TOWN MATTERS.

The Aldermen Adopted Ordinances and Levy Taxes.

The board aldermen were again in session Tuesday night and completed the work of adopting ordinances and levying taxes for the town. The ordinances will be printed in book form and distributed as soon as done.

The levy of taxes was as follows: For maintenance of graded schools 40 cents on each \$100 valuation and \$1.20 cents on each poll.

For interest on graded school bonds 4 cents on each \$100 valuation and 12 cents on each poll.

For interest on improvement bonds 24 cents on each \$100 valuation 72 cents on each poll.

For general purposes 57 cents on each \$100 valuation and \$1.71 on each poll. Of this levy 25 cents on each \$100 valuation and 75 cents on each poll is for the purpose of building a system of sewerage in connection with the water works being put in by the board of internal improvements.

On this latter levy, which was made at the suggestion and request of the board of internal improvements, a ye and nay vote was called for. Aldermen Buck, Lanier, Bowen, Hooker and Carr voting for the levy, Alderman Allen voting against the levy, Alderman Cobb not voting by consent.

This makes the total tax levy of the town for all purposes \$1.25 on each \$100 valuation and \$3.75 on each poll. The total tax last year was \$1.01 and \$3.03 respectively, but this year the school tax is increased 10 cents, and the tax of 24 cents for interest on improvement bonds is added. The tax for general purposes last year was 66 cents, and that is reduced to 57 cents this year with the amount for sewerage included.

Oldest Woman Dead.

Meadville, Pa., August 8.—Mrs. Mary Murphy, the oldest person in the state, if her age is correctly reported, died today, at her home in Kerstown, a suburb of Meadville, aged nearly 134 years.

Mrs. Murphy was interviewed a few months ago and said: "I was born in Dublin, Ireland, on Christmas day, 1770, and came to America in May, 1870, when I was in my one hundredth year. I was twenty-eight years old when the Irish rebellion took place in 1798, and my first husband was a soldier. I was thirty-three years old when Robert Emmett was executed for treason, September 20, 1803."

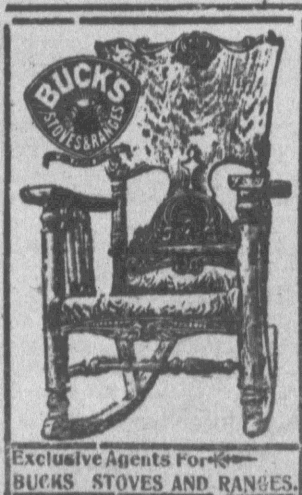

It is dollar wheat again.

If water works it is more than some people can be induced to do.

From all over the state complaints are heard of injury to crops by the excessive rains.

The democratic national executive committee has made headquarters in New York.

The campaign this year will be confined mainly to September and October, making it a short and warm contest.

Governor Aycock has three bids in hand for the Atlantic & North Carolina railroad and other bids are in prospect.

New York butchers are joining in the strike through sympathy with the Western contingent. Republic prosperity continues to move.

Now the dispatches say that the fall of Port Arthur is inevitable. It has fallen so many times already, but bobs up again at the same place.

Communication between the executive mansion at Raleigh and the chamber of commerce headquarters at Wilmington has been rung off. In the meantime Morehead is enjoying the military encampment.

Another chapter of horrors has been added to the record of casualties for this eventful year. Near Pueblo, Col., a world's fair train crowded with people plunged through a bridge, the engine and two cars following into the swollen stream below. A hundred lives were lost in the terrible disaster.

As good as this old world is, some people get in a hurry to leave it without much concern as to how they go. A Memphis woman saturated her clothing with kerosene oil and applied a match to the oil. She regarded this brief torture as light to the mental anguish she was suffering.

The New York Sun says one result of the disfranchisement of the negro in the south has been the enactment of temperance legislation in nearly every Southern state. Then surely the whole country ought to commend the South for bringing about two good measures. Taking the elective franchise from persons incompetent to exercise it is good in itself, and removing the evil effects of saloons is even better.

We have it from the Nashville American that the "Outlook" editorially states that "the negro is really the most intelligent citizen in the South," and to this idiotic statement the Washington Post adds: "He is also more intelligent than some people who are writing editorials in the North." To this the Observer begs to add that he is also more self-respecting than those Southern white people who renew their subscriptions to the Outlook after this blanket insult to their section—Charlotte Observer.

Right on the heels of that awful tragedy which took President McKinley from the stage of action Mr. Roosevelt declared that it was his purpose to carry out the policies of his illustrious predecessor. Today there is but one man among all the prominent men of this country who says he has done what he said he would do, and that one man is the president himself. All the others say he has done no such thing.—Lexington Dispatch.

A case from South Carolina will be argued before the Supreme Court of the United States when it meets next October, which may have an important bearing on the dispensary institutions that now exist in North Carolina. The court will decide whether the dispensaries must pay the government retailer's tax.

The government revenue officials have held that the managers of the dispensary are actually liquor dealers, and as such must pay the tax imposed by revenue laws.

The state of South Carolina has entered a suit against the federal government for the recovery of such sums of money as have been paid in on this account. The suit, which was filed in the court of claims, was dismissed, and then an appeal was taken to the Supreme Court.—Wilmington Messenger.

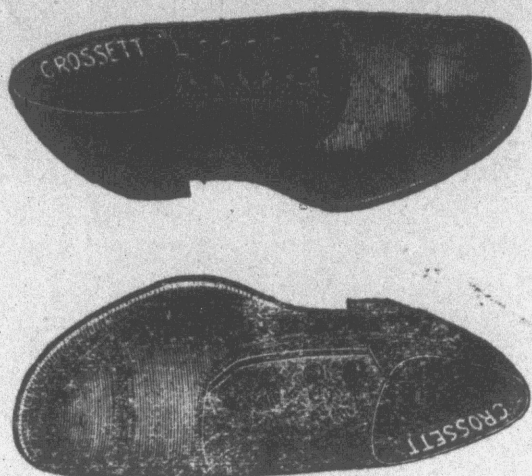

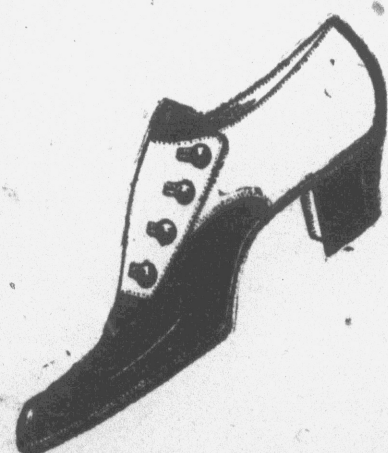
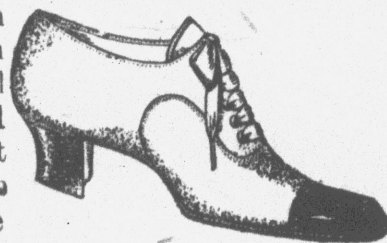
