New Board of Directors-Important Measures Discussed

There was a good attendance of business men at the meeting of he Chamber of Comm ree in the mayor's office Monday night

The meeting was presided over by Vice-President S T. White and it being the annual meetin the election of a board of directers was gone into after routing business had been completed The constitution requires that three directors be elected to serve for two years and three for one year. The following were elected by acclamation?

For two years-Dr. E. A Moye, F. M. Wooten and H. A. Wnite.

For one year-L. C. Arthur, Dr. D. L. James and D. J. Whichard.

The meeting was then thrown op n for suggestions and discussions and several short speeches were made. One matter discussed was Greenville as a cottor market and to have a centra place where bidders shall assem ble to buy cotton instead of i being sold up and down the strect The question had advo cates and opponents

The question that arroused greatest interest was street paving. All were agreed that Greenville should be at work in this direction. The following resolution was offered by H. A White and unanimously adopted:

"Resolved, That it is the sense of the Chamber of Commerce of Greenville that the Board of Al dermen use every effort to renev the present town loan of \$15,000 and if successful, immediately after the sale of the bonds to take steps towards paving Evans street and Dickinson Avenue, or Ninth street, to the railroad stations."

The meeting adjourned subject to the call of the board of directors.

Train Wrecked at South Rocky Mount.

Rocky Mount, N. C., Oct 6,-The Atlantic Coast Line north bound train No. 82, which pass es through here at about tw o'clcck in the morning, was wrecked on the lower part of th yard at South Rocky Mount early Sunday morning. The shift ing engine was running up and lown the yard as usual when a head-on collision occurred beween it and 82. The shifting engine was smashed and the en gine of No 82 was derailed and badly torn up. Five mail clerks had barely escaped by jumping when the mail car in which they were at work was crushed into a thousand pieces. The engineer on the pa-senger train, however, was not so fortunite, and his body was severely crushed and mangled, death occurring in stantly His name is George Boney, and he is well known in Rocky Mount. His colored fire man was injured so that he died ina few h urs. With the excep tio of these two deaths and some slight bruises to the mail clerks and a few of the passengers no other injuries were received

common form of sore eyes, is an inflammation of the thin, transparent membrane covering the front surface of the eyeball and lining the

Oculists distinguish several varieties of this disease, the symptoms of which vary greatly in intensity. There may be merely a bloodshot condition, due to the enlargement of the blood vessels to such a size that they become visible, accompanied by an itching and a feeling as if there were dust in the eyes, with perhaps a little sticky discharge

ich glues the lids together in the morning. The eyes are also sensitive to light and sometimes ache slightly.

In more severe cases the discharge is profuse and yellowish, ulcers may form, and the inflammstion may even extend to the deeper structures of the eye and so destroy

One of the chronic forms of conunctivitis is that known as trachoma, or granular lids. This is very difficult to cure and often results in a permanent injury to vision. It is also quite contagious. Indeed, all forms of sore eye are probably contagious, but some are more so than others, and for this reason the most scrupulous precautions should be taken to protect the other members of the family when one has any form of conjunctivitis. The sufferer should sleep in a bed by himself and should have his own towels, wash rag or sponge and handkerchiefs, and these when soiled should be thoroughly boiled in a separate vessel and should not go into the common wash.

The treatment of simple conjunctivitis consists chiefly in cleanliness. The eyes should be bathed often in lukewarm water containing a pinch of salt or in a solution of boric acid, and some of the solution should be dropped into the eye, so as to wash away the discharge.

The eyes should be shielded from the light by smoked glasses or gog

The only thing that brings Dickinson avenue into any consideration whatever as the route to follow from Evans street to the depot is that it is a little shorter the "inside nerves". 
