UNVEILING AT TARBORO.

Monument to Confederate Soldiers.

Tarboro, N. C., Oct. 29.—At the intersection of the walks leading through that portion of the town commons on the east side of Main street, plain to the view of all passers, there stands a handsome pedestal on a heavy granite base mounted with the bronze statue of a Confederate soldier assuming a graceful posture, to enhance the admiration of perspective glances and incite the passions of patriotism.

This mark of memory is the reward of the tireless activity exercised by the members of the Wm. Dorsey Pender Chapter of the Daughters of the Confederacy, that noble band of lovely women whose thoughts are ever foremost in cherishing that cause held so dear in the hearts of our sunny Southland. They have striven earnestly, diligently and zealously for this particular memorial of perpetuity and their accomplishment has indeed been a glorious one, for in this monument we have a befitting token of the love and appreciation of the valor of her gallant heroes in whom Edgecombe county has always felt such a great pride.

At 11 o'clock a procession led by a platoon of police, with chief marshal Albert Cox and six aides, marched up Main street. Following in the procession in order were the Tarboro band, Edgecombe Guards, Maj. Gen. J. S. Carr and escort, distinguished visitors, Mayor Allsbrook and staff, county commissioners, veterans, Daughters of Confederacy, schools, lodges, firemen and citizens.

At foot of monument a stand was erected and gaily decorated with National and Confederate colors. S. S. Nash presided and Rev. R. C. Craven opened the ceremonies with prayer, after which the hymn "Nearer My God to Thee," was rendered by the band and choir.

W. Stamps Howard delivered the address of welcome and the monument was unveiled by sweet little Miss Katherine W. Bourne and master W. D. Pender, Jr. Hon. H. C. Bourne then made a speech presenting the monument which was accepted in well chosen words by Paul Jones.

After the band played "The Old North State" Col. John L. Bridges, introduced the orator of the day, Maj. Gen. J. S. Carr, who made an eloquent speech to his comrades, recalling much history of the great struggle of 1861-'65. The benediction was pronounced by the Rt. Rev. Bishop J. B. Cheshire. The band closed the exercises with "Dixie."

Among the distinguished visitors conspicuous on the speaker's stand were Bishop Cheshire, ex-Governor Jarvis, Gen. W. R. Cox and the honorary president, Mrs. W. D. Pender, of Norfolk.

After the ceremonies the Daughters of the Confederacy with others visited the graves of dead heroes and placed flowers thereon.

Pitt County Burned Out

We learn from the Hickory, Ky, Courier, that in a fire which occurred in that town a few nights ago the residence occupied by Rev. R. W. Stancill, formerly of Pitt county, was among the buildings destroyed. Mr. Stancill's family lost all their clothing and furniture and the family narrowly escaped being suffocated by the smoke which woke Mrs. Stancill.
