COUNTY MATTERS.

Proceedings of the Commissioner.

The board of county commissioners met in regular session on the 7th, all the members being present.

Orders on the treasurer were issued amounting as follows: For papers \$164.25; county home \$188.09; bridges and ferry \$282.40; convicts \$272.82; covering prisoners and insane \$22.65; jail \$114.06; court costs \$22.80; witness tickets \$43.05; smallpox \$113.10; roads \$3.90; coal \$28.75; elections \$19.51; stationery \$8.29; commissioners \$40.50; clerk Superior court \$10.27; register deeds \$34.75; stock law territory \$38.56.

Peddler's license for one year were granted to G. O'Konsky, L. Donski and J. Kramer.

D. D. Gardner was released from taxes on \$700 real estate erroneously charged.

Richard Worthington was released from taxes on \$75 real estate erroneously charged.

Walter Wilson was released from taxes on \$300 personal property erroneously charged.

The public road in Greenville township leading from Herbert McGowan's place to Hardee's run, about one mile long, was ordered discontinued.

The pay of convict guards was fixed as follows: J. F. Allen \$2 per day, other guards \$1.50 per day.

Pauper allowance of Henry Dail and wife was increased to \$3 per month and of Nonie Summerrell to \$2.50 per month.

G. B. Whitfield, Leon H. Cox, G. N. Warren, Noah Johnson, C. W. Exum and W. H. Smith were released from poll tax for 1904.

Mr. Parker to Remain in Politics.

Judge Parker announced to one of his friends last week that no matter what the result of the election might be it was his intention to remain in politics. He declared that if he should be defeated he would never again be a candidate for the presidency, but that would not deter him from taking an active part in the future battles of his party. He felt that he might be able to wield more influence if his efforts were entirely divorced from any possible implication of personal ambition or interest.

The revelations of corruption arising from the connection of the trusts with the immense Republican campaign fund, have, it is said, convinced Judge Parker that it is his duty to devote a large part of his time and energy in the future to the service of the Democratic cause.—New York World.

Graded School Rules.

The board of trustees of Greenville graded schools met Wednesday and adopted two new rules, as follows:

It is ordered that no child be admitted to the first grade after 30 days from the opening of the school year, and that this order takes effect on the 21st day of Nov., 1904.

That while the board desires to exclude any child from the benefits of the school who is of the proper ages and lives within the district, yet the board feels it is but just that all children who attend the school shall be required to comply with the law requiring vaccination. It is therefore ordered that after the 14th day of Nov., 1904, the superintendent of the schools is directed to refuse to receive any child into the school who has not been vaccinated or who is not exempted by a certificate from the family physician, and that no child be admitted from outside the district who has not been vaccinated.

Golden Era Ahead For the South.

It is not to be expected that the South ever will manufacture its entire cotton production, for, when it has reached the point where it consumes in its own mills the 10,500,000 bales which now measure its average crop, the world will be demanding of it, and it will meet the world's demands, probably 20,000,000 bales. But the utilization in its own mills of 10,000,000 bales would mean the employment of 1,000,000 operatives, the investment in mills and textile machinery of not less than \$2,000,000,000, and the annual output would be worth \$20,000,000,000.

Then, indeed, would the South, without monopolizing the world's cotton manufacturing interests, be the dominant factor, the center of the world's cotton mill business, producing 20,000,000 bales and consuming at home in its own mills 10,000,000 bales.

Both will come about in due time. The South sees before it this prize, rich beyond words to describe, creating wealth beyond anything which this section or any other section has known, and this is the prize—a prize great enough to enrich an empire—for which it has entered the race. That it will win admits of no question.—Richard H. Edmunds.

LETTER TO FRANK WILSON.

Greenville, N. C.

Dear Sis: When you see a well dressed man, you like to say: "There's a sample of my clothes. That man is worth two of himself as he was when he came to me."

We have the same feeling. Our paint on a house is worth twice as much as old fashion painter's paint, lead-and-oil. It looks the same when first put on. In three years it decidedly don't.

Lead-and oil chalks off in three years; it is considered a first-rate job that lasts three years.

Devoc lead-and-zinc is about as good in three years as it was the day the painter left it.

Zinc is the secret of it; no secret at all. A good many painters know zinc; some mix it in with their lead. We grind it in; not a little; good deal.

It's the zinc and the grinding that does it. You can't mix zinc by hand. We grind it in by machinery.

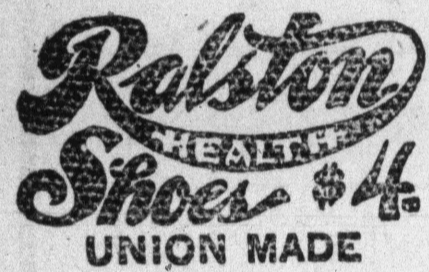
