AN OLD BOOK.

Names and Dates of the Long Ago.

W. A. Hyman, of Belvoir township, brought us a very old book which he says can be presented to the public library of the End of the Century Book Club. The book bears the title "The Psalms of David imitated in the language of the New Testament." It contains the Psalms in meter as well as a number of "Hymns and Spiritual Songs." The book bears date of being printed in London in 1772 but is one of the twenty-third edition. An "advertisement to the readers" that preceded the title page is dated Dec. 1st, 1718. "It is the old style print in which the letter f is largely used for s.

The early owners of the book used it as a family record as the blank leaves and some of the margins contain names of people with the date of their birth. One of these is "Francis Meeks, born Sept. 27th, 1765," at another place is the name "Robert Teel" without any date. Another has "Amos Teel born Jany. 15th, 1833." The book also shows the name Lany Teel, daughter of Bradberry and Mary Teel, born 7th day of Nov., 1789, and James Teel, son of the same parents, born Aug. 5th, 1777.

Further on about midway the book is a page devoted to the Deloach family on which are the names Abraham Deloach, son of Mary Deloach, born July 21st, 1775; Ann Deloach, daughter of Jas. Deloach, born Aug. 2nd, 1768, and another child born in 1766.

There are other indistinct names but the foregoing are sufficient to show it is a very old book and gives the names of people who lived a very long time ago.

It turns out that even the solid South is broken by Roosevelt getting the electoral vote of Missouri.

New York goes right on with tenement house fires and makes little to do over lives being lost in the death traps.

The general commanding Port Arthur is about ready to give up. He has asked the Japanese for an armistice.

It is too late now to be saying what would have been the result if Cleveland had run for president. He didn't run.

Between running in a district in which he did not live and ballot box stuffing Blackburn may get the plum in the eighth.

The Raleigh Times states that Roosevelt was the first vice president ever elected president. He has run in both places and was elected both times.

Republican chairman Rollins says his party will carry North Carolina in the next election. Fifty thousand majority is a pretty big pile to climb over, as he will find out.

Just tell the people if they want to strike the flood tide they should come South and grow up with it. This section will lead the nation in prosperity before another decade rolls around.

When Greenville's electric lights and water works are completed you will see the old town move along. As Col. Sugg says, we are the only Greenville, though there are others by the same name.

Previous Landslides.

In 1840 William Henry Harrison received 234 votes to 60 for Martin Van Buren, a majority of 174.

In 1852 Franklin Pierce received 254 votes to 42 for Winfield Scott, a majority of 212.

In 1864 Abraham Lincoln received 212 votes to 21 for George B. McClellan, a majority of 191.

In the election of 1872 Grant received 286 votes, while 80 Greeley electors were chosen, whose votes were divided when the college met by reason of Greeley's death, Grant's majority being 206.—New York World.

"With the greatest pleasure in the world," was the ready reply.

General Beaver took the note and opened it. His face broke into a broad smile.

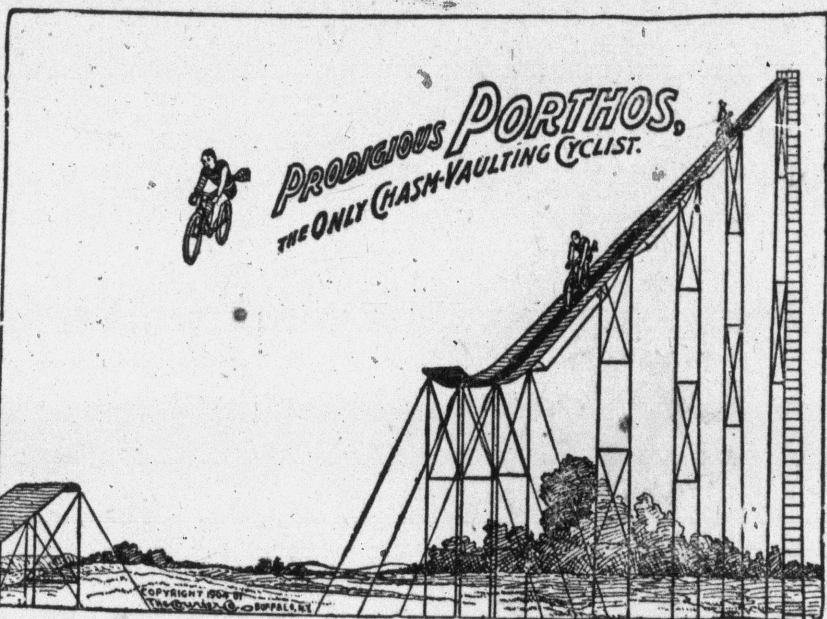
"I have changed my mind," he said. "I have decided not to be interviewed today."
