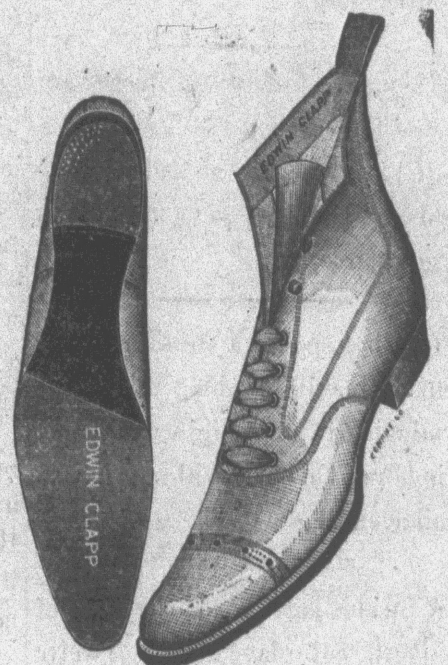

Concord is infested with a band of burglars. Fifteen houses were visited in one night.

A new bull must have appeared on the cotton exchange from the way prices are jumping up.

The people of Danville, Va., are agitating the matter of separate accommodations for whites and blacks on street cars.

As many loafers as there are around Greenville, the contractors on the water works and electric lights are having to go to other towns to get hands.

This hot spell is a strong reminder of the one in August, 1887, that terminated in the big earthquake. It is hoped this one will not have a similar ending.

A furious gale struck the city of St. Paul, Saturday night. Twelve persons were killed, many injured and property damaged to extent of a million dollars.

The merchants' association of Asheville adopted a resolution that for one year they would stop using "fake" advertising schemes and stick to the newspapers as the best means of publicity.

That is a pretty howdy do some of the papers are telling that the Czar's recently arrived son is not a boy at all but only another girl. The story goes that the Czarina's child was really a girl, and that the Czar was so anxious for the effect it would have on the army to announce that an heir to the throne had been born, that the new royal girl baby was traded for the son of a peasant woman born about the same time. Cut Down the Tobacco.

Some time ago Rev. Gaston W. Cashwell was holding a meeting in Bentonsville township and Mr. Jas. Johnson accepted the doctrine of sanctification and made a profession of it. During the meeting the minister spent the night with Mr. Johnson. The next morning the two men took hoes and went into the field and cut down all of Mr. Johnson's tobacco. They believe it to wrong to make or use tobacco and so they decided to destroy it.—Smithfield Herald.

Hornets Cure Drunkenness.

The jail at Whiting is an old box building that is seldom used. One day lately, however, a young man imbibed too freely of some tonic that not only toned him up, but made him unduly fractious and the city marshal was compelled to gather him in and place him in this little unused jail. Local Residence Obligations

The citizen, man or woman, who recognizes and carries out the local residence obligation, comes pretty near fulfilling the golden rule, and it is no small thing that a citizen can feel that this obligation has been faithfully lived up to.

The retail merchant has his goods ready for the trade. He expects his fellow citizens to buy of him. Has this merchant met his local obligations by patronizing his home newspaper with his advertising?

The store, house and office owner, rents his property, has he met his local obligation by patronizing his home merchant, and so assisted in helping those who help him?

Is each citizen looking first to his neighbor, to see what assistance can be given, in good words, by way of encouragement. In patronage, where trade is concerned. In moral influence when that can help. And are the various public interests receiving the attention and support which every true citizen ought to give them?

It is the carrying out of the local residence obligations which build up communities, which gives local strength, stability and character to a town or city.

It gives successful promotion and development, and assures growth and permanency to business and industrial interests. It gives a healthy social and religious tone to the community, and makes possible the nearer realization of what a true and ideal citizenship might be.—New Bern Journal.

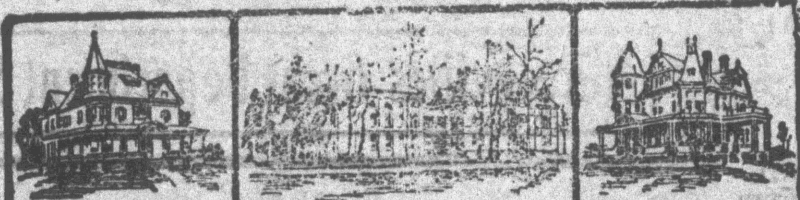
