WHY JOHNSON COULD.

Could Probably Carry States in Which Bryan Has No Chance.

There are 483 votes in the electoral college, 242 being necessary to elect a president. In 1900 Mr. Bryan had 155 electoral votes. A successful Democratic candidate for President must. therefore, have at least 87 more electoral votes than Mr. Bryan received in 1900-
