LET US HAVE GOOD ROADS.

GREENVILLE, N. C. Aug. 19, 1904,
To the good people of Greenville and Pitt county:

I want to talk to you about good roads and the future outlook for our good old town. Good people, good roads mean good business and good business means a profit to all. It looks to me that we should have better roads leading to Greenville and we must have them or we suffer and suffer badly. We can look at last year and see the consequences. Our tobacco market lost at least one-half million pounds of tobacco that we would have sold if the Patrick hill two-and-half miles southwest of our town had been passable. That is only one branch of the road now.

The hill at or near Mr. O. L. Joyner's, that we have worked so hard and spent money on, I learn is now in good fix, but just two miles north at Sam's branch, when the cold wet frosty days come it takes two good team to pull an empty wagon down the hill. How can we expect the farmers to come our way? Then two miles east of us we have the hill at Smith's run near Mr. D. H. Allen's, that Mr. W. H. White and Mr. J. J. Laughinghouse can tell you about. Now what does this mean for our town? It means a loss and a steady drain to lose one million pounds of tobacco, means a loss to the warehousemen of something like four or five thousand dollars, and what to the merchant that would sell goods if the farmer could only carry them home. It means one or two thousand to them.

Now if our good board of county commissioners could see this our way, they would help us and gladly do so. We are raising a small fund to fix the Patrick hill and it will be a good road this fall and winter so all can come in from that way, for Mr. J. H. Cobb has charge of it and if any man can fix a bad hill it is he.

Mr. R. R. Cotton lost a good pair mules and one of his best croppers while trying to avoid those bad hills and attempting to cross the river at the bluff by ferry. Now good people, think this matter over and let us unite and see that things are changed. Good roads means a prosperous country and prosperity means happiness to all.

TWO SOLDIERS KILLED.

While Riding on Top of Car.

The encampment of the militia of the state near Morehead City ends with a sad disaster. The camp broke Thursday and during the night the trains bearing the troops were passing up the coast. Four of the soldiers were riding on top of one of the coaches and as the train was passing a bridge they were knocked off.

Two of the men were killed outright, another fatally injured, and the fourth seriously injured, though it is thought he will recover.

The young men in this accident were members of a Durham company and the two killed were named Ben Warren and Bunch Johnson. The accident occurred between LaGrange and Goldsboro in the early hours of the morning while it was too dark for the men on top of car to see the bridge as the train approached it.

TAKE DOWN THE FENCES.

The board of aldermen recently adopted an ordinance, to go in effect the first day of October, making it unlawful for gates situated along the streets of the town to be hung so as to open out on the sidewalks. This is going to necessitate the taking down and rehangng of nearly every street gate in town, as about all of them at present are hung so that they open outside across the sidewalk. The ordinance is a good one, as it removes the danger pedestrians are so often subjected to by collision at night with gates left standing open across the sidewalks.

But another question comes to mind in this connection: Why cannot the people of the town take it upon themselves to do away with street fences, especially along the front of their premises? Greenville is in a stock law territory and the fences accomplish no good. There are very few fences in town that have any claim to ornamentation, but on the contrary detract from the general appearance of the premises. Remove the fences beautify the yards and lawns, and the looks of the town will be improved many fold. There will be a saving, too, of the expense incurred in keeping up the fences.

Twenty-four years is a long time for a man to hold one office continuously, and the fact of his doing so speaks volumes for the faithfulness of his service as well as the high esteem in which he is held by his people. Sheriff R. T. Hodge, of Washington, was a few days ago re-nominated by the Democrats of Beaufort county to succeed himself, and if he fills out the term to which he has just been nominated it will make twenty four consecutive years that he has served his county as sheriff.

The Chatham Record, published at Pittsboro by Maj. H. A. London, has begun its twenty-seventh year. Not many papers of this day have such a career under one management. The Record is an able weekly paper, deserves well and receives well of its people.

John Sharp Williams and ex Senator Davis have their say in notifying the latter of his nomination to the vice-presidency and his acceptance of same. The speeches of both were good.

Dowie, the Zionist has established himself in good repute again. He saved the lives of three women by rescuing them from drowning. This act places him in the catalogue of heroes.

The Russians did not surrender Port Arthur just because the Japs demanded them to do so, but they had about as well.

The Wilson police court must be something terrible when the news of that town records it as "Doane's Doings—Decently Depicted while Dealing destruction to Drunkenness, Deviltry and Depravity." That is doing the dictionary with drastic dishevelment.—Durham Star.

The Old Field School.

It is not agreeable to take issue with the school people for they are rather dogmatic and have better opportunities than other people for knowing things, but we are obliged to endorse some things said by Editor Caddell of the Raleigh Times before the North Carolina Press Association the other week. He deplored the abandonment of the good old plan of drilling the pupils, so common to the schools of twenty-five years ago and expressed his doubt and distrust of the present methods employed in our graded school work, especially. We have observed the present-day methods rather sharply because we have the very best of reasons for doing so, and we are fully convinced that with all the modern equipment in almost everything, the old field school is not approached by the average graded school of the present day. Now a chap goes to school, spends four hours a day, comes home, kicks up his heels, goes to bed when he pleases, and never puts his eye on a book, though he lugs twenty pounds of them in his wallet to and from school.

After awhile he "finishes" his course in spelling, and leaves the "r" out of February every time. It was not so in the old time. A pupil never "finished" spelling at all, for the good old blue-back covers all the ground from the cradle to the grave; and he finished nothing else unless he knew it. Now the object seems to be to make time rather than to master books, and if a pupil can only rush through the course he is all right. This may be old fogeyism but many parents are saying amen to this for they are suffering the same affliction with the writer. We need less systematic ordiliness and more solid, honest work, more poring over lessons at night, more anxiety for good lessons, a little more hickory oil, perhaps, and a great deal more thoroughness in the ground gone over.—Charity and Children.

A Great Section.

The more we think of it and the more observations we make, the more thoroughly we are convinced that Eastern Carolina is a great and promising section of North Carolina. Any intelligent man can easily demonstrate to his own satisfaction that he can produce almost anything in this section that will command money on the markets. Halifax county ought to be, and is, one of the leading agricultural counties of the State; but somehow the people do not seem to have confidence in the possibilities of their lands. Do much for your land and it will do much for you. This will hold true until the laws of nature are reversed.—Scotland Neck Commonwealth.




