A CARD

TO THE DEMOCRATS OF PITT COUNTY:

My attention has been called to an article published in King's Dollar Daily on the 27th inst., in which is intimated a charge that I have endeavored to draw a line as to what democrats should attend and participate in the party primaries on the 10th day of September next, and farther that I had written or inspired certain articles which had been published in THE REFLECTOR newspaper. In reply to the insinuation, I have to say:

1. That for twenty-one years I have been the chairman of the democratic committee for Pitt county, and for the past ten years against any desire and protest. How well I have discharged the duties of the position, the democrats and white people of the county can testify. During that time I have not attempted, by word or line, to prevent any democrat from attending the primaries and conventions of the party who intended to support the nominees of the party, but on the contrary have urged all such democrats to attend and participate therein, at the same time stating that if there were any differences to be settled between democrats that it should be done in the councils of the party and in such a manner as not to benefit the enemy, the republican party.

2. That as to any connection with the articles and editorials written in THE REFLECTOR, I can truthfully say that during this campaign I have not written, procured or inspired to be written, a single line or word for that paper, nor have I in any manner suggested a line of policy for it. Its editorials and correspondence I have nothing to do with and shall assume no responsibility therefor.

In the said issue of King's Dollar Daily its editor states: "It is well to remember that Jarvis & Blow are pledged to keep up the anti-saloon liquor fight until every bar is run out of Pitt county and Greenville made to monopolize the business." The firm of Jarvis & Blow has never made any such pledge and the only foundation upon which such an assertion can be made is in the fact that on the 11th day of April, 1904 in a letter to the Board of Aldermen of the town of Greenville concerning the appearance of the firm of Jarvis & Blow in a certain suit then pending in the Superior court, growing out of an election held in said town on the second day of March, 1904, we wrote "that we will neither make any charge nor accept any compensation for our services whatever. We worked to close the bar rooms because we thought we were serving the best interest of our community. We are willing and ready to continue the fight in the courts or on hustings." This letter was recorded on the minutes of the Board of Aldermen and also published. It had reference alone to the fight in the town of Greenville and contained no allusion to Pitt county or any other place.

The undersigned voted for the Watts law in the legislature because he believed he was doing so for the best interest of the people living in the country. In the election held in the town of Greenville he voted in favor of the temperance movement because he thought it best for the interest of the town. He has no apologies to make for either of these votes. He accords to the people of the towns of Farmville, Falkland, Grifton and the other towns in Pitt county the right to decide as they think best all such questions as may affect them, without interference from any one not

residing therein. All towns and cities in North Carolina have had the right under the laws of the state for more than thirty years to say whether liquor should be sold in their community or not and if the Watts law was repeated they would still have that right.

In the belief and with the request that all democrats of Pitt county will attend the primaries on the 10th of September and express their individual preferences, without the hinderance, interference or dictation of any one, I now take leave of the subject.

EXTRACT FROM STATE PLATFORM.

There has been so much said about the Watts law and whether the state convention endorsed it or not that we think it well to publish that part of the state platform adopted by the state democratic convention at Greensboro and let it speak for itself.

That part of the platform which refers to the Watts law is in these words:

"We approve the general principles of the Watts law regulating the manufacture and sale of liquors, and limiting the same to localities in which there may be adequate police protection. The principle that no saloon or still shall operate except under police protection is as sound as that whiskey shall not be sold to minors, drunkards, or on Sundays, or near the schools and churches. The general Assembly has the power and when controlled by the democratic party can be trusted to make all amendments which experience and conditions may demonstrate to be wise and proper."

Pitt county was well represented in that convention. It had a fine delegation of sterling democrats. Among the delegates present from Pitt we find such life long, hard-working, staunch democrats as A. L. Blow, J. L. Fleming, J. J. Laughinghouse, F. G. James, O. W. Farrington, R. W. King, H. T. King, W. R. Horne, R. R. Cotten, H. A. Blow, L. I. Moore, E. B. Ficklen, Shade Cox, J. E. Clark, Jr., Alston Grimes, W. E. Proctor.

We are told the platform was received with hearty applause and that not one of Pitt county's delegates voted against it. In view of these facts who shall say that the Watts law is not a democratic measure and a good thing. Of course these fire-tried democrats would not vote to "APPROVE the general principles" of a law that is undemocratic and a bad thing. It comes to us with the stamp of their APPROVAL upon it and it must be a democratic measure and a good thing.

The republican party in convention assembled say "we denounce the democratic legislature for the enactment of the Watts law," while the democratic party in convention assembled says we APPROVE it. Thus the issue between the two parties on this question is made up. With such democrats as A. L. Blow, J. L. Fleming, J. J. Laughinghouse, F. G. James, O. W. Harrington, R. W. King, H. T. King, W. R. Horne, R. R. Cotten, H. A. Blow, L. I. Moore, Alston Grimes, E. B. Ficklen, Shade Cox, W. E. Clark, Jr., and W. E. Proctor standing together and "approving" the general principles of the Watts law regulating the manufacture and sale of liquors, and limiting the same to localities in which there may be adequate police protection, there ought to be no trouble in nominating and electing democrats for the legislature who stand squarely upon the democratic platform.

We may differ on certain ideas, to be sure, and need not fall out about them, but the general principles of the party should have our support.
