The news has come again that Port Arthur has fallen. The reader can believe it or not, just as best suits his fancy.

Judge Parker has tendered his resignation of a seat on the Supreme court bench and enters the race for president with clear skirts.

Let us have our next governor Glenn to come down and make a speech in Pitt county. The people want to shake his hand and hear him speak.

This is the week for military encampment at Morehead about which Wilmington has raised so much noise because it did not go to Wrightsville.

In the eighth district convention it took seventy-eight ballots to nominate a man for congress. W. C. Newland captured the prize at the end of the long contest.

The Toledo, Ohio, boys and girls who secreted saws in bananas and passed them through the window of the jail to prisoners, were up to a sharp trick. I was discovered in time to prevent a jail delivery.

Greenville is slow about taking a step toward a building and loan association. When the fact is taken into consideration that a home could be paid for with the money given for rents it looks like everybody should be anxious for such an association. And to have the people owning the houses in which they live would tend largely to the prosperity of the town.

The philosopher of The Wilmington Star says: "On the fence is no place for any kind of politician. The politician who straddles the fence will find out that it is all barbed wire, ready to help itself to pieces of breeches and hunks of meat. The fellow who hasn't got plenty of grit in his craw and a backbone that won't wobble had better stay out of politics till he learns to be a man." It may be added that the barbs on the political fence this year are particularly long and sharp. The "on the fence" man is destined to have a very uncomfortable time.—Charlotte Chronicle.

Ruining Tobacco Crop.

Dr. F. L. Stevens, of the faculty of the A. and M. College, has returned from Granville county where he went for the North Carolina experiment station to investigate the reports of a disease destroying tobacco. Dr. Stevens found an area about 22 by 18 miles infected with a serious soil disease which is playing havoc with the crop. This place is in the very center of the bright or golden tobacco belt, which has been producing a high grade weed. The complaint causes the leaves to wilt and finally reaches the root and kills the plant. Dr. Stevens says that the disease is extending into a wider territory each year. The only remedy suggested is to try some other crop on bank, stating in substance that the land and perhaps within 20 years the disease may be eradicated.—Raleigh Post.

EXTENSION OF R. R. F. D. SERVICE.

WASHINGTON N. C., Aug. 4, 1904. EDITOR REFLECTOR:

I will ask you kindly to publish a brief communication in the interest of the extension of the rural free delivery service. The value and convenience of this service to the farmers who live more or less remote from existing post offices cannot be questioned. If one doubts it let him go into the homes of those who are now served by the rural carrier.

There are at present 57 routes in this district. The following counties have two or more existing routes: Pitt, Martin, Beaufort, Pasquotank, Chowan, Hyde, Perquimans and Washington. Pitt stands at the head of the list and has in actual operation 24 routes. The next in order are Martin county 8 routes, Beaufort county 6 routes, and Pasquotank 5 routes. The counties of Chowan, Perquimans and Hyde have each 4 routes and Washington county has two routes.

There are petitions pending for 21 routes starting from a number of postoffices. It is significant that the applications for this service are more numerous and insistent where the service has already been established.

There are six counties in which no routes have yet been established, namely: Currituck, Camden, Gates, Hertford, Tyrrell and Dare. Applications are pending in Gates county for one route each from Corapeake and Sunbury postoffices and an application for one route in Hertford county is pending from Harrellsville postoffice.

It would be extremely gratifying if this service could be extended into Currituck, Camden and Tyrrell counties. It is probable that the service could not be established in any part of Dare county except in Roanoke Island where probably an ideal route could be arranged.

It is necessary that the people of the locality which desires this service shall first move in the matter by laying out a route and getting up a petition and a map and forward the same to their representative. All that your representative can do is to call the matter to your attention and emphasize its importance. Any citizen who takes an initial part in this movement will deserve the thanks of his community.

I shall be happy to hear from any citizen and to forward literature and blank petitions. Each route must start from a post office, preferably located on a railroad or at a county seat. It must embrace a distance of about 25 miles and there must be at least 100 heads of families to be served.

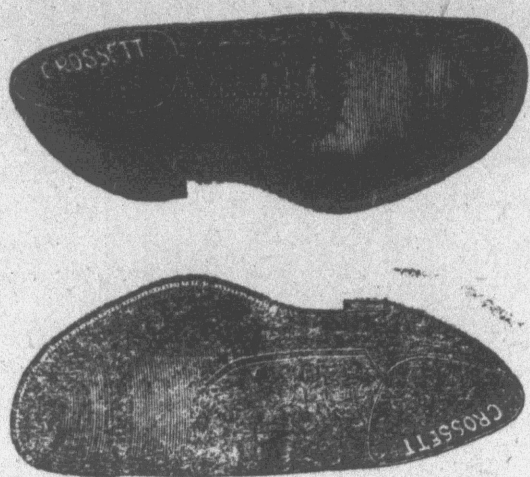

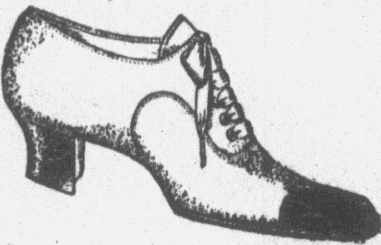
