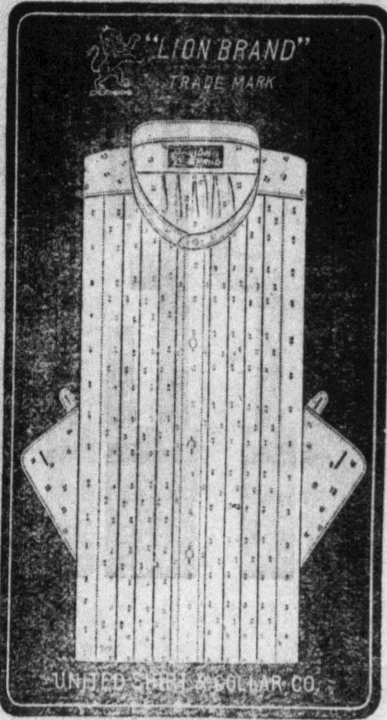

ALDERMEN'S BUSY NIGHT.

Had Much Work and Were in Session Until Midnight

The board of aldermen were in regular monthly session Thursday night, all the members being present.

The finance committee reported that application had been made to both banks of the town for the loan of \$5,000 from each to make the \$10,000 to be borrowed for sewerage, and the banks had the matter under consideration. It was also stated that the suggestion had been made that it might be best not to begin work on the sewerage system with warm weather coming on, lest it cause sickness. After some discussion of the matter the board was of the opinion that the work should be done as early as possible.

The street committee reported that the streets were in better condition than they have been for some time, much work being done during the past month.

Ex Governor T. J. Jarvis appeared before the board in behalf of the graded school trustees and requested that the graded school building be wired for electric lighting. The board authorized that this be done at the expense of the town.

The lights and wells committee was instructed to take the pump out of the well near the old market house and equip the well with buckets. The committee was also instructed to look into the matter of providing suitable troughs at convenient places for watering horses.

The market committee reported that two additional stalls in market house had been rented to fish dealers.

The white cemetery committee reported three lots sold during the past month. Wire and posts have been ordered for enclosing the cemetery.

The committees to look after arrangements for the teachers, in case Greenville is selected as the place to hold the summer school, reported the progress of their work. Mayor Wooten was appointed to attend the meeting of the teachers and officially invite them to hold the summer school here, and to ask such citizens as he may select to cooperate with him. As an inducement to secure the summer school the teachers are offered boarding places at \$10 for the four weeks and a purse of \$100 to be used for the success of the school.

The several officers filed their monthly reports. The dispensary report showed a profit up to April 1st of \$4,727.61.

Taxes on \$500 incorrectly listed was ordered refunded to W. L. Brown.

R. D. Harrington was allowed to carry on a livery business in the name of A. B. Kittrell during the remainder of the time covered by a license issued to the latter.

A donation of \$100 was made to Bryan Grimes Camp Confederate Veterans for their reunion here May 10th.

The water and light commission was instructed to wire and place one incandescent light in the guard house, two in the hall of the market house and to sufficiently light the mayor's office.

A pound was ordered provided in which to impound stock and dogs, also a shelter for protecting the wagon, carts and street sprinkler of the town.

It appearing that tenants of R. J. Cobb are encroaching upon property belonging to the town on Reade street, the chief of police was instructed to have the property vacated.

Accounts were allowed and orders on the treasurer issued to the amount of \$929.62.

Walter Partridge, the negro who in February assaulted Mrs. Hales was hanged Thursday at Fayetteville. He made a full confession previous to the execution.

PASTOR A. T. KING RESIGNS.

Church Much Grieved and Will Endeavor to Have Resignation Withdrawn.

At the regular quarterly conference of the Baptist church Thursday night the pastor, Rev. A. T. King, tendered his resignation as pastor of the church to accept a call to Richmond, Va. The church had been fearing this for some days, knowing that Mr. King had received a call to a larger and more inviting field, and therefore the resignation was not entirely unexpected, and still it was a grief to the congregation.

The church declined to accept the resignation and appointed a committee, consisting of W. H. Ragdale, C. E. Lincoln and W. T. Burton, to see Mr. King and see if any inducements, either as to increase of salary or otherwise, could be offered which would cause him to withdraw his resignation. It is to be hoped that Mr. King will reconsider the matter and continue to serve the church.

The membership and the congregation as a unit desire that he shall not leave them. Few pastors have ever served the church that were more loved and admired than Mr. King. He possesses every trait of character to make a church love him. He is social, kind, cultured, and intellectual. He exhibits in his work and conversation the ideal christian minister. He is a fine preacher and the church feels keenly what it will lose should he leave. A large number of people not members of any church join in the hope that the church may get Mr. King to withdraw his resignation.

JUSTICE ROUNTREE'S COURT.

Vagrants Hear, "Thirty Days, Boys."

Justice Rountree's court room was made dark this morning by the appearance of the dusky faces of four full-grown vagrants. They were full blooded fellows, and evidently were professionals in the calling of "living without visible means of support."

With the exception of Jim King, (col.), each heard "30 days," but poor Jim, he's got to pay state, county, and town taxes. No doubt a tax receipt is a strange looking thing to Jim, but if he doesn't scrape up a few in the next thirty days, Justice Rountree says the county will give him a little job.

Charles Williams took his sentence of "30 days" in his usual good natured way, but Toney Baptista, who will make a nice, fat road hand, wished to convince the court that he actually performed some labor. However, he fanned out, and enters upon the duty of a road hand at once.

Last on the docket was Alonzo King. Alonzo is another of these good natured fellows, and made frantic efforts to convince the court that he spends his "spring days pulling fodder," whereupon Justice Rountree informed him as it was not fodder pulling time at present, he would give him a little task to perform, and sentenced him to thirty days.

We understand that several other warrants for vagrancy have been issued, and there may be something doing again real soon.

Thousands in Lettuce.

Lettuce shipments from this territory are now very heavy. It is estimated that the consignment yesterday were fully 5,000 baskets, there having been several refrigerator car loads as well as two or three by express.
