The Democratic feature about this is that the maiter is to be submitted to a vote of the church, and every member will have the privilege of voting for or against the resolution.

### STRINGENT AND PROPER.

One of the best provisions of the Ward bill was that the possession of Federal license should be considered prima facie evidence of guilt in any proceeding against a man for illegally selling liquor. It has been the custom of owners of houses of illfame and other violators of the temperance laws to take out Federal licenses as a protection in ease they were caught up with. It is a shame that the Federal Government should issue license Since taking Rocky Mountain Tea to a man to sell liquor in a prohibition community. It is worth nothing to him except to secure cure immunity from Federal prosecution. Under the Ward act, as was demonstrated by Solicitor Brooks in Durham, the possession of such license causes convictions where other evidence is not conclusive.

The New Bern authorities have taken a drastic but correct step in advance of the Ward act, by refusing to give license to ary person to do any business whatever who has taken out Federal license. New Bern is a prohibition town. It seems that persons who run restaurants, cigar stands, or other places would take out Federal license and convert their places into illicit saloons. In the future they cannot do business in the city. which is proper. If the Federal administration insists upon trying to render New Bern's prohition law a failure, the city fathers do wisely to ostracise the owners of such licenses and other towns and cities should do like wise. - News and Observer.






