The North Carolina building at the Jamestown exposition is of colonial architecture and was erected at a cost of \$23,000. It is an imposing structure constructed upon a plot of ground 135 by 110 feet in size, situated on Willoughby Boulevard, east, and overlooks the broad waters of Hampton Roads. The building was designed by Zimmerman & Leister, architects, of Winston-Salem, N. C., and was constructed by J D. Elliott, contractor, of Hickory, N. (The building is three stories high and contains fourteen commodious apartments, a hallway on each floor and number of closets and bathrooms.
