Some things will be done this year that have not been required heretofore. It is absolutely necessary that they be done. If you don't know what they are I don't see how you can do them. This meeting will be the time and place where such information will be given. All of your schools will begin before the next meeting. If you are not here I don't know what you will do. A great meeting is what we wish and what we hope to have that day. See to it that you are present.

TOWN MATTERS.

Proceedings of the Aldermen.

The board of aldermen were in regular monthly session Thursday night. There was not as much business as usual and the hour of adjournment was reached earlier.

The finance committee reported that arrangement had been made for borrowing half the money needed for constructing the sewerage system, and a arrangement for the balance would be made in a few days.

The street committee reported inability to get hands to work, but that the streets were in fair condition, places on the sidewalks needing most attention.

The matter of the street from Dickinson avenue to a point near the Star warehouse came up again and was postponed to next meeting.

The matter of exempting firemen from poll tax was referred to committee to report at next meeting.

The several officers made their reports for the past month.

The bond of the clerk and tax collector was fixed at \$6,000.

The money collected for water and light service has heretofore been deposited to the credit of the water and light commission, and it was ordered that these collections hereafter be turned over to the treasurer of the town.

The salary of the night policeman was increased from \$40 to \$45 per month.

Aldermen Bowen, Lamer and Hooker were appointed a purchasing committee for the town.

J. J. Willis was granted restaurant licenses.

Orders on the treasury amounting to \$9,668 were issued.

The report of manager of the dispensary for September showed stock on hand \$4,291.91, cash on hand \$5,040.00, bills payable \$1,886.10, total assets above liabilities \$8,029.90, the profits from July 1st to Oct. 1st \$4,208.60.

RELIGIOUS WEEK IN TARBORO.

Episcopal Mission Service and Baptist Association.

Tarboro, N. C., Oct 6th.

This week has been notably a religious one for Tarboro. At Calvary Episcopal Church Rev. Perry Webber, arch deacon of Maine, assisted by the rector Rev. Mr. Harding, has just closed a mission which lasted a period of nearly a week. Mr. Webber is an able divine.

On the afternoon of the last Sabbath, to an audience composed of men exclusively, he strongly advocated a high standard of morality, and a similar theme embraced his discourse to a congregation of the opposite sex the following afternoon. His sermons were the product of a cultured mind and made their impression on all who heard them. There was a daily celebration of the Holy Communion. Much interest was manifested throughout the mission and the spirit of piety was greatly revived.

TAR RIVER ASSOCIATION.

The 75th annual session of the Tar River Association of the Missionary Baptist church was convened Tuesday morning by the moderator, Rev. T. M. Arrington, of Rocky Mount. Revs. T. J. Taylor, of Warrenton, and E. E. Demar, of Richmond, led in prayer. The introductory sermon was delivered by Rev. G. L. Lumpkin, of Scotland Neck.

The roll of the churches was then called and delegates from 54 of the 92 churches were enrolled. Rev. Mr. Arrington was unanimously chosen to succeed himself as moderator for the ensuing year.

Three new pastors were introduced, these being Revs. J. E. Ayscove, of Greenville, W. W. Barnes, of Elm City, and J. T. Eubanks, of Bethel.

In the afternoon a report on Sunday schools was read and discussed by the Rev. J. T. Jenkins. A report on periodicals was then read by Rev. T. S. Crutchfield and discussed by others of the brethren. Rev. R. D. Carroll read and discussed an interesting report on temperance State missions was the subject of somewhat lengthy discourses after a report thereon had been read by Rev. Mr. Marshburn. The association resolved to raise one thousand dollars in the next sixty days for such missions.

The address of welcome made by Rev. M. P. Davis, of Tarboro church and was responded to by Rev. S. L. Morgan on behalf of the association.

A prayer was made for the Rev. Geo. W. Duke who had been detained at home by the illness of his daughter. He was to have made the historical address.

The devotional exercises which opened the session Tuesday evening were conducted by Rev. J. E. Hocutt of Nashville. This service was in commemoration of the organization of the Tar River association at old Sandy Creek seventy-five years ago.

Rev. Mr. Bailey, of Wake Forest, made a splendid address on "The future outlook of the Baptists".

The Wednesday morning session was opened with devotional exercises conducted by Rev. H. H. Marshburn.

Foreign missions was made the special order of business. Dr. Bomar submitted a carefully prepared missionary map of the world and delivered an able address from his subject of missions. One thousand and five hundred dollars were voted to be raised during the next year for foreign missions.

Three thousand dollars were pledged by the association for such missions for the coming year.

At the session Wednesday afternoon the association decided to employ an associational evangelist at a salary of one thousand dollars and traveling expenses.

Speed and Piney Grove were admitted as new churches to membership.

The devotional exercises Wednesday evening were conducted by Rev. W. W. Barnes.

Rev. G. T. Lumpkins read and discussed a report on home missions embracing the Southern states and the island of Cuba only.

A report on the orphanage was read and discussed by Rev. Mr. Martin, of Spring Hope. There is said to be a debt of about eleven thousand dollars against this institution. The association contributed two hundred and thirty-two dollars to this cause.

The session Thursday morning was opened with devotional exercises conducted by Rev. Braxton Craig formerly pastor of the Tarboro church. Reports and discussions were heard on education, aged ministers' relief, woman's work, digests of church letters, and other topics.

The association claims a membership exceeding ten thousand in number and ranks as the second largest in the world.

A resolution of thanks to the Tarboro church and the people generally for their hospitality was unanimously adopted by a rising vote.

Dr. Hufham then pronounced the benediction and the association adjourned to meet next year with the Red Oak church in Nash county.

ADDRESS

Call your county and district meetings throughout the entire belt. Build up your membership in the Southern Cotton Association and stand firmly together for justice and protection. If you will check the sale of your cotton for 30 or 60 days this Association will guarantee an advance in the price to eleven cents per pound. Do not rush your cotton on a depressed market, but sell slowly and prove to the world beyond all question of doubt that Southern farmers have the ability, the determination and the strength to force the world to recognize their power in maintaining a fair price for their products.

The Southern Cotton Association must be maintained and financed by the farmers of the South. Its power to protect the interest of the producers is recognized and feared by all the leading speculative and cotton interests of America and Europe. If we go down in defeat the enemy will be merciless and it will take twenty years for the South to recover again. Stand by the Association and thereby protect your individual interests. The South is both mentally and financially able to manage and protect her interests from the dominating and devastating hands of her enemies.

Last January the price of cotton was depressed to six cents per pound and the Southern Cotton Association was organized at the New Orleans Convention Jan. 26, 1904, to bring about harmony among the producers, merchants and bankers so as to advance the price to ten cents per pound. The world knows that through this powerful organization the price of spot cotton was advanced to ten cents in the South on July

3rd, just five months later. Not only this but the assistance given the "Bear" operators by certain officials in the United States Department of Agriculture was exposed through the efforts of the Association and the rascals were promptly turned out. This work has already saved millions of dollars to the South and will continue to do so if fostered and maintained by the people. If the South could advance the price of a 14,000,000 bale crop from 6 cents to 10 cents, clearly it would require but little co operative effort to secure not less than eleven cents for a 10,000,000 bale crop.

Let the people know the truth, know the power of their strength and then let them act promptly and the victory for higher prices will soon be won; then their great staple will be selling at its real value to the world.
