Judge Parker says if he is elected president he will not accept a re-nomination. How very unlike Roosevelt is this declaration.

As frisky as the Japs seem on land, they are too slow in their movements on water. They have let the Russian fleet slip away from them again.

The Wilmington Messenger is still expending gray matter on the encampment episode, while the governor continues to do business at the same stand and the encampment goes merrily on at Morehead.

A meeting of the stock holders of the Atlantic & North Carolina railroad has been called for Thursday, Sept. 1st, to consider propositions to lease the road. It is very probable that one of the propositions will be accepted.

The age of ex-Senator Davis, democratic candidate for vice president seems to be giving the republicans lots of trouble. If our side is satisfied we fail to see that the other fellows have anything to be kicking about.

Next Governor, R. B. Gleen opened the campaign at Sharon, Mecklenburg county, on Wednesday, at a rally which was attended by 4000 people. Both Mr. Gleen and Congressman W. W. Kitchen made speeches that thoroughly aroused the democracy of old Mecklenburg. The Charlotte Observer accounts them as great speeches.

The mule is always referred to as a kicker and one of the delights of the cartoonist is to picture this animal with his heels in the air kicking things awry. A writer in the Philadelphia Record speaks interestingly in defence of the mule and among others of his good traits says of his own knowledge he has never known one to kick a man. Horses' kicks are numerous but mules' rare.

A few mutterings of the anxious have been heard that the executive committee should hurry up and call the county convention. No need whatever of any haste in the matter. A short and lively campaign will be best. There is not much that is new in politics for the people to learn, and instead of listening to the voice of the candidate they had rather be attending to their business. A month will be plenty long for the county campaign, and if even shorter than that it will be all the better.

The primaries in some parts of the state are receiving a roasting. What the local causes were we are not prepared to say. But we are prepared to say one thing about primaries. This thing of electing double and thrifble the number of delegates, to which a precinct or a county is entitled in a convention, and cutting the delegates vote in halves and thirds, is an abominable nuisance and according to our opinion is contrary to the true spirit of Democracy. Every man attending a convention should be entitled to one vote—a whole vote. That's the way he votes a regular ballot, and bringing him down to fractions

on the start is well calculated to cause factions and dissatisfactions in party lines. Let us have no more of it.—Durham Sun.

The authorities at Washington have fixed a penalty of two hundred dollars on anyone taking mail out of the postoffice other than their own. Postmasters are liable to make mistakes and get the mail in the wrong boxes, and the law says that the people must examine their mail before leaving the office, and if they have mail other than their own it must be returned at once, that the fault of the postmaster makes no difference. The law includes newspapers as well as first class mail.—Ex.

The United States is the only great nation in the world that spends more for education than for war, and of this fact we should feel intensely proud. Beginning with our common school system, where the masses are enabled to study such branches as will help them to meet life's necessities, we can build our pyramid upward to our great colleges and universities. American people believe that education is the best means of making good citizens and that good citizens alone are capable of making good laws. To this end let the people avail themselves of their splendid opportunities, and every man leave his children the most priceless of all legacies—a first class education.—Durham Sun.

Points For Parents.

"Study the child and discover where his greatest interest lies," says Mrs. Theodore W. Birney, Honorary President of the National Congress of Mothers, discussing "The Choice of Occupation," in the September Delineator. Mrs. Birney very warmly advocates a kind of natural selection which is indicated in the trend of the child's play. It is suggested, and with reason, that a child's toys and favorite pursuits is a sure index to his vocation. The plan is founded on child-study, and, as the author says, "If parents gave to the careful study of their children one-half the earnest thought they bestow on matters of comparatively minor importance, we should see far fewer 'round pegs in square holes,' and vice versa."

Good Men? Why Not?

We are not taking any special notice of the men who are nominated in the different counties to come to the next legislature. It is reasonable to suppose that in most of the counties the people are capable of choosing their own representatives. With our knowledge of the North Carolina people, and believing as we do in their competency, and in their integrity, it is hard for us to think otherwise.

It's simply a caution to the gods to witness the agonizing efforts of some gentlemen sitting upon the narrow circumferences of their little tripods, literally screaming at folks to listen at them as they proclaim themselves sheppards for the generations of their fathers. In the language of Paul, the apostle, we would say: "Do yourselves no harm; we are all here." "The Lord reigneth; let the earth rejoice."

This old world limped along for many years before some of us got to town, and when we are gone, there will still remain others, who will continue to do business.—Raleigh Times.
