"Refinement and comfort they are apt to consider quite as objectionable as immorality. A taste for learning and cultivated friends, and tendency to bathe frequently, cause them the deepest suspicion. Though they often make war on vice, they rather prefer making war on prosperity and refinement."

And in the campaign he wrote again:

"Thrift, industry and business energy are qualities which are quite incompatible with the true Populist feeling. Payment of debts, like the suppression of riots, is abhorrent to the Populist mind. Such conduct strikes the Populist as immoral."

How any present or former member of the People's Party can vote for Theodore Roosevelt after that, is also beyond us.—Charlotte News.

## Investigation of Scuppernong Grape.

The United States Department of Agriculture is investigating the Scuppernong grape with a view to determining the best varieties, methods of culture, pruning, training, etc., as well as the uses to which the fruit can be put. One of the features of this investigation which is considered of particular importance is the locating of vines of this type, either wild or in cultivation, that are known to excel in productiveness, size, color or quality of fruit, or in some other important particular.

In this connection, the Viticulturist of the bureau of Plant Industry, who has the work in charge, will be glad to receive reports on such vines from persons who know of their existence, stating the facts regarding them and the points of special merit that have been observed in them.

Correspondence regarding such vines should be addressed to Geo. C. Husmann, Viticulturist, Bureau of Plant Industry, U. S. Department of Agriculture, Washington, D. C. The Department will, upon application, furnish special mailing boxes and franks with which specimens of choice varieties can be forwarded to the Viticulturist for examination without cost to the sender.

#### The Elephant Must Walk The Plank.

What is needed in this country is a party which will conduct the government in the interest of the people, and not exploit it for the emoluments of office and the advantage of party. The people have to decide as to the class of men and parties who are to be trusted with power, and it is about time for them to take notice of what the republican party is in business for. Most any body with two eyes can observe that the average republican considers that the public office is the near cut to the feed trough. That party inculcates that idea by its spoils system, and it is time for it to go out of business. —Wilmington Star.

We are told that the country people are up in arms against the Watts law. If this is true, we are unable to see the reason, for if one will read it carefully there appears to be in fact a discrimination in favor of the country people. Of course a distillery for making whiskey cannot be operated in places where there is no police protection and this corals them in towns if anywhere, but there is a clause that allows the distillation of brandy—apple and peach—together with the making of wines. It has been said that a man is only allowed to distill his own fruit, but a careful reading of the law will show that he can buy all the fruit he can get and make it into brandy. True, he must sell only in original packages of not less than five gallons, and no part of it can be consumed on the premises. This discrimination was no doubt made on account of the fact that apples, peaches, grapes and the like will go to waste, while corn can be utilized for other purposes. However this may be, the country people have the big end of the bag on the Watts law proposition. —Greensboro Record.

Miss Fannie Dixon, of Greene County Drops Dead in Washington.

News reached the city yesterday evening, from Washington, of the sudden death in that city of Miss Fannie Dixon of Dixonville, Greene county. The message which was received by 'phone, stated that Miss Dixon had arrived in Washington from the eastern counties where she had been in the interest of missionary work, and had a congestive chill yesterday morning. She was recovering from the chill and thought to be getting along well when suddenly, about 6:30 in the evening, she dropped dead.

The remains were shipped to Ayden today and will be taken to her home in Dixonville, where she will be buried tomorrow.

Miss Dixon was the niece of Mrs. J. W. Grainger and had a number of relatives in this city. She was about 26 years of age. She was connected with the missionary work of the Christian church and traveled as organizer of societies. —Kinston Free Press, 26th.


