Aycock on Parker.

"The speech of Judge Parker to the notification committee," said Governor Aycock last night, will challenge the attention of the country as being in marked contrast to the character of President Roosevelt. It shows that Judge Parker is what the country believed him, a safe and conservative man. He can be trusted to govern the country well because he will govern it within the constitution.

"Professions of faith in the people and their capacity for self government is common to both parties and to all candidates, but he who really believes in the wisdom of the people is ever ready to subject his convictions of public policy to the touchstone of the constitution, which is itself the highest and final expression of the wisdom of the whole people. No party that refuses to be limited by the constitution and no officer who is not bound by it can be a friend to the rights of the people. Judge Parker's speech shows him to be one who believes in the people and is willing to abide by the constitution which they have made."

"He was particularly happy in showing that this government is a world power on account of its adhesion to the doctrine of constitutional liberty, and not by reason of its armies and navies. The election of Judge Parker will bring us back to the days of the fathers when law was supreme and liberty fullest."—Raleigh Post.

Escape of Russian Warships.

Chefoo, Aug. 11.—A Russian torpedo boat destroyer entered Chefoo harbor at 5:30 o'clock this morning and reported that six Russian battleships, four cruisers and half of the torpedo boats escaped from Port Arthur yesterday morning. The torpedo boat destroyer left Port Arthur last night, bringing in five passengers, who stated that the Japanese fleet was pursuing the Russians and that a battle on the open sea is expected.
