#### BOISTEROUS SATURDAY.

##### Policemen Kept Busy With Disturbers.

Saturday was the busiest day in police circles that has occurred in sometime. The first disturbance was in the afternoon when several negroes engaged in a free-for-all fight which resulted in no serious damage.

Later a white man who had on more liquor than is needful created some excitement by using a pistol too freely. A pistol ball through a neighboring store window was one result of his reckless shooting.

Again after dark there was more excitement when two policemen passed up the street carrying a woman to the lock-up. The woman cried piteously as she was marched along, a crowd of jeering boys following in the wake and adding to the noise.

Altogether it was a boisterous Saturday evening.

##### Seven Lost in Arizona Flood.

El Paso, Tex., Aug. 20.—It was known today that seven lives at least were lost in the flood that swept through the town of Globe, Ariz., and surrounding country. The known dead are: M. N. Mitchell, Southern Pacific Railway machinist, and his wife; O. D. Wilson, clerk; Charles Sims, John Epley, a Mrs. Hurd and Miss Moody.

According to the report of the Courier who brought news of the disaster to Bowie, others were drowned besides those named in the foregoing list, but their names are not yet known. The Gila Valley and Globe and Northern Railway tracks were washed out for three-quarters of a mile. O. D. Wilson and Stanley Mentzer, by heroic work, saved many lives.

Wilson saved a young woman whom he was to marry, and is reported to have then lost his life in trying to save another.

The property loss will probably reach half a million dollars. Large forces of men are reconstructing the railroad and telegraph lines.

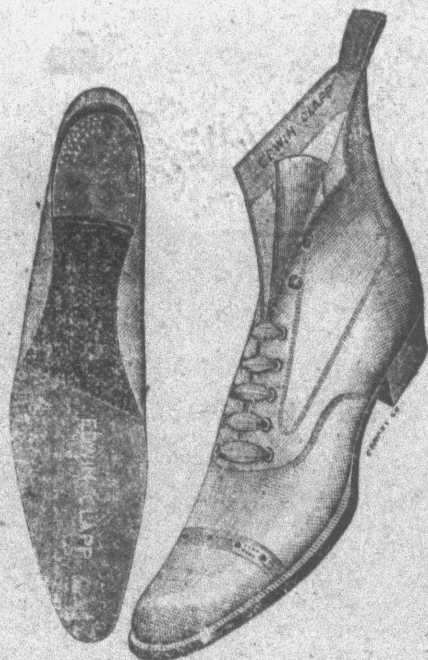
#### A Warm One

The Hon. John H. Small, Democratic Congressman from the first district, who was re-nominated on Wednesday at Edenton, puts his hair in the middle. Wilmington Star.

But he keeps his head level all the same.

The Watta law being a democratic measure and one of the principles of the party platform, the man who declares that he will not support this law nor support those who favor it, has no right to participate in a democratic primary. It is just as well to make party lines plain in this particular.

It is really refreshing to read in these times of the manner in which the authorities of Wilmington are abating vagrancy. Down that way every one found unemployed is given an interview before the mayor, with the result that more hands are working on the roads. Oh, that such a spirit might spread!

The Democratic party meets in convention and makes a platform for the party, then tells its candidates to get on that platform and lead the way to victory. But sometimes we see an effort to change the order of things, wherein a man sets up his own platform and asks the Democratic party to nominate him on his platform. It takes a good amount of cheek to do that. If a man cannot get on the platform of the party then he should not be asking the party to give him an office, and if he cannot support the principles of the party then he should not assume to dictate to the party.

There is one ordinance which should be framed in the city code of Charlotte which is not to be found there now—that is a law making it a misdemeanor for any person to distribute indiscriminately samples of medicines. This practice has become frequent of late and it is a menace to the children which should not be permitted. There could be no objection to this method of advertising such wares if the distributors were required to place the samples directly in the hands of some adult member of the household he visits, but the present practice seems to be to employ irresponsible negro boys and men who throw them carelessly into the front yards. There they are found in many instances by little ones too young to realize their folly and a child's first impulse is to put every thing it gets hold of into its mouth. Charlotte Observer.

Gen. John Black, former pension commissioner and now civil service commissioner, has stirred up a nest in Boston by declaring that the president's decree giving pensions to all soldiers of the civil war above the age of 62 years, "ought to be crystallized into law by act of congress."

The republican contention is that the Presidential decree is already good law, in that it simply defines a law already on the statute book, and that no meddling whatever by congress can make it any more solidified or crystallized. Gen. Black is in a position to know whether this contention is valid or not. Having been pension commissioner for four years, he now decides, and publicity claims that it is not—the president's decree, under which millions of dollars have already been disbursed is not law, and cannot be until it is "crystallized."

It would be interesting to know what the president has thinks of his office-holder in this New Mass.

## For the Royal Zoo

Marshall.] We were in South Africa capturing wild beasts for the Royal Zoological gardens of London when we got word that a lion had entered a cattle kraal about five miles away the night previous and killed and carried off a steer. We made for the spot at once and began digging a pit.

When our pit was completed, it was 10 feet long, 6 feet wide and 12 feet deep, and we cut and drew up a lot of heavy poles to place across it in case we had to keep him prisoner for two or three days.

It was a full moon that night, and from the post in one of the huts I caught sight of the lion at about 9 o'clock. He came to within 200 feet of the kraal and sniffed the air as if his suspicions had been aroused. He was a fine target for a rifle, but under the circumstances he was safe from my fire. The cattle soon sensed him and crowded to the other side of the pen, and the dogs of the village likewise made a great fuss, but his lordship was not in the least put out. I could not have seen him better by daylight. Aside from his mane there were black tufts on his legs, with a black plume at the end of his tail, and I was determined to make him my prize if it took a year of waiting and planning.

The lion scented danger, however, and sneered off, and we saw nothing more from him that night. On the next night he showed up before we were on the lookout. The natives in driving in the cattle had failed to round up a yearling calf, and we heard nothing from the kraal until the lion showed himself. Just at dusk he roared loudly, and as the moon came up we caught sight of him advancing upon the kraal. The calf was on the other side of the enclosure keeping very quiet, but as the lion stopped and roared again the frightened animal began running around the pen to seek for the gate. As he came around on our side, running blindly and never seeing the lion, the latter crouched and sprang. As he struck the calf he seized it by the neck and wrenched it to right and left, killing it on the instant. For five minutes he stood facing us with his claws on the carcass, growling defiance. Had a man shown himself outside of a hut the lion would have charged right at him. After awhile, finding that his deft was not accepted, he picked up the calf and trotted away as a dog would with a bone. Twice before he reached the thicket he paused to look back, but we had no thought of moving out of our shelter.

As the calf was not in good condition, the natives believed the lion would return next night, but he did not. Orders were issued for the people to keep very quiet during the day and for the herd to be penned an hour earlier than usual.

On the second night after getting the calf we heard the old fellow roaring good and strong as he left his lair, and the head man said to me:

"We are sure of him this time. Can't you tell by his roar that he is hungry?"

It is doubtful if the lion ever roars because of hunger. His roar may rather be considered a challenge to his enemies. The natives insisted, however, and they were right, except that he did not appear as soon as expected. He went off in the other direction, roaring at intervals and perhaps looking for a change of diet.

It was close on to 11 o'clock, and we had not heard his voice for an hour, when I suddenly heard something walking with a tread as heavy as that of an ox. I thought it was an ox until I saw the lion himself. The moon was up, and he advanced upon the kraal without even looking our way. His bearing exhibited grim determination. He walked straight to the spot where he had leaped before, halted for an instant to see if the fence had been strengthened since his other visit, and, with an angry growl and a switch of his tail, he went over. The cattle belated and rushed about, but after a couple of minutes the head man whispered:

"He certainly fell into the pit. See! The cattle have become more quiet. Let us go at once."

At a signal we all rushed for the gate and opened it. We were not a moment too soon, as the fellow was springing up and catching the banks with his paws. We hustled the poles across the excavation, weighted them down, and then everybody in the village began to sing and yell and dance. I had promised the people a keg of rum, ten pounds of powder and five muskets in case of capture, and the reward was a big thing to them. The cattle were turned out, fires lighted, and all spent the night in watching and rejoicing.

The cage was made with double bars, each as large as a man's arm, and of hard wood. We had it ready by night, but the lion was by no means ready to enter it. Our only way was to draw him up into it by main strength. For two whole days he defied our every effort, seeming to grow fiercer with every failure on our part, but on the third day we got the better of him. We kept him from food and drink for four days, but he neither fell away nor abated one jot of his ferocious spirit. I did not start him until the tenth day of his capture, hoping for a change, but as none came he was finally turned over to a guard of natives and his journey began.

In due time he reached the Royal gardens, but savage as ever, and even after ten years of captivity he was the most ferocious brute in the whole collection and feared by everybody. He was one of the few lions born with such a savage spirit that taming is an impossibility. M. QUAD.

## AUSTRALIAN TOTEMS.

Odd Beliefs of the Aborigines as to Their Origin.

An interesting report of the investigations by Professor Baldwin Spencer into the question of "totemism" in Australia is given in a Melbourne paper. Various myths, it seems, exist as to the origin of the totem. The aborigines believe that in what they call the dream times there lived beings, half animal, half plant, which were transformed into human beings and wandered about making the natural features of the country. Each ancestor carried a stick, and with that stick the spirit of the ancestor is associated. Each place where an ancestor has wandered is believed to have a spirit, such, for instance, as an emu spirit, a kangaroo spirit, etc., and each child born in that particular place is, say, an emu child or a kangaroo child and so on. Thus it is that each child has its totem.

As to the ceremonial, if a woman or child see it, the eyes are put out or death inflicted. The professor was initiated by one group and was thus permitted to see the ceremonies. The initiators bedaubed themselves with ochre, down and their own blood and, after going through a grotesque dance, related to the novices the doings of the ancestors. The aborigines believe that reincarnation is continually going on, so that many living people are accepted as reincarnations of some celebrity. As to the religious or magical aspect, every person believes he has influence over the animal or plant after which he is called, even to the extent of causing it to increase. As a rule, the totem is edible, and in the great majority of cases the totem is the food supply, wherefore the power of increasing the totem is of importance. The aboriginal rarely eats his own totem, but he has no objection to giving it to others to eat. —St. James' Gazette.

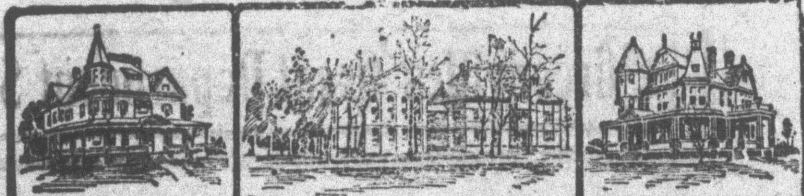

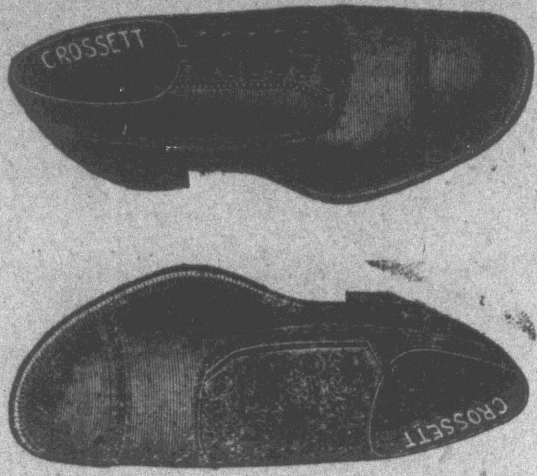
