Mr. Sutton was seventy three years old and had been very feeble for several months. Only yesterday he was superintending some work being done on his premises, and when asked regarding his health, he replied that he felt better than he had for several days past.

The deceased leaves a wife and one daughter, the daughter being the wife of our editor, D. J. Whichard. Also a number of grandchildren survive the deceased.

In the death of Mr. Sutton, we feel that our town and community has lost a good and useful man, and to the bereaved family we extend the heart felt sympathy of THE REFLECTOR and the community at large.

Now that the editors have been seeing and hearing let them get to doing.

From reports from Danville, Va., it is not wise to attempt a lynching and fail.

The duty of a citizen to his party is a very sacred duty, and one that should be done with careful consideration and manly courage.

"Wonder what the editors now think of Parker?" Said one of our townsmen to us today. We are wondering what Parker thinks of the editors.

The card to the public, of A. Savage and Co., found on another page, shows a good spirit. This firm does not want their competitors to suffer on their account.

Tomorrow being the date set for holding the primaries in the different townships of our county, we wish to especially emphasize the great importance of every democrat doing his duty. This is the critical period, and every citizen should do his part.

On account of President Winston, of the State Agricultural and Mechanical College, having abridged the privileges of the senior class this year, not allowing them to be absent from the college except at certain times without permission, the class has threatened to leave college in a body. They claim that the lower classes have sworn to stand by them in their attempt to get the president to repeal the law. Four of the senior committee that were appointed to confer with the president and faculty were expelled. The seniors also want these men re-instated. As a result of the failure of the class to get what they asked of the president work has been stopped and the senior class barred from the dining room and dormitories.

For some time we have been watching President Winston in the great work that he is doing, and we have never found him to be a man who fears his duty. He is not the man to make a good law, and seeing it to be a good law, repeal it because it does not meet the exact approval of the students affected.

In this instance we believe the President has made a rule that will help the college, and our advice to students is not to rely on their ability to get President Winston to rescind.

A man without convictions who is himself on the market to the highest bidder, is apt to suppose all others like unto himself, that every man has his price—some more some less. Such a man is absolutely incapable of grasping the truth that to a true man INTEGRITY is infinitely beyond price.

When any moral question presents itself to a man without convictions, his only inquiry is, will it pay? will it advance my personal interest? If so I will contend for it, unless a larger price is offered on the other side, in which event I reserve the right to flop over on the side that pays the largest price. Such an individual

is a dishonor to his creator, a burlesque on man and a curse to the world.

On the other hand, when any moral question presents itself to a true man, his only inquiry is, is it right? And if so I shall stand for it no matter what may be the immediate result to myself. Such a man cannot be bought, he cannot be hired, he cannot be driven—he is a MAN. Such a man is an honor to his Creator and a blessing to the world.

DOING MANHATTAN.

And Getting Ready for Esopus.

NEW YORK, Sept 6, 1904. North Carolina has not moved to New York, but about twenty editors from the Old North State reached here this evening to take part in the editorial conference and go on the trip to Esopus, and so many being here together makes us feel very much at home.

Taking supper in Greenville, finishing an after supper smoke in Kinston, loafing an hour in Goldsboro and another in Wilson, sleeping through Richmond, breakfasting in Washington and getting dinner in New York, looks like moving around through space quite lively, but it is only an instance of what the present day facilities for travel afford.

The North Carolina editors who are here met in Washington and came on to New York in a body. Arriving here our mind went back to what a Pitt county sheriff once said upon visiting the city "It looks like court week in New York." Well, a big crowd is nothing unusual, for it must be remembered that above 3,000,000 people live around here, beside the thousands of non-residents who come and go every day.

At this meeting I have not learned just what the program is for tomorrow except that the editors from the different parts of the country will confer as to the best plan to pursue in the campaign to secure the election of Parker and Davis. Wednesday night there will be a banquet at the Waldorf-Astoria, and Thursday a trip up the Hudson to Esopus, the home of Judge Parker, where the editors will be presented to him. Mr. Knapp of the St. Louis Republic will make a speech for the pressmen and Judge Parker will respond.

A great deal more is seen up this way to indicate the activity of the national campaign than has yet been manifested in the south. Campaign banners for both Parker and Davis and Roosevelt and Fairbanks are seen floating everywhere. Numerous clubs have opened headquarters showing that the battle is on in earnest. It certainly is an inspiration to come here and listen to the many confident expressions of the certainty of the election of Parker and Davis, and one outcome of the conference of editors will be the spreading of this enthusiasm over the country. The Republican Vote in Vermont What Was Expected.

The Associated Press gives out the following statement by Chairman Taggart of the Democratic National Convention, concerning the republican majority in Vermont:
"The result in Vermont is not surprising in view of the unparalleled efforts made by the republicans and the quiet campaign conducted by the democrats. The administration concentrated all its force and resources upon that state, holding in the last week two hundred meetings. Moreover, it was proclaimed throughout the state that the president had promised the candidate for governor to attend his inauguration in case he obtained a majority of 40,000.
"In view of the efforts, never made before by any party in a September election, it is remarkable that the administration did not succeed in increasing the republican majority. Indeed, it did not even increase the republican vote. That does not exceed 48,050, while in 1896 it was 73,427 and in 1900 it was 48,441."
