Grave for a Live Man.

Goldsboro, N. C., Aug. 24.—While Mr. Lon McKeil was walking around town this morning laborers were at work digging his grave out in Saulston township. If he had been so disposed he could have gone to the lonesome spot in the family burying ground where his relatives proposed to deposit his remains this afternoon. While he was walking the streets in his usual good health his brothers and sisters and other relatives in the country were mourning him as dead. Mr. McKeil, who has been keeping a restaurant in this city, was recently indisposed and yesterday a report became circulated around town that he was dead. It was said that he had an operation performed and died. This news reached his brother, Mr. James McKeil, in the county late last night. He waited until an early hour this morning before spreading the news around the neighborhood. Before leaving home to come after his brother's remains, Mr. McKeil put some laborers at work on his plantation to dig the grave. Friends and other relatives were gathered around the old homestead to attend the funeral which was supposed to come as soon as the remains could be brought from town. When Mr. James McKeil reached the city he found his brother walking around on the streets. He was very pleasantly surprised and when he returned home with out the corpse a scene of mourning was turned into rejoicing.—Wilmington Messenger.

THE POINT IS CLEAR.

In a column editorial the Wilmington Messenger differs with a recent paragraph in THE REFLECTOR in which this paper said "the Watts law being a democratic measure and one of the principles of the party platform, the man who declares that he will not support this law nor support those who favor it, has no right to participate in a democratic primary."

In the main we agree fully with what the Messenger says. We admit that great latitude must be given in party matters and that all men in the party are not agreed upon every phase of the platform, but on the particular point in question we hold to the conviction expressed.

According to our view of the matter, in state politics this year the Watts law is the main issue. We do not recall any other issue that is paramount to it. The Watts law was enacted by a democratic legislature and its principles endorsed by the democratic state convention. It is the one point on which the republican party is fighting us in the state in this campaign and the liquor dealers are joining with them in the effort to overthrow it. The latter have gone so far, as to urge their followers to support no man who favors a continuance of the law upon the statute books. Their object is plain—they want to overthrow the Watts law and reopen the whiskey traffic in the state, and to perpetuate this their next step would be to again put the ballot in the hands of the negro.

Under the circumstances those who take sides with the republicans in their opposition to the Watts law are certainly at variance with the principles of the democratic party, and for that reason we say "the man who declares that he will not support this law nor support those who favor it, has no right to participate in a democratic primary." Such a man would go into the primary with his mind made up in advance that he would not support its nominees nor abide by its decisions if they did not accord with his ideas. We repeat, such a man has no business in the primary.

Count the Cost.

The Democratic party has endorsed the Watts bill. The Republican party has condemned it. The Liquor Dealers' Association has come out flatfooted against the Watts bill, which places them with the Republicans. Should the Republican and whiskey forces win, the election machinery would all fall into their hands. This would mean that the negroes would all be permitted to register and vote. We would again see a host of negroes in office, superintending our schools and bar rooms at every cross roads in the State. Count the cost before you cast your ballot for the return of such a state of affairs.—Washington Progress.

The people of Pitt county can read the above carefully and see the trend of things if they support a man for the legislature who is opposed to the Watts law. Such a man though he may not admit it, is playing directly to the hands of the Republican party. Yes, count the cost. Wooten, giving your support to a man against the Watts law.

COTTON ROOT-BARK.

On August 10, 1904, cotton root bark was selling in the New York market for 40 cents per pound.

Cotton root bark is largely used in the manufacture of medicines both in this country and Europe. For some years past, owing to the very low prices for cotton lint, the price paid for the bark by manufacturing druggists has been so low that there was little incentive for gathering it. The supply in the hands of druggists is at present about exhausted, and the price has gone up in consequence.

At present prices of farm labor, and the known value of such labor in planting fall sown crops, no cotton grower can afford to gather cotton root-bark for less than ten cents per pound, delivered at the nearest railroad station. If growers will stand together and refuse to sell for less than ten cents they can easily secure that price. For early deliveries from 15 cents to 25 cents can be secured.

The method of preparing cotton root-bark for market is as follows:

1. Only the bark of the root below ground is wanted, this may be collected at any time after the lint is gathered until early spring, or until such time as the bark when peeled shows black streaks on inner side.

2. Cotton root-bark must be stripped from the root while fresh. The fresh bark peels very easily and should be removed as whole as possible. Before peeling wash the roots free from sand and clay. Dry the peeled bark under a shed or other water tight cover. Turn the bark every day until as dry as hay. Drying takes about a week.

3. The dry bark may be packed in clean sacks, barrels or boxes. Druggists will not buy less than one hundred pounds. Most of the larger manufacturing druggists will buy good bark in lots of one ton or more. There is a considerable export demand.

4. To secure sale for cotton root-bark growers should first collect a small lot of ten pounds or so and dry it carefully. Then mail samples of about 4 ounces to each of the houses named below, stating how much bark can be supplied. We especially recommend the Baltimore houses for North Carolina growers.

5. We advise that the bark be sold f. o. b. at nearest depot and that no offer of less than ten cents per pound be accepted. If no satisfactory offer is received from samples sent do not collect the bark.

6. All the firms named below buy cotton root-bark. We believe all to be trustworthy, but do not guarantee this:
