.

The license tax of \$5 per year on boarding houses levied at the former meeting, was amended so as not to apply in cases where not more than two boarders are taken.

A complaint from Brinkley & Hooker relative to damages to their warehouse property by the widening of Dickinson avenue, was referred to the street committee for investigation.

The street committee reported that the streets were not in good condition as the committee was waiting to work jointly, as far as possible, with the board of internal improvements.

It was ordered that notice be given that all sidewalks of the town be cleared of weeds and such back lots and premises as need attention be cleaned by the 15th.

The market committee made report of the number of stalls rented in the new market house.

The white and colored cemeteries were both reported in fair condition.

The street lights were reported in fair condition, but some of the public wells in bad condition. The latter were ordered looked after, and an abandoned well in "Little Washington" ordered filled up.

The steps in the railroad cut in rear of the Flanagan property were ordered repaired.

Treasurer H. L. Carr presented his additional bond in the sum of \$10,000 which was accepted, and his temporary bond previously given was surrendered.

The treasurer also made his monthly report which was ordered recorded.

C. D. Rountree, tax collector, reported collections during the past month of \$146 for license taxes and \$107 market rents.

J. T. Smith, chief of police report \$28.12 in fines and costs during the past month, and J. G. Rieves, assistant police, reported \$5.90.

The following persons tendered their official bonds which were accepted. J. L. Sugg, J. W. Bryan and J. N. Hart, dispensary commissioners, for \$1,000 each; W. S. Atkins, dispensary manager for \$5,000; E. H. Foley, assistant manager for \$2,500.

License to conduct restaurants were granted to W. C. Hines and Tempy Yellowly.

License to conduct a pool and billiard room was granted Z. V. Hooker.

A communication was received from the trustees of the graded schools asking that a levy of 40 cents on each \$100 valuation be made for maintenance of graded school.

A street lamp was ordered to be placed in front of the entrance to the Masonic temple, the lodge to have charge of lighting same.

A communication was read from Rough and Ready Fire Company, colored, asking for a donation to enable them to send two representatives to the state association at Wilson, and \$20 was donated for that purpose.

Accounts were allowed and orders issued on the treasurer to the amount of \$533 11.

STILL CIRCULATING FALSE REPORTS.

Notwithstanding the dispensary has been established in Greenville about a month, and is being conducted well and in strict accordance with law, there are some of the antis who continue to try to create opposition and arouse feeling against it. Hardly a day passes but what some people coming to town say they have been told this and that about the dispensary. It is now said to be circulated over the county that a record is kept of all purchases made at the dispensary, and that monthly or quarterly the names of all purchasers will be published.

Why any one should circulate such a false report we are unable to see, unless it is that they want to deceive the people. To show that the report is false we publish the following extract from the law:

"It shall be the duty of the manager to keep a register, on which shall be kept a record of the names of persons to whom any liquors are sold, the quantity sold, price paid, and date of sale; provided further that said register shall be open only to the inspection of the dispensary board and its employees, and the contents thereof shall not be published."

The foregoing is clear enough for any one to understand. The law not only says the names shall not be published, but also that the register can only be inspected by those connected with the dispensary.

Hill's Indebtedness to Parker.

Much has been said about Judge
Parker's political obligations to Mr.
Hill. Little has been said about
Mr. Hill's obligations to Judge Par-
ker. It is all a matter of nineteen
years ago, when Judge Parker was
thirty-three years old, but the truth
is that Mr. Hill did not appoint the
man who won his battle in 1885—a
victory that opened the way to the
United States Senate—until he was
besought by powerful delegations of
lawyers. If there is any political
debt existing between Judge Parker
and Mr. Hill on account of that by-
gone time, Mr. Hill, and not Judge
Parker is the debtor. It is a sign
of a chivalrous nature that Judge
Parker has never sought to better
his political prospects by calling at-
tention to the actual facts. He has
been denounced as Mr. Hill's crea-
ture, for no other reason than that,
nineteen years ago, Mr. Hill named
him to fill a brief unexpired judi-
cial term. To those who know
Judge Parker and have had experi-
ence of his strength and independ-
ence, nothing can be more redicu-
lously false than the idea that Judge
Parker is not in every sense his own
master.—From "Alton B. Parker: A
Character Sketch," by James Creel-
man, in the American Monthly Re-
view of Reviews for August.

Would Take no Chance.

At one of the hotels the other
night a traveling man well known
for his connection with the sale of
divers wares to the merchants of
north Texas gave his views on and
experiences with the superstitions
of the colored race.

It appears that up in that neigh-
borhood east of Greenville he had
occasion to hire a buggy to go
across the country, and with the
buggy there was thrown in by the
livery stable a negro, who, the
traveling man says, was about the
color of anthracite. The two trav-
eled across the muddy roads for
miles, and all was going well when
suddenly the negro rose in the
buggy.

"Look a dab!" he shouted.

The drummer looked barely in
time to see an ordinary cotton tail
rabbit cross the road like a streak
of gray. The negro prepared to
get out.

"What are you doing?" demand-
ed the drummer, catching at the
lines as they fell. The negro got
out. The he carefully turned one
of his ragged pockets inside out,
backed up to the place which the
cotton tail had crossed and walked
across it in a very line backward.
Then he climbed into the buggy
again. "Dah," he said. "Ain,
gwine let no rabbit gib me no bad
luck dis trip. No, sah!"

The color line, which president
Roosevelt has revived so effectively
is visible to him now from his own
door. At Oyster Bay the Presi-
dent's summer home last Saturday
Rev. James T. Gaskin, a colored
Methodist preacher, went into the
leading white barber shop and de-
manded a shave. This was denied
him but he persisted and left only
under threat of being clubbed out.
A dispatch on the subject to The
New York Commercial says:

"The pastor's attempt to get
shaved in the best barber shop in
town was regarded by the negroes
living in Oyster Bay, of whom
there are several hundred, as a
test case, and they are greatly stir-
red up over the incident, and some
of them are talking of bringing the
matter before the President in one
way or another.

"Residents here say that the ne-
groes of the town have been more
forward in demanding that they
want in the last two years than
ever before. The minister's at-
tempt is regarded by many here as
a carefully planned effort on the
part of the negroes to give expres-
sion to the declaration of a more
liberal policy toward them, as set
forth in the Republican national
platform."

It is not a bad but a wholesome
thing that the President's race
policy and that of his party should
have been brought so closely be-
fore his eyes.—Charlotte Observer.






