## Receptions to Prisoners Unwise.

It is noted with interest that a citizen of this State who had just finished a term of two years in the Federal prison in Atlanta for crookedness in liquor dealing, has returned to his home and "was given a warm and hearty reception by his family and friends," and it is further stated that a reception was given at his home (presumably in his honor), which a large number were present. In a neighboring town some months ago a citizen who served a term in jail for crookedness in liquor dealing signaled his release from prison by a reception at his home. We do not think when a man is released from prison he should be shunned by his former associates or mistreated by his family; that may drive him to despair. On the contrary he should be given all proper encouragement to so conduct himself that he may efface, as far as possible, the memory of his fall. But it is dangerous to make much of a to do over one of this kind. If the receptions, etc., do not make him believe he has done no wrong, it may lead others to think that it is something of an honor to serve a term in jail or in the penitentiary. Better leave off the receptions on such occasions.

### The Blood of Our Presidents.

Despite the fact that we are the most amalgamated nation on earth, but two of the twenty-five men who have served this country as president came from other than British ancestry. Having occasion a few days since to go over a list of the presidents, it occurred to me that it would be of interest to see whence our executives come. I find that all but two—Van Buren and Roosevelt, who came from the Dutch—were of British ancestry.

These twenty-three from the British are divided up into Scotch-Irish, Scotch, Welsh and English. From the Scotch-Irish came Jackson, Polk, Buchanan, Arthur and McKinley; from the Scotch are Monroe, Grant and Hayes, and from the Welsh came Jefferson. All the rest came from the English, pure and simple. German, French, Italian, Polish, Russian and Scandinavian blood have not yet mingled in the veins of our presidents, and probably will not for some time. —Pathfinder.

## Hoarded Money Stolen.

The loss of \$752, an account of which appears in our local columns today, is an object lesson to the people who have money. Just last week we called attention to the loss of \$1,500 by a Randolph county farmer who thought it was safe in the mattress of his bed. Like the Fitzgerald merchant, when he went to look for it one day, it was gone, and the thief may never be known. The Randolph county farmer and the Fitzgerald merchant should have had their money in some bank. It would have been safer there and would have been worth more to the business world than anywhere else they could have possibly kept it. It was not only their duty as a matter of precaution to put their money in the bank, but it was their duty as business men. Banks sometimes fail, but they hardly ever fail to pay the depositors even in the worst failures.

Only a few weeks ago this Fitzgerald merchant fell out with the banks for issuing clearing house certificates and immediately withdrew his money. If his example had been followed by all the depositors of the bank it would have been impossible for them to get more than 50 cents on the dollar and their action would have ruined the bank. But fortunately for them and for the bank and for Fitzgerald, they did not take the same view of it, and left their money where it is safer and where it is doing its part in our great commercial system. We sympathize with the farmer and the merchant who lost their money, but we cannot approve their policy. If every farmer and every merchant followed their example, the commerce of the country would come to a sudden and sensational halt, and more money would be lost in a year than is lost by bank depositors in a decade.—Fitzgerald Enterprise.
